Will the Minister for Housing and Works be pleased to state the details of Government accommodations allotted to Government employees in Islamabad in relaxation of rules during the last two years?

**Chaudhary Tariq Bashir Cheema:** No allotment has been made to Government employees in relaxation of rules during last two years. At present all the allotments of Government accommodations are being made strictly on merit on maturity of turn from respective General Waiting List of the Federal Government Servants under Rule 6 & 7 of Accommodation Allocation Rules, 2002.

Will the Minister for Housing and Works be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that the facility of mosque / prayer hall has not been provided in the newly constructed PHAF flats in Sector G-10/2, Islamabad, if so, the reason thereof; and (b) whether it is also a fact that the residents of the said flats have to cross sewerage drain (nallah), which is without bridge, to go to the mosque in the nearby street, if so, the time by which a bridge would be constructed on that drain to facilitate the residents of those flats?

**Chaudhary Tariq Bashir Cheema:** (a) Construction of D-Type apartments at Sector G-10/2 under Prime Minister Housing Program was started on a piece of land measuring 6.90 acres acquired from CDA and layout plan was approved by CDA vide letter No. CDA/PLW-UP10(21) P.H.A / Housing Program / 08/3061 dated 12/09/2009 wherein there was no provision of mosque in the master layout plan (**Annex-A**).

(b) It is not factually correct that the residents of the flats have to cross Nallah for mosque. The mosques are mainly located in the adjacent area of G-10 Markaz. All the residents of G-10 Sector utilize the same facility.



Will the Minister Incharge of the Cabinet Division be pleased to state whether it is a fact that 3G and 4G internet services are not available in the merged districts of Ex-FATA in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, if so, the steps taken by the Government for provision of the said services to those areas indicating completion deadline thereof?

### Minister Incharge of the Cabinet Division:

1. Ministry of Information Technology and Telecommunication (MoIT&T) issued Policy Directive under Section 8 of Pakistan Telecommunication (Re-Organization) Act, 1996 *vide* letter No. 5-1/2009-DT dated 26th December 2009 regarding "Closure of Telecom Services due to National Security Concerns". Pursuant to the GoP Policy Directive,

Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) issued Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) vide letter No. 6-135/ 2010/ Enf/PTA dated 15th Feb. 2010, to service providers for handling the closure activity.

2. Ministry of Interior (MoI) on behalf of Government of Pakistan (GoP) being the initiator of such requests receives all requests and issues necessary instructions to PTA for implementation through concerned operators.

3. Currently, voice services are available in all districts of ex-FATA. Recently, in pursuance of Government's vision of providing internet services across the country, the same were restored in Bajaur, South Waziristan, Grakzai, Mohmand and Khyber Districts, whereas, internet services in Kurram and North Waziristan districts will be restored in phases after review of security situation by the quarters concerned. However, internet services in South Waziristan have been temporarily closed since 15th September 2021 due to operational requirements.

Will the Minister Incharge of the Establishment Division be pleased to state whether the officers of National Assembly, Senate, other constitutional bodies and services other than the occupational groups can be posted as Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners?

**Minister Incharge of the Establishment Division:** The posts of Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners are manned by the officers of Pakistan Administrative Service and Provincial Civil Services being their cadre posts as envisaged in the schedule appended with the Civil Service of Pakistan (Composition and Cadre) Rules, 1954 and service rules of Provincial Civil Services / Act of Provincial Assembly. Specifically Section 2 (r) and Section 3 of the Punjab Civil Administration Act, 2017 (**Annex-I**) which provides as under:

"2 (r) "Service" means Pakistan Administrative Service or Provincial Management Service Punjab.

3. Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners and Assistant Commissioner.—(1) The Government shall appoint a Commissioner for each Division a Deputy Commissioner for each District and an Assistant Commissioner for each Tehsil in the Punjab from amongst the officers of the Service."

### THE PUNJAB CIVIL ADMINISTRATION ACT 2017 (Act III of 2017)

[08 February 2017]

An Act to institute a comprehensive system of civil administration in the Punjab for efficient administration and improved service delivery to the people.

It is essential to institute a comprehensive system of civil administration in the Punjab for efficient administration, improved service delivery, better coordination, supervision and regulatory enforcement, and for ancillary matters.

Be it enacted by the Provincial Assembly of the Punjab as follows:

1. Short title, extent and commencement.- (1) This Act may be cited as the Punjab Civil Administration Act 2017.

- (2) It extends to whole of the Punjab.
- (3) It shall come into force at once.

2. Definitions .- In this Act, unless the subject or the context otherwise requires:

- "Additional Commissioner" means an officer appointed as Additional Commissioner under the Act;
- (b) "Additional Deputy Commissioner" means an officer appointed as Additional Deputy Commissioner under the Act;
- (c) "Assistant Commissioner" means an officer appointed as Assistant Commissioner under the Act;
- (d) "Commissioner" means an officer appointed as Commissioner under the Act;
- "Deputy Commissioner" means an officer appointed as Deputy Commissioner under the Act;
- "Division", "District" and "Tehsil" respectively mean the Division, the District and the Tehsil constituted under the Punjab Land Revenue Act, 1967 (XVII of 1967);
- (g) "employee" means a person performing duties in an office;
- (h) "Government" means Government of the Punjab;
- "head of District Police" means the head of the district police appointed under the Police Order, 2002 (22 of 2002);
- "head of the local government" means the Mayor or a Chairman of a local government under the Punjab Local Government Act 2013 (XVIII of 2013);
- (k) "head of office" means the head of an office in the Tehsil, District or, as the case may be, the Division;
- "local government" means a local government constituted under the Punjab Local Government Act 2013 (XVIII of 2013);
- (m) "office" means such office of the Government in the Tehsil, District or, as the case may be, the Division as the Government may, by notification, specify for purposes of the Act but does not include any office of the local government established by or under the Punjab Local Government Act 2013 (XVIII of 2013) or of the Police constituted by or under the Police Order, 2002 (22 of 2002);
- "officer-in-charge" means the officer incharge of, and responsible for, maintaining a public facility;
- (o) "prescribed" means prescribed by rules made under the Act;
- (p) "public facility" means such office or public facility or work relating to such office of the Government in the Tehsil, District or, as the case may be, the Division as the Government may, by notification, specify but does not include any office or public facility or work relating to the local government established by or under the Punjab Local Government Act 2013 (XVIII of 2013) or of the Police constituted by or under the Police Order, 2002 (22 of 2002);
- (q) "rules" means the rules made under the Act; and

