Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state:

- (a) the present status of Dir-Chitral Motorway; and
- (b) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to connect Tribal District Bajaur with the said Motorway, if so, the details thereof?

Mr. Murad Saeed: (a) Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Government is conducting feasibility and design of Dir (Rabbat)-Chakdara Motorway, having a length of 30 Km. Further details in this context, may be obtained from KP Government.

(b) The project will be taken up in near future.

Will the Minister for Federal Education, Professional Training, National Heritage and Culture be pleased to state whether it is a fact that teachers working in the educational institutions of Islamabad have not been given time scale promotions with effect from the date of their eligibility, if so, the reasons thereof indicating also the number of such teachers?

Mr. Shafqat Mehmood: Under Prime Minister Directive No. 2605 dated 17-02-2011, higher time scale was granted to the teaching faculty under Federal Directorate of Education with following conditions as conveyed vide Notification No. F.1-1/2011-Edu, dated 14-10-2011 read with notification dated 24-02-2014:—

S#	BPS of teaching staff	Years of service required for next higher scale
1	BS-17	Five years in BS-16
2	BS-18	Five years in BS-17 or 10 years in BS-16 and BS- 17
3	BS-19	Seven years in BS-18 or 12 years in BS-17 and BS- 18
4	BS-20	Seven years in BS-19 or 19 years in BS-17 and above
5	BS-21	Five years in BS-20 or 24 years in BS-17 and above

- The service rules, nomenclature/tiers of the posts and seniority of the teachers shall remain intact.
- The promotion through time scale will be subject to fitness of candidate and recommendations of relevant DPCs and selection board.

Accordingly, cases for grant of higher time scale of eligible teachers were prepared and placed before DPC in the month of March, 2020 for consideration. During proceeding of meeting of DPC, member advised to seek guidance from Finance. Subsequently, a reference was forwarded to Finance Division for seeking their clarification and Finance Division responded that grant of higher time scale shall be granted with immediate effect.

Subsequently, Higher Time Scale was granted to teaching staff. The detail of teaching staff, granted Higher Time Scale in the month of March 2020 is enclosed *vide* "Annex-I".

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is fact that the construction of Karachi-Hydrabad Motorway (M-9) is substandard, if so, the reasons thereof; and
- (b) the rate at which toll tax is being charged on the said Motorway?

Mr. Murad Saeed: (a) It is apprised that re-construction of Karachi-Hyderabad Motorway M-9 is as per international standard *i.e.* American Association of State Highways and Transportation Officials Standard (AASHTO) which defines the road Geometric Parameters and the pavement thickness.

(b) Toll rates are as per concession agreement (Annex-I).

SCHEDULE B TOLL STRUCTURE

1. Handing Over of Tolling and Operational Rights

- (a) The Concessionaire shall be handed over the Existing Toll Plazas, and the New Toll Plazas, if any, on the Take-Over Date.
- (b) The Toll Revenue collected during the Construction Period shall be treated as a subsidy from NHA for undertaking the Project and the same shall be utilized by the Concessionaire exclusively for undertaking the Project.
- (c) The Toll collected under Part I of this Schedule shall be collected under the tolling system existing as on the Effective Date.

(2) Toll Rates During the Construction Period

(i) On the Take-Over Date, the Toll rates shall be as follows: provided, that the same shall not be less than the Toll rates set out below:

- (iii) The Concessionaire shall collect Toll only between the Main Toll Plazas. For the avoidance of doubt, Toll shall be collected from the current location of the Karachi Toll Plaza to the Hyderabad Toll Plaza (14+900 of the Project chainage and 133+600 of the Project chainage, respectively) as of the Effective Date. The Concessionaire shall not be entitled to collect Toll from urban traffic plying short of the Main Toll Plaza at the Karachi end of the Motorway (up to Project Ch 16+000 or Ch 29+000 NHA reference system), however, at the Main Toll Plaza at the Karachi end of the Motorway, sixteen (16 kilometres length, or the actual length of the Motorway till the Main Toll Plaza at the Karachi end of the Motorway, will be added to the distance travelled by a commuter on the Motorway after passing in either direction through the Main Toll Plaza at the Karachi end for purposes of calculation of the Toll.
- (iv) Any commuter crossing a Main Toll Plaza and plying in either direction on the Motorway will be charged 1011 on a per allocated basis for (a) the actual length of the Motorway till the relevant Main Toll Plaza crossed by such commuter, and (b) the actual length travelled by such commuter on the Motorway after crossing the relevant Main Toll Plaza.
- (v) In respect of the Motorway Section and any Section added to the Motorway Section subsequently, the Concessionaire shall be allowed to collect the Base Toll Rates (along with the applicable escalation) for the length of the Motorway Section and any Section added to the Motorway Section subsequently.

 - (A) Eight percent (8%) annual Toll escalation shall first be applied on the Base Toll Rates on the first (1") anniversary of the Motorway Section Service Commencement Date and subsequently on each anniversary of the Motorway Section Service Commencement Date.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that officials of WHO are performing duties in the Pakistan Polio Eradication Programme, if so, the number of those officials and the salaries and other perks and privileges admissible to them;
- (b) the number of officers in BPS-17 and above working in the said Programme with province wise breakup indicating also

the amount being paid to them under the heads of salary and other perks and privileges on monthly basis; and

(c) whether the polio vaccinators and the police personnel performing duties with them are paid any salary or provided any perks, if so, the details thereof?

Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination: (a) Polio Eradication in Pakistan has been declared as a national public health emergency, and different activities of the Programme are implemented nationwide through a 'whole of the government approach' with the active support of health department, EPI, district administration and Law Enforcement Agencies. The implementing partners including WHO provide support to the Government that also includes provision of technical staff, using their own resources. The national staff is recruited on competitive basis as per the HR management processes of the organizations, and expenditure is not charged to Government. Salaries are paid on the organization's standard packages based on nature, level and deliverables of the specific jobs. The summary of the currently available WHO support staff is tabulated below:

(b) The Polio Programme does not hire any staff but implements its activities through existing human resource in the Government system at different levels that receive regular salaries and allowances from relevant departments, as admissible for their respective scales, with no provision of any additional perks / privileges by the Programme on monthly basis. The Emergency Operations Centres (EOCs) at provincial level are led by the Coordinators appointed by the respective Governments, while the implementation at district level is overseen by Deputy Commissioners &

implemented through respective health departments including District Health Officers, EPI & Surveillance Coordinators, and the Union Council Medical Officers (UCMOs). Besides health, the implementation is also supported by District Revenue Officers, Police Officers, and other Government departments – all appointed and paid by respective Governments.

To facilitate the Polio related tasks, the WHO only provides requisite logistic support to the UC Medical Officers engaged in the campaign during campaign days [5 days in mobile team areas, 7 days in Community Based Vaccine (CBV) areas and 10 days in Special-Mobile Teams (SMT) areas] at a rate of Rs. 2,400/day in mobile team areas and Rs. 1,850/day in CBV & SMT areas.

(c) The frontline polio workers engaged in the campaign are paid an incentive of Rs. 750/- daily during all days of campaign (5 days in mobile team areas and 10 days in special mobile team areas). The payment is made using the Direct Disbursement Mechanism (DDM) directly to FLWs accounts / easy paisa etc. In core reservoir districts (Karachi, Peshawar, Khyber, Quetta, Pishin & Killa Abdullah), local female community based volunteers are hired full time through UNICEF for vaccination, and are paid Rs. 17,500 per month. The police / security personnel deployed with frontline Polio workers in the campaign are only provided logistic support (daily transportation and lunch).

*Question No. 58 **Senator Mushtaq Ahmed:** (Notice Received on 22/09/2020 at 9:30 AM) QID: 37054

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state whether it is a fact that ban has been imposed on meetings with Dr. Aafia Siddiqui, imprisoned in US jail, during the Covid-19 pandemic and that the number of Covid-19 patients are also increasing in the said jail, if so, the procedure adopted for obtaining information about her health and needs in the jail?

Makhdoom Shah Mehmood Hussain Qureshi: Due to Covid-19 Pandemic, the Consular visits had been suspended by the prison authorities in Federal Medical Centre (FMC) Carswell. Resultantly, in person meetings of our Consul General with Dr. Aafia Siddiqui had been put on hold. However, Consul General remained in touch with the prison authorities in order to get updates on the health and well-being of Dr. Aafia.

Due to efforts of our Embassy in Washington DC, a special consular visit was arranged for our Consul General in Houston to meet Dr. Aafia Siddiqui on 24th September 2020. During the meeting Dr. Aafia herself informed Consul General that her Covid-19 test came negative. Dr. Aafia was alert in her conversation with the Consul General. She also informed the Consul General that she had recently been examined by her psychiatrist who declared her (mentally sound and) well.

302 medical and 120 para-medical posts are lying vacant in PIMS. Detail is at Annex-A & B.