 "Service" means Pakistan Administrative Service or Provincial Management Service Punjab.

3. Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners and Assistant Commissioners.- (1) The Government shall appoint a Commissioner for each Division, a Deputy Commissioner for each District and an Assistant Commissioner for each Tehsil in the Punjab from amongst the officers of the Service.

(2) A Commissioner shall be the officer-in-charge of general administration and principal representative of the Government in the Division.

(3) A Deputy Commissioner shall be the officer-in-charge of general administration and principal representative of the Government in the District.

(4) An officer appointed under subsection (1) shall perform the functions and exercise the powers under this Act or any other law or as the Government may, by order or notification, assign or delegate.

(5) The Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner shall be subject to general superintendence and control of the Government.

 Functions of the Commissioner. – A Commissioner, in addition to any function under subsection (4) of section 3 and section 15, shall:

- (a) supervise and monitor the discharge of duties by the Deputy Commissioners in the Division;
- (b) coordinate the work of all the offices and public facilities in the Division;
- (c) facilitate and coordinate any work which concerns two or more Districts in the Division or two or more Divisions for purposes of integrated development, efficient use of public resources and effective service delivery; and
- supervise and coordinate the implementation of the policies, instructions and guidelines of the Government,

5. Functions of the Deputy Commissioner. A Deputy Commissioner, in addition to the functions mentioned in subsection (4) of section 3 and section 15, shall:

- supervise and monitor the discharge of duties by the Assistant Commissioners in the District;
- (b) coordinate the work of all the offices and public facilities in the district for purposes of integrated development, efficient use of public resources and effective service delivery;
- (c) support and facilitate the offices and public facilities in the District;
- ensure that the standards set by the Government in respect of a public facility are fully observed; and
- supervise and coordinate the implementation of the policies, instructions and guidelines of the Government.

6. Functions of the Additional Commissioners and Additional Deputy Commissioners.- (1) The Government may appoint one or more Additional Commissioner in each Division and one or more Additional Deputy Commissioner in each District from amongst the officers of the Service.

(2) An Additional Commissioner shall serve under the general administration and control of the Commissioner and shall perform the functions under this Act or any other law or as the Commissioner may, by order, assign.

(3) An Additional Deputy Commissioner or an Assistant Commissioner shall serve under the general supervision and control of the Deputy Commissioner and shall perform functions under the Act or any other law or as the Deputy Commissioner may, by order, assign.

(4) An Assistant Commissioner may distribute work among the officers subordinate to him in the manner and to the extent prescribed.

 Vacancy.- In case the office of a Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner or Assistant Commissioner is vacant, the Government shall make appropriate arrangement for the discharge of the functions of that office.

8. Code of Conduct.- (1) The Government may issue a Code of Conduct in relation to the exercise of

authority and discharge of functions under this Act.

(2) Any deviation from the Code of Conduct or any violation of any lawful directions under the Act shall be referred to such authority as may be prescribed for action in accordance with law.

9. Information.- (1) A Commissioner shall keep the Government informed on all important matters relating to the Divisional administration.

(2) A Deputy Commissioner shall keep the Commissioner informed on all important matters relating to the District administration.

(3) An Assistant Commissioner shall keep the Deputy Commissioner informed on all important matters relating to the Tehsil administration.

(4) A head of office in the District shall keep the Deputy Commissioner informed on all important matters relating to that office.

10. Coordination Committees.- The Government may constitute Divisional, District or Tehsil Coordination Committees consisting of such heads of local governments, members of National Assembly and Provincial Assembly, heads of Division, District and Tehsil administrations and police and such other persons as may be specified to achieve the goals of good governance, effective service delivery, public welfare and better coordination through democratic control and oversight.

11. Assistance.- On a request by a head of office or head of a local government, the Deputy Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioner shall extend such assistance and support as may be necessary in the circumstances.

12. Public facilities.- (1) The Deputy Commissioner may, from time to time, review the quality, standard and efficacy of public facilities in the District.

(2) If the Deputy Commissioner, for reasons to be recorded, is of the view that the public service is not being delivered on the prescribed or reasonable standards, he may require the officer-in-charge to take such measures as may be necessary for improving the quality, standard and efficacy of the public facility.

(3) The officer-in-charge shall take prompt remedial steps and inform the Deputy Commissioner of the action taken by him.

(4) If the officer-in-charge does not take remedial steps as advised, the Deputy Commissioner may, through the Commissioner, make a report to the Government for necessary action in accordance with law.

13. Calamities.- (1) The Government may, by notification, declare the whole or any part of the Province, as the case may be, as calamity-affected area under section 3 of the Punjab National Calamities (Prevention and Relief) Act 1958 (XXXIII of 1958).

(2) On issuance of the notification mentioned in subsection (1), the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner or officers subordinate to them may, in consultation with the respective head of the local government, exercise such powers within the area of their respective jurisdiction as the Relief Commissioner may delegate to them under section 7 of the said Act.

(3) All the offices in the District or, as the case may be, in the Division shall extend such assistance to the officer mentioned in subsection (2) as he may require or as may be necessary in the circumstances.

(4) On a request by or on behalf of the Deputy Commissioner, the local governments in the district shall also render such assistance to the Deputy Commissioner or officers subordinate to him as may be necessary in the circumstances.

14. Record and inspection.- (1) On a complaint or otherwise, the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner may call for the record of any case from any office in the Division or, as the case may be, the District to satisfy himself as to the propriety or legality of any action taken or proposed to be taken by any office and pass appropriate directions in accordance with law.

(2) The Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner may inspect any office or public facility within his jurisdiction, and give such directions as may be necessary to achieve the objectives of this Act.

(3) It shall be the duty of every head of office and officer-in-charge to facilitate inspection and provide record, information, report and otherwise assist the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner or

Assistant Commissioner.

15. Public order etc.- (1) The Deputy Commissioner on his own, or on the request of the head of a local government or head of the District Police, may convene a meeting for purposes of maintaining public order and public safety and safeguarding public or private properties in the District; and, the decisions taken in the meeting shall be executed by all concerned accordingly.

(2) Notwithstanding anything in subsection (1), in case of any unforeseen or sudden situation that threatens or is likely to threaten public order, public safety or public and private properties in the District, the Deputy Commissioner and the head of the District Police shall jointly take appropriate action to address the situation.

(3) The provisions of subsection (1) and subsection (2) shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner respectively in relation to the Division and the Tehsil.

16. Public processions etc.- (1) No public meeting, procession, assembly or gathering shall take place without prior permission in writing of the Deputy Commissioner.

(2) On receipt of an application for the purpose, the Deputy Commissioner, in consultation with the head of District Police, may grant permission subject to such terms and conditions as he deems fit or reject the application after recording reasons.

(3) The Deputy Commissioner may, in consultation with the head of the respective local government, requisition such assistance of the local government as may be necessary in the circumstances.

17. Public properties.- (1) The Deputy Commissioner shall oversee the use of all public properties in the district and where required direct the concerned head of office or officer incharge for the proper maintenance and use of a property or safeguarding it against illegal trespass, undue wastage or destruction.

(2) The Deputy Commissioner may exercise the powers of the Government under the Punjab Government Lands and Buildings (Recovery of Possession) Ordinance 1966 (IX of 1966), and the powers of an autonomous body under the Punjab Autonomous Bodies Immovable Property (Ejectment of Unauthorized Occupants) Ordinance, 1965 (XXXVII of 1965).

(3) The Deputy Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner shall oversee the use of public space in their respective jurisdictions and where required, in consultation with the respective head of the local government, cause the obstructions removed in accordance with law, allow and define use of public space for public meeting, procession, assembly or gathering and other temporary uses and otherwise prevent it from illegal use, and for the purpose pass such directions in accordance with law as may be considered necessary.

(4) The Deputy Commissioner shall maintain a registry of all public properties in such form as may be prescribed or as the Government may direct.

18. Police support.- On the requisition from the Assistant Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner or on receipt of a request for police assistance from any head of office, head of the local government, statutory body or body or corporation owned, set up or controlled by the Government or the Federal Government in relation to discharge of official duties, the head of the District Police shall provide such police assistance as may be necessary.

19. Enquiry.- (1) The Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner may, on a complaint or any other information, cause an enquiry to be made by such officer as he may deem appropriate, into the affairs of an office or a public facility and take appropriate action in accordance with law.

(2) Any person aggrieved by any case of maladministration, neglect, excess or misconduct by any employee serving in a District or is dissatisfied with a public service may make a complaint in writing under his signature to the Deputy Commissioner.

(3) The Deputy Commissioner may either himself or through an officer subordinate to him take such action in accordance with law as may be necessary to redress the legitimate grievance of the complainant.

(4) It shall be the duty of every head of office and officer-in-charge of the public facility to comply with the directions under subsection (3) and shall report compliance to the Deputy Commissioner or inform him of the reasons on account of which the direction cannot be implemented.

(5) On receipt of the report from a head of office or officer-in-charge of a public facility, the Deputy Commissioner may either withdraw the direction or, if he is not satisfied with the reasons, report the matter to the Government for action in accordance with law.

(6) The inquiry officer shall, for purposes of the inquiry, have all the powers of a civil court under the Civil Procedure Code, 1908 (V of 1908) in relation to summoning and enforcing the attendance of any person and examining him on oath, compelling the production of documents, receiving evidence on affidavits, and issuing commission for the examination of witnesses.

20. Statistics.- For purposes of better coordination and effective planning, the Deputy Commissioner shall maintain or cause to be maintained such updated local statistics in such manner as may be prescribed and until so prescribed as the Government may direct.

21. Performance evaluation.- The Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner, through the Commissioner, shall report the performance of the offices and, if necessary, of the employees under their respective jurisdiction to the Government in such manner and at such intervals as the Government may, by notification, determine.

22. Reports.- (1) Every head of office shall prepare and submit a periodic report on the working of his office to the Deputy Commissioner at such time and in such form as may be prescribed.

(2) The Deputy Commissioner shall prepare a consolidated report on the working of all offices in the district and shall, through the Commissioner, submit the report of each financial year to the Government at such time and in such form as may be prescribed.

(3) The Government may take such action on the report as it deems necessary.

23. District Gazetteer.- (1) The Deputy Commissioner shall make arrangements for formulating for each financial year the District Gazetteer and shall publish it after approval by the Commissioner.