Federal Government Polyclinic, Post Graduate Medical Institute

243 medical and 52 para-medical posts are lying vacant in Federal Government Polyclinic Islamabad. Detail is at **Annex-C**.

Federal General Hospital (FGH)

26 medical and 36 para-medical posts are lying vacant in FGH. Recruitment rules of FGH are being finalized. The vacant posts will be filled after approval of Recruitment Rules. Detail is at **Annex-D**

Will the Minister for Federal Education, Professional Training, National Heritage and Culture be pleased to state the steps taken by the Government to introduce uniform curricular in the country so far?

Mr. Shafqat Mehmood: Keeping in view the prevailing disparity in our education system and in line with the vision of the Prime Minister of Pakistan, National Curriculum Council, Ministry of Federal Education & Professional Training has initiated the coordination in development of Single National Curriculum (SNC) in the country with active participation of all provinces / Areas and other relevant stakeholders.

The steps taken to introduce uniform curriculum

- The development of SNC is driven by the key considerations like constitutional framework, National Policies, Aspirations and National Standards, Alignment with the SDG-4, vision of Quaid and Iqbal, focus on values, Life Skills Based and Inclusive Education, respect & appreciation for different cultures & religions in local and global context, focus on project, inquiry and activity-based learning, development of 21st century skills including analytical, critical and creative thinking.
- Comparative studies were conducted to align SNC with international standards. These include analysis of Pakistani Curriculum with Singapore and Cambridge Curriculum, Pakistan Learners' Standards comparison with Singapore, Malaysia/Indonesia & UK standards. All the findings were incorporated in the SNC.
- Consultative process was carried out with engagement of stakeholders from all provinces and Areas including public and private sector, the Federal Government Educational Institutions (FGEIs) Cantts & Garrisons and the Deeni Madaris.

- Under Phase-I, first draft of SNC for Grade Pre I-V was developed and shared with all the provinces / Areas and Cambridge University for their input and feedback. Provincial and Area workshops were subsequently held in all federating units from November 2019 to January 2020.
- Services of Aga Khan University, Institute for Educational Development (AKU-IED) were hired to ensure value-addition of SNC and development of teacher training modules & assessment framework.
- Input and feedback received from all federating units, FGEIs, AKU-IED and Cambridge University were then collated and consolidated in the second draft of SNC. This formed the basis for discussions and consensus building during the National Conference on SNC from February 11-14, 2020.
- In the national conference, experts in eight subjects from all federating units in subject-based groups, thoroughly examined the second draft of SNC and deliberated on the inputs from all federating units to reach consensus on the contents and finalized the curriculum draft.
- First phase Curriculum for Grade Pre-I to V was presented to the Honourable Prime Minister on 19th March 2020, who expressed his satisfaction over the completion of the first phase within the given timeframe.
- After completion of textbooks on the basis of Single National Curriculum (SNC) Phase-I for Grade Pre-I to V, uniform curriculum at primary level will be implemented throughout the country from March 2021.
- Similar to first phase, SNC for Grade 6 to 8 will be developed and implemented throughout Pakistan by March 2022 and for 9 to 12 by March 2023.

Will the Minister for Federal Education and Professional Training, National Heritage and Culture be pleased to state whether it is a fact that passing threshold for HSSC examination is 45% but the minimum criteria for admission in public sector universities is 50% marks in HSSC, if so, the steps being taken by the Government to facilitate students with less than 50% marks in HSSC in getting admission in universities in the country?

Mr. Shafqat Mehmood:

Federal Board of Intermediate & Secondary Education (FBISE)

Federal Board of Intermediate & Secondary Education (FBISE) the passing threshold for HSSC examinations is 33% in each subject and as aggregate. It is moreover clarified that the threshold has never been raised from 33% to 45% throughout the history of FBISE.

Higher Education Commission (HEC)

Universities are self-governing institutions regulated in accordance with the provision of their Acts and rules framed their under. Maintaining good order and conducive learning, universities/HEIs determine minimum admission eligibility criteria at the undergraduate level, and Higher Education Commission (HEC) has no role in this regard.

In Professional disciplines viz. Engineering, Medical, Nursing, Pharmacy etc. the minimum required percentage for admission in the professional programmes are defined as per recommendations of the respective professional accreditation councils. For instance, minimum 60% marks in HSSC or equivalent exam are required for admission in Engineering and Physical Therapy Disciplines.

All other disciplines, where professional councils do not exist, the cut-off admission eligibility percentage is defined by universities as per their admission criteria.