(2) The District Gazetteer shall contain information about the socio-cultural and economic activities, the developmental goals accomplished, key features of governance, key indicators, the future plans and any other matter of public importance or interest.

24. Delegation of powers.- (1) The Government may, by notification, delegate such of its powers to its officers in the district as it considers appropriate in the interest of effective, efficient and economical delivery of public services subject to such conditions, if any, as may be specified in the order.

(2) In the like manner, the Government may by notification, place such of its employees, excluding the employees of the Police Department and the local governments, under the administrative control of the Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner.

25. District Account and Audit.- (1) There shall be an account in respect of each District to be called the 'District Account' which shall vest in the Deputy Commissioner for undertaking development, improvement of public services in general, provision of relief in emergencies or such other purposes as may be prescribed.

(2) All moneys received by the Deputy Commissioner shall be credited to the District Account under a head of account authorized by the Controller General of Accounts.

(3) The Deputy Commissioner shall maintain the Account and expend money from the Account for such purposes and in such manner as may be prescribed.

(4) The District Account shall be audited by the Auditor General at the end of each financial year.

(5) In addition to the audit, under subsection (3), the Government may direct that a special audit of the District Account shall be conducted by such auditors and in such manner as may be prescribed and until, so prescribed, as determined by the Government.

26. Transparency and due diligence.- The Government may prescribe arrangements to ensure that the functions and powers under this Act are discharged diligently and in a transparent manner.

27. Divisional Boards.- (1) The Government may constitute for each Division the Grievance Redress

Board consisting of the Convener and two other members.

(2) The Board may enquire into serious cases of maladministration, corruption and corrupt practices, violation of law, dereliction from duty and any other act or omission detrimental to the public interest by the employees of the Government and the employees and elected representatives of a local government in the prescribed manner.

(3) The Board shall submit its report and recommendations to the Government for necessary action in accordance with law.

28. Indemnity.- No suit, prosecution, or other legal proceedings shall lie against any public servant for anything done in good faith under this Act.

29. Power to make rules.- The Government may, by notification in the official Gazette, make rules for carrying out the purposes of this Act.

30. Removal of difficulties.- The Government may, by order in writing, provide for the removal of any difficulty which may arise in giving effect to the provisions of this Act within a period of one year of the commencement of the Act.

31. Repeal.- The Punjab Civil Administration Ordinance 2016 (XX of 2016) is hereby repealed.

**Minister Incharge of the Establishment Division:** The officers of PAS are posted as Chief Secretaries of the four provinces by Establishment Division, Government of Pakistan in consultation with the provinces in terms of Rule 15 (iv) of the Civil Service of Pakistan (Composition and Cadre) Rules, 1954 (Annex-I) read with Para 2 (iv) and (vi) of Inter-Provincial Agreement of 1993 reached between Federal and Provincial Governments (Annex-II). Likewise, transfer / posting of Chief Secretary, Azad Government of the State of Jammu and Kashmir is made in terms of Clause (viii) of Karachi Agreement, 1949, (Annex-III). However, transfer / posting of Chief Secretary, Gilgit-Baltistan is made by the Prime Minister being the competent authority. Under the existing framework, officers of National Assembly, Senate, other constitutional bodies and services other than the Pakistan Administrative Service cannot be posted as Chief Secretaries of the four provinces, Gilgit-Baltistan and AJK.

Will the Minister for Housing and Works be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is fact that the Federal Government Employees Housing Authority had lunched Bara Kaho Green Enclave Phase-I, Housing Scheme in 2009 on first come first serve basis;
- (b) whether it is also a fact the Federal Government Employees Housing Authority Islamabad has recently increased the prices of plots of Bara Kaho Green Enclave Phase-I scheme by 50%, if so, its reasons; and
- (c) the category-wise prices of plots of this scheme at the time of its commencement, and the subsequent number of times and percentage of increase in the prices of the said plots?

### **Chaudhary Tariq Bashir Cheema:** (a) Yes.

(b) Yes, the Supreme Court of Pakistan in a *Suo-Moto* Notice No. 4/2011 taken in 2011 decided on 27-02-2013 that there would be no increase in cost escalation on any account. However, in Criminal Original Petition 8/2014, the Supreme Court of Pakistan in its judgment dated 02-06-2014 clarified that the issue of construction agreement was not the part of earlier proceedings in *Suo-Moto* case No. 04/2011. Hence, contempt petition filed by the FGEHA against the developer was dismissed. In light of the Judgment of Supreme Court of Pakistan, the cost of the plots has been increased after the construction agreement signed between FGEHA and M/s Green Tree (Pvt.) Ltd. on revised estimates/ BOQ with the approval of decision of 158th meeting of the Executive Committee held on 18-03-2019.

(c) The cost of plots has been increased upto 50% only once in the light of decision of 158th meeting of Executive Committee held on 18-03-2019. The original schedule of payment is at **Annex-A** whereas, the revised/increase in schedule of payment is at **Annex-B**.

- b. The JV partner mutated 6025 kanals of land in favor of FGEHA.
- c. Layout plan has been approved by FGE Housing Authority on 28-04-2020.
- d. Due to NAB's intervention, the process of allotment was effected. However, NAB has cleared 1986 Kanals of Land at Mouza Kathar and granted NOC for allotment up to the extent of 1986 Kanals. Due to shortfall in land, fewer numbers of members are accommodated.
- e. The members who had deposited down payment in 2015-16 are being given priority in allotment of available plots in 1986 kanals of land in Mouza Kathar. The remaining members will be accommodated in future schemes of FGE Housing Authority.

(b) No such proposal is under consideration at present. However, as per Summary approved by the Federal Cabinet in its meeting held on 07-07-2020, 40% quota will be for Federal Government Employees in Sector F-12/G-12 and allotment will be issued as per waiting list of Membership Drive-II members, on agewise seniority basis purely according to approved quota policy of FGEHA.

- (a) whether it is a fact that the incumbent D.G. Civil Aviation Authority is not a professional having experience in Aviation field but rather an officer of Pakistan Administrative Service, if so, reasons thereof; and
- (b) whether it is a fact that advertisement for filling up the position of D.G. CAA has not yet been finalized, if so, reasons thereof and deadline of finalization and floating of advertisement thereof?

**Mr. Ghulam Sarwar Khan**: (a) The current DG CAA was appointed by Federal Government as defined in clause 09 of PCAA Ordinance 1982, the same is reproduced as under:-

"The Federal Government shall appoint the Director General who shall be the Executive Head of the Authority and shall exercise such powers and perform functions as may be specified under subsection (7) of section 5 or delegated to him by the Board from time to time."

(b) The advertisement for the post of DG CAA was advertised on 4th and 5th July, 2020 and after completing the process eighteen (18) candidates were interviewed by the Selection Committee headed by Minister for Aviation. However, no suitable candidate was found. Therefore, a Summary for the Cabinet was moved by the Aviation Division on 26-10-2020 seeking permission for re-advertisement of the post of DG CAA and extension in the Additional Charge of DG CAA assigned to Secretary Aviation Division. The Federal Government approved the extension in Additional Charge of post of DG CAA held by Secretary Aviation Division for further 90 days or till appointment of regular incumbent whichever was earlier. On 27-11-2020, the Federal Government appointed Flt. Lt. Khaqan Murtaza, a BS-21 officer of Pakistan Administrative Service, as DG CAA. \*Question No. 6 Senator Professor Sajid Mir: (Notice Received on 4/10/2021 at 2:15 PM) QID: 38354

Will the Minister for Housing and Works be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that different quota wise lists/registrations are being maintained by the FGEHA to allocate plots to Federal Government Employees, if so, its justification; and
- (b) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to maintain combine age-wise list of all Federal Government employees and abolish all types of quotas other than the Federal Government Employees quota, if so, the details thereof?

**Chaudhary Tariq Bashir Cheema:** (a) Yes, quota/category-wise lists to allocate plots/apartments to FG employees and other specified group are being maintained in FGEHA. These quotas have been earmarked with the approval of Executive Committee to rationalize the schemes of FGEHA and to accommodate various other specified groups as per objective of FGEHA. The details of quota-wise distribution as per decision of 133rd and 142nd meeting of Executive Committee held on 17-06-2015 and 28-09-2016 respectively are at **Annex-A**.

(b) In pursuance of the order of Islamabad High Court, the quota policy of FGEHA was placed before the Federal Cabinet in its meeting held on 07-09-2021 *vide* Summary titled "Land Acquisition and Allotment Policy-FGEHA". The Federal Cabinet referred the matter to a Sub-Committee in order to examine/formulate the allotment policy of FGEHA. The recommendations of the Sub-Committee are awaited.

# DETAIL SHOWING QUOTA-WISE PERCENTAGE OF ALLOTMENT IN MEMBERSHIP DRIVE-I AND II

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\*Question No. 7 Senator Zeeshan Khanzada: (Notice Received on 4/10/2021 at 3:45 PM) QID: 38372

*Will the Minister Incharge of the Cabinet Division be pleased to state:* 

- (a) the mechanism for regularly checking calling rates and provision of customer care services by the cellular companies operating in Pakistan; and
- (b) the policy for monitoring of complaints redressal system of cellular companies using electronic money transfers / transactions?

**Minister Incharge of the Cabinet Division:** (a) Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) carries out billing verification exercise on regular basis to verify the accuracy of charging mechanism of Cellular Mobile Operators (CMOs) for voice 86 SMS services through "NEMO" tool. The purpose of this exercise is to assess whether actual/accurate charges from consumers are deducted by CMOs as against advertised tariffs or otherwise. All standard prepaid packages, *i.e.*, 60 seconds (one minute), 30 seconds and 20 seconds offered by CMOs are checked on regular basis. Furthermore, PTA has also published billing advisory in different newspaper to create awareness on billing issues and avail mobile broadband services at affordable rates (copy attached). In case of any violation, legal action is initiated by PTA against the mobile operators.

Regarding provision of customer care services, it is informed that every CMO has made available dedicated helpline numbers for providing information to their subscribers and addressing consumer complaints. Furthermore, CMOs have also introduced Mobile Applications such as Jazz World, Telenor My Telenor App, Ufone's My Ufone, Zong My Zong. Through these applications, subscribers can obtain billing details as well as opt for any packages/bundles/promotions. Cellular mobile operators are also addressing consumer complaints through social media, *i.e.*, Facebook, Twitter, WhatsApp.

(b) It is clarified that all commercial and micro finance banks (*e.g.* Mobilink Micro Finance Bank, Telenor Micro Finance Bank and U Micro Finance Bank) are being regulated by State Bank of Pakistan

(SBP) and micro finance banks are separate legal entities than Cellular Mobile Operators. Although CMOs are providing their platform for mobile banking transactions but actually banking/financial transactions are authenticated by respective bank. The mobile banking related complaints on money Transfer or Transaction/grievances are handled by the respective micro finance bank (or) may be escalated to SBP for its resolution. Therefore, the response may be sought from SBP.

*Will the Minister for Climate Change be pleased to state:* 

- (a) whether it is a fact that Pakistan is facing up to \$3.8 billion per year economic loss due to climate change effects, if so, its details; and
- (b) the steps being taken by the incumbent Government to minimize these estimated losses in the long run?