Will the Minister for Maritime Affairs be pleased to state whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to establish Pakistan Islands Development Authority in the country, if so, the details thereof?

Syed Ali Haider Zaidi: The Pakistan Islands Development Authority has established for the development of barren Islands in the territorial waters of the country, to undertake residential / industrial / commercial / infrastructure projects in these Islands, which would contribute towards revival of fifty plus allied industries thereby generating large scale skilled employment opportunities. These Islands are facing erosion due to forces of nature besides their development is capital intensive requiring reclamation of land, establishing of road linkages, water recycling & sewerage treatment plants and utilities etc. Investors would commit only if a predictable safe, secure business environment and fiscal regime are in place.

2. The Pakistan Islands Development Authority Ordinance, 2020 has been promulgated on 31-08-2020 by the President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan (Annex-I). The Pakistan Islands Development Authority has been established under Ministry of Maritime Affairs, with the approval of Federal Cabinet decision in Case No. 636/Rule-19/2020 dated 04-09-2020 (Annex-II). Accordingly, the Ministry of Maritime Affairs has issued a notification regarding the establishment of Pakistan Islands Development Authority (Annex-III).

Mr. Murad Saeed: (a) The section of road between Lahore to Rawalpindi is being maintained mainly through routine maintenance contracts, periodic maintenance contracts & special maintenance contracts etc. Routine maintenance contracts are awarded and executed on yearly basis through which road is kept pothole free. Presently fifteen (15) Nos. routine maintenance contracts are in progress between Lahore-Rawalpindi section. Periodic maintenance works are executed at severely distressed portions. Four (04) Nos. periodic maintenance works are executed in last two years at following locations:—

(a) whether it is fact that Rawalpindi-Kohat Road is in dilapidated condition at present, if so, the reasons thereof;

- (b) the amount collected as toll tax from the commuters on the said road during the last seven years, with year wise break up indicating also the amount spent on the repairing of the said road out of the same;
- (c) the steps being taken by the Government for the repairing/ reconstruction of the said road, indicating also the amount earmarked for the same in the current fiscal year and the amount proposed to be allocated in the budget for next fiscal year; and
- (d) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to waive off the toll tax from the commuters on that road till its repairing / reconstruction, if not, the reasons thereof?

Mr. Murad Saeed: (a) Rawalpindi - Kohat section starts at Tarnol at Km 0+00 and it ends on Kohat at Km 146+00. Up to Km 108+00 *i.e.* Indus river, the jurisdiction falls under Punjab region while from Km 108+00 to onwards, it falls under jurisdiction of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa region. The up-gradation and maintenance of the road is prime responsibility of NHA for which Annual Maintenance Plan is prepared on annual basis and further as per the available constraint budgeting, work is being carried out in small sections. In this regard, it is pertinent to mention here that in previous AMPs, road section between Km 0+00 to Km 59+00 have been improved through Periodic Maintenance & Rehabilitation schemes and thus the road is in quite better condition. Further, Km 97+00 to onwards, the road has already been taken up for dualization under project for the CPEC Link road. However, allocations have been made in AMP 2017-18, 2018-19 & 2019-20 for repair and improvement of road stretches from Km 59+00 and onwards. Detail of which is as under:

As per NHA Tolling Policy, toll is a road user fee that commuters pay while traveling on NHA road network. Further the toll on said road is being collected as per notified toll rates of NHA. Therefore, exemption/relaxation in toll is not permissible to any commuter.

*Question No. 65 **Senator Mushtaq Ahmed:** (Notice Received on 24/09/2020 at 11:50 AM) QID: 37461

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination may be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Federal Cabinet has approved increase in the prices of 94 life saving drugs during its meeting held on 22nd September, 2020, if so, the reasons thereof?

Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination: (a) The Federal Cabinet has approved increase in the maximum retail price of 94 drugs under hardship category as per Drug Pricing Policy-2018. Notification of 94 drugs will be issued after vetting by Law and Justice Division.

(b) Complaints of shortage/ non-availability of many essential medicines were received. Reportedly some emergency drugs were being sold on much higher prices than the maximum retail prices. In addition, many companies filed Petitions in Sindh High Court and Hon'ble Court directed to decide their applications for increase in maximum retail prices under Drug Pricing Policy-2018. The Hon'ble Supreme Court of Pakistan vide its order dated 29th June, 2020 also directed that Federal Cabinet decide the matter expeditiously. Applications for increase in prices under hardship category were evaluated on the basis of prices of raw materials, packing materials and finished goods and it was noted that increase was justified on the basis of increase in raw materials/imported finished goods and devaluation of Pak rupee. Accordingly, Drug Pricing Committee (DPC) made recommendations under Drug Pricing Policy-2018 which were examined by Task Force on Health on the direction of Federal Cabinet and after its recommendation prices of 94 drugs were increased out of 110 drugs recommended by DPC.