**Ms. Zartaj Gul:** (a & b) Reference Council & Coord U. No. 2-34/212, dated 15-10-2021 on the ) above mentioned subject and to state that being amongst the most vulnerable countries Pakistan is

facing extreme effects of Climate Change. The floods of 2010, 2011 were also cause of Climate Change which caused severe damages to property of mass public resulting into economic losses. There are different studies which show different figures of economic losses due to Climate Change. For instance, Pakistan was ranked number three in the 2012 assessment of the Global Climate Risk Index 2014 with over 6 billion USD-PPP losses due to CC.

However, Ministry of Climate Change has taken the following initiatives to minimize these effects.

### 10 Billion Tree Tsunami Project

• 10BIT Project is built on highly successful initiative of KPK's Billion Trees Afforestation Project (BTAP). The outcomes of BTAP have been duly acknowledged by World Economic Forum, United Nations Environment Programme, Bonn Challenge and other international bodies and fora. Following the success and confirmation by the independent monitors, Government of Pakistan decided to set a goal of 10 Billion Tree Plantation across the country. This wider project is expected to deliver dividend in preserving atmospheric health, reducing greenhouse gas effects, lowering cases of random floods, lowering rains, droughts and enhancing other biodiversity supportive actions.

### Eco-system Restoration Initiative

 Government of Pakistan has launched the Eco-system Restoration Initiative (ESRI) for (i) facilitating transition towards environmentally resilient Pakistan by main streaming adaptation and mitigation through ecologically targeted initiatives covering Afforestation, biodiversity conservation, enabling and enhancing policy environment consistent with the objectives outlined in Pakistan's Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC); and (ii) attaining Land Degradation Neutrality (LDN) by restoring at least 30% of degraded forest, 5% of degraded cropland, 6% of degraded grassland (rangeland) and 10% of degraded wetlands in Pakistan by 2030 to generate eco-system services and provide additional support to mitigation of GHG in Pakistan. The initiative also seeks to establish an independent, transparent and comprehensive financial mechanism in Pakistan called "Eco-system Restoration Fund (ESRF)" to finance the projects and programmes under the initiative.

### Recharge Pakistan

Pakistan is a country without a choice on climate adaptation as it is facing up to the impacts at ground "zero". Our climate adaptation needs are between \$7 to \$14 billion per annum and this is all forced adaptation. This, subsequently, makes climate compatible development an inevitable direction to take and building resilience of our vulnerable communities as well as our infrastructure, an undeniable option. Pakistan is launching this new initiative titled; "Recharge Pakistan through Integrated Flood Risk Management and Building Resilience to Climate Change through Eco-system-based Adaptation". The components of the project are; (a) Ecosystem-based Adaptation for Integrated Flood Risk and Water Resources Management, (b) Enhancing Resilience of Vulnerable Communities to Climate Change, (c) Enabling a Paradigm Shift towards Eco-system-based Adaptation in Pakistan. The project would impact around 10 million vulnerable people at reduced risk from floods and benefit from climate-adapted livelihoods by year 2030.

### National Electric Vehicle Policy

- In order to mitigate the negative impacts of automobile sector on environment and giving a boost to the economy, Government of Pakistan has approved its National Electric Vehicle Policy targeting a 30% shift to electric by 2030. In addition, world's first "zero emissions" metro line project has been launched in the city of Karachi.
- Most recently, Government of Pakistan has announced shifting to Euro-V petrol from 1st September 2020.

### Clean Green Pakistan Movement

- "Clean Green Pakistan Movement" has been launched with a vision to drive a nationwide movement by the people of Pakistan for the clean and green environment for all citizens of the country. A "Clean-Green Cities Index" has been initiated in 20 cities to trigger a shift towards improved waste management and sanitation. Concurrently, Pakistan has decided to get out of its plastic addiction by banning the single use plastic bags which is now being enforced across the country.
- Recently, Prime Minister of Pakistan launched "Protected Area Initiative" to develop 15 model Protected Areas across country to conserve over 7295.549 Sq km of land area as well as Green Stimulus creation of over 5,500 jobs.
- Greening of CPEC initiative is underway through which a planned coal power plant is being replaced with 02 renewable energy projects to reduce carbon footprints.

3. During the current situation of pandemic COVID-19, Ministry of Climate Change has launched Green Economic Stimulus which aims at promoting environmental activities which can also have economic impacts. The Stimulus would focus on creating livelihood opportunities for daily wagers in the forestry and waste management sectors. Subsequently, Ministry of Climate Change has developed a Post-Covid Response Plan which focuses on a just transition towards Greener / environment friendly activities.

### <u>GLOF</u>

Ministry of Climate Change to reduce the impacts to Climate Change implemented Glacial Lake Outburst Flood GLOF risk reduction in Northern Pakistan. The objective of the project is to strengthen resilience of communities that are likely to be effected by GLOF. MoCC has initiated US\$ 37 million project funded by GCF for GLOF II for 12 valleys in 15 districts of KPK and GB from 2018 to 2023. Initial assessment for 15 small scale infrastructure projects (Flood Protection Walls, Check dams, others) in KPK has been done. Initial assessment for 15 water efficient irrigation systems in GB and KP has also been completed and activities under work plan for 2020-21 are underway.

### Climate Resilient Agriculture

US\$ 35 million GCF grant was signed with FAO for 8 districts in Punjab and Sindh for transforming the Indus Basin with Climate Resilient Agriculture and water management targeted to provide nature solutions to small and subsistence farmers. Project is to be implemented from 2020 to 2026 and activity plan for first year has been prepared. PC I with provincial government is under approval.

# Hosting of United Nations World Environment Day, 5th June, 2021

Government of Pakistan is hosting the United Nations World Environment Day 2021. The day is observed each year on 5th June. Celebrated since the last 40 years, the observance is meant to raise awareness about environmental issues. Each year, the World Environment Day centers on a particular theme. This year, the specific theme of WED is **'Eco-system Restoration'**. Pakistan is pleased to host this highly prestigious and important event in 2021, with the hope that the world will continue to come together and work towards a sustainable future for all.

The Ministry of Climate Change with United Nations Environment Programme Office will carry out numerous activities to mark the day in a befitting manner. It includes engagements with public and private sector, education institutions, civil society etc. on the overall theme of Eco-system Restoration. This will culminate on high level engagement from Pakistan to be telecasted globally through electronic and social media.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Pakistan is assessed to be one of the most vulnerable countries in the world to climate change (CC). Pakistan's extreme vulnerability from CC is understandable owing to its geographic, demographic and diverse climatic conditions. Of particular concern are the CC threats to water, energy and food security due to the inherent arid climate coupled with the high degree of reliance on water from glacial snowmelt. Its impacts are being felt through increasing intensity and frequency of extreme climatic disastrous events, as

well as small, but incremental changes insidiously affecting many sectors of government activity. Globally, the impacts of CC are expected to constrain economic growth and gross domestic product (GDP). Pakistan's high vulnerability means that costs are likely to be relatively high in Pakistan compared to the rest of South Asia where impacts on vulnerable sectors are already predicted to be enormous. Some assessments suggest that Pakistan already faces significant economic losses due to CC.

### THE CPEIR APPROACH

The CPEIR approach determines a CC budget that is aggregated from budget expenditure lines across all relevant Government institutions. The focus of the Pakistan CPEIR was on the federal and one provincial government budget. The budget data was selected from 2010–2014. The analysis has revealed climate-related resource allocation patterns that have never been seen before.

The CPEIR aims to equip Government policy-makers with an evidence base, an assessment of the allocation of public resources (domestic and international) and the institutional setup in place to respond to CC at the country level.

In response to these challenges, the Government of Pakistan (GoP) ratified the National Climate Change Policy (NCCP) in 2012, which aims to ensure that CC is mainstreamed in the economically and socially vulnerable sectors of the economy, and to steer Pakistan towards climate-resilient development. In 2012, the Ministry of Climate Change (MCC) expressed an interest in undertaking a Climate Public Expenditure and Institutional Review (CPEIR) to assess the level at which the GoP has so far been able to respond to the challenges of CC, and to identify opportunities for further strengthening its response.

This section summarizes the CPEIR's findings and recommendations and gives an overview of the policy, Institutional, and financial aspects of climate actions. Finally, it gives recommendations for the CC reform agenda in Pakistan. The study includes an assessment at the federal level, as well as in one province, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP).

### A. CC response in Pakistan requires major investment

CC has been recognized in Pakistan as a core component of the economic growth model which is required for growth, poverty reduction and the wellbeing of the population. This is embedded in national economic policies such as the Framework for Economic Growth (FEG), 2011, Vision 2025 and the accompanying Medium-Term Development Plan (2010-2015). The National Strategy for Sustainable Development (developed 2012) also positions CC centrally in the sustainable development trajectory, although the strategy is so far unratified For instance, Pakistan was ranked per threelin the 2012 assessment of the Global Climate Risk index 2014 with over 6 billion USD-PPP IC sses due to CO

### **Green Climate Fund (GCF)**

### **Total Approved GCF Funding: USD 124 million**

### **ONGOING:**

### (1) Scaling-up of Glacial Lake Outburst Flood (GLOF) Risk Reduction in Northern Pakistan (GCF Grant USD 37 million) UNDP.

The project objective is to reduce the vulnerability of the communities in Northern Pakistan to climate change-induced natural disaster risks as a result of GLOFs. The project targeted area is eight districts of Gilgit-Baltistan (Skardu, Shigar, Kharmang, Ghanche, Ghizer, Gligit, Hunza, Nagar, Diamer, Astore) and five districts of KP (Chitral, Dir, Swat, Kohistan, Mansehra). The main activities include 250 small-scale engineering structures (check dams, mini dams, ponds, spillways, slope stabilization), Installation of 50 weather-monitoring stations (28 in

GB and 22 in KPK) and Installation of 408 river discharge gauges/sensors (238 in GB and 170 KPK).

### (2) Transforming the Indus Basin with Climate Resilient Agriculture and Climate-Smart Water Management (GCF Grant USD 35 million) FAO.

The project objective is to transform agriculture in the Basin by increasing resilience among the most vulnerable farmers and strengthening Government's capacity to support their communities to adapt. To do this, the project will develop the country's capacity to get and use the information it needs to cope with the impacts of climate change on agriculture and water management by putting in place state-of-the art technology (**Component 1**). It will build farmers resilience to climate change through skills, knowledge and technology (**Component 2**), and create a wider enabling environment for continuous adaptation and expanded sustainable uptake of climate-resilient approaches (**Component 3**). The project will be implemented in eight districts in Punjab (Dera Ghazi Khan, Muzaffargarh, Multan, Lodhran, Khanewal and Sindh) Badin, Umer Kot, Sanghar Provinces over a six-year period at a total cost of USD 47.69 million.

### (3) UNEP GCF Readiness proposal "Building Capacity to Advance National Adaptation Process" (GCF Grant USD 3 million) UNEP

Readiness proposal objective is development and enhancement of the 'country's capacity' to coordinate and promote Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) at systemic, institutional and individual levels; and help poor and climate vulnerable communities in adapting to and building resilience to adverse impacts of climate change; the integration of CCA into existing and new policies, strategies, legal frameworks (legislation and regulations) and programmes; and development of a strategy to implement, monitor and communicate adaptation benefits at different levels and scale up government efforts in adaptation efforts, and process of regularly updating National Adaptation Plan (NAP).