*Question No. 66 **Senator Muhammad Ali Khan Saif:** (Notice Received on 24/09/2020 at 5:20 PM) QID: 37451

Will the Minister for Federal Education, Professional Training, National Heritage and Culture be pleased to state:

- (a) the details of foreign scholarships granted to various Pakistani students for higher education indicating the number of students, year, country, discipline of studies, dates of commencement and completion of course and expenditure on each degree separately;
- (b) the details of students who did not return to Pakistan but paid back the amount as per agreement between the student and HEC indicating the amount paid so far along with mode of currency; and
- (c) the details of students who did not return to Pakistan and also did not pay the amount as per agreement indicating the names of these students, payable amount and mode of currency and steps taken / being taken against these students.
- **Mr. Shafqat Mehmood:** (a) Since 2002 HEC granted **8,358** foreign scholarships to Pakistani students. Year-wise, discipline-wise, and country-wise data is enclosed at **Annex-I**.

Payments were made in multiple foreign currencies and the rate of conversion from 2002 to 2020 varies on each transaction, therefore the payment data is being presented in foreign currencies. The average cost of a five year PhD program is about USD\$ 24000/ per year, including an average of USD\$ 10,000 of the tuition fee and USD\$ 14000 of living expenses. Date of commencement and completion varies for each scholarship, but HEC pays the scholarship to Master student for 2 years and to PhD scholars 4-5 years.

(b) Out of 8,358 scholarships **7950** *i.e.* more than **95%** have either returned or are pursuing their studies satisfactorily.

Of the remaining 408 awardees *i.e.* **4.88%**, 87 scholars have paid back the scholarship amount plus penalty of up to 25%.

Notices were sent to the remaining 321 awardees and after their failure to reply legal cases were filed against them.

22 Cases have already been decided in HEC's favor and recovery process has been initiated, the other cases are still in court and are likely to be decided in HEC's favor.

In every scholarship program there is a small probability of failure or default. The default rate of 4% over a period of 18 years compares very well with other such scholarship programs.

Amount stands recovered: Pak Rs. 4.932 Million; GBP 0.354 Million; USD\$, 0.716 Million; Euro 2.104 Million; AUD\$ 0.010 Million; NZD\$ 0.093 Million.

Amount under recovery: Pak Rs. 26.906 Million; GBP 1.920 Million; USD\$2.260 Million; Euro 11.957 Million; AUD 0.589 Million; NZD\$ 3.378 Million and HEC is pursuing the case vigorously.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to refer to Senate Starred Question No. 37, replied on 26th April, 2019 and state the present status of the process of verification of educational certificates/degrees of the employees of the Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan?

Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination: Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan has initiated a process of degree verification of employees of DRAP *vide* circular No. F. 12-1/2019-Admn-I dated 09-04-2019. - (a) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to construct Motorways from Sialkot to Kharian and Kharian to Islamabad, if so, the details thereof; and
- (b) whether the Government has allocated any funds in the PSDP 2019-20 or proposed to allocate in PSDP 2020-21 for the said projects, if so, the details thereof?

Mr. Murad Saeed: (a) National Highway Authority intends to extend Lahore-Sialkot Motorway by building Sialkot-Kharian and Kharian - Rawalpindi Motorways on Build Operate Transfer (BOT) basis under PPP arrangement.

The total length of Sialkot - Kharian Section is 70 Km and Kharian-Rawalpindi Section is 115 Km.

The Draft Design and Commercial Feasibility Study for Sialkot-Kharian Motorway has been completed whereas the procurement for hiring of consultant for undertaking the feasibility study of Kharian-Rawalpindi is in progress.

As per the feasibility study of Sialkot-Kharian Section, the project is not viable on PPP arrangement without the significant Government Assistance in the form of Viability Gap Funding (VGF).

Therefore, for viability of the project, it was decided that the Feasibility Study of adjoining Kharian - Rawalpindi Motorway shall also be completed to obtain comprehensive study results for whole Sialkot - Rawalpindi Section. The same is under process.

Completion of design and commercial feasibility shall be followed by procurement of concessionaire for the project under PPP arrangement.

It is anticipated that the Feasibility study shall be completed by March, 2021 and the Contract may be Awarded by November, 2021.