### **APPROVED:**

(4) **Green BRT-Karachi (USD 49 million** GCF Grant USD 11.8 & Loan USD 37.2 million).

The project aims to establish a 30 km, fully segregated Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system operated with bio methane hybrid buses and a dedicated biogas plant for fuel supply, directly benefiting 1.5 million people in Karachi, Pakistan.

### **Global Environment Facility (GEF)**

### Total Ongoing GEF projects: USD 19.4 million

### **ONGOING:**

### (1) Sustainable Forest Management to Secure Multiple Benefits in High Conservation Value Forests (GEF Grant USD 9.3 million) UNDP.

The project objective is to promote sustainable forest management in Pakistan's Western Himalayan Temperate Coniferous, Sub-tropical broad-leaved evergreen thorn (Scrub) and Riverine forests for biodiversity conservation, mitigation of climate change and securing of forest eco-system services. In particular, it aims at implementation of three interrelated and mutually complementary components that are focussed at addressing the barriers of inadequate planning, regulatory and institutional frameworks to integrated forest resource management, and the limited experience among key government and civil society stakeholders in developing and implementing SFM practices on the ground.

**Component 1** will support the incorporation of sustainable forest management objectives and safeguards in forest management planning, forestland allocation and compliance of monitoring systems at the local level. **Component 2** will identify, demarcate and implement on-the-ground approaches to improving management of high conservation value forests within seven landscapes of Punjab, Sindh and KP covering an area of 67,861 ha with the aim of meeting the life requisites of the target species, and habitats such as breeding areas, feeding areas, water sources, dispersal and connectivity corridors, etc. **Component 3** will develop practical approaches to enhancing carbon sequestration through restoring degraded and former forested areas (LULUCF activities) by a combination of restoration and reforestation of 10,005 ha of degraded conifer forests; 3,400 ha of degraded scrub forests, and reforestation of 13,099 ha of Riverine forests with native species.

### (2) Generating Global Environmental Benefits from Improved Decision-Making Systems and Local Planning in Pakistan. (GEF Grant USD 1 million) UNDP.

The objective of the project is to build capacities at the national, provincial and sectoral levels that can produce high quality economic analyses of standalone climate change adaptation projects and investment projects with adaptation components.

### (3) Pakistan Snow Leopard Eco-System Protection Program. (GEF Grant USD 4.6 million) UNDP.

The project's incremental value lies in promoting the sustainable management of alpine pastures and forests in the high range Himalayan eco-systems to secure conservation of globally significant wildlife, including endangered snow leopard and their habitats. And at the same time ensure sustainable livelihoods and socioeconomic benefits for the community in the three high altitude landscapes in the Himalayan region (that consists of alpine pastures, sub-alpine forests and critical watersheds).

This will be achieved through the four inter-related components of the project, these are: (1) Landscape level approach for snow leopard conservation; (2) Protected Area expansion and strengthening; (3) Participatory conservation in snow leopard model landscapes through sustainable community development; and (4) Support for international cooperation and conservation and management actions informed by knowledge, awareness and monitoring and evaluation. These actions are aimed at conserving the snow leopards, wild prey and associated species and habitats contained within these landscapes through measures such as maintaining their eco-system values and ameliorating climate change impacts, enhancing surveillance, monitoring and inter-provincial and trans-boundary cooperation to reduce wildlife crime and related threats, and improving knowledge and communications.

### (4) Reversing Deforestation and Degradation in High Conservation Value Chilgoza Pine Forests (GEF Grant USD 4.5 million) FAO.

The proposed project is a part of the "The Restoration Initiative" with the objective of improved local livelihoods through increased

productivity and enhanced services and functions of the chilgoza forests of Pakistan. The project will be operative in Sherani district of Baluchistan, South-Waziristan Agency of FATA, Chitral district of Khyber Pakhtunkwa and Diamer district of Gilgit-Baltistan. **Component 1** of the project is related to strengthen regulatory and policy environment for integrated and sustainable management of chilgoza forest ecosystem. **Component 2** is related to the implementation of chilgoza forest landscape conservation, restoration and value chain development at community level. **Component 3** will be addressing matter related to strengthening local institutions for integrated and sustainable management of chilgoza forest ecosystem, while **Component 4** is covering knowledge, partnership, monitoring and assessment of chilgoza forest ecosystem.

Will the Minister for Climate Change be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the Government's policy of planting ten billion trees and protection of environment and naturally grown forests also extends to ex-FATA;
- (b) if so, the steps being taken by the Government to stop the illegal mass cutting of trees in the tribal districts, particularly in South Waziristan; and
- (c) the total number of new plantations made in the tribal districts during the last three years, indicating also the areas that are being guarded under the forests' protection policy?

**Ms. Zartaj Gul:** (a) Yes, the Government Policy of Planting Ten Billion Trees and Protection of Environment and naturally grown forests also extends to Newly Merged Districts. However the notification of proper classification as "Protected Waste Lands" are awaited/in process.

(b) The forests of the merged Districts are un-classified Private/Community owned, where there was no legal control of the Forest Department under the provision of Forest act-2002. However the Forest Department has diligently worked on the classification of these Forests by conducting consultation/Jirgas with local elders/owners of these Forests. The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has recently decide to notify the natural Forest of merged areas as "Protected wasteland" however proper

notification is awaited/in-process. Soon after Notification the management of these Forests will properly be taken over by the KPK Forest Department.

However, in the present scenario the following steps have been taken by the Forest Department for the Protection of these Forests.

1. The Forest Department is ardently working and conduction Jirgas with the Local Communities for their mobilization, awareness and organization of VDCs for the Protection of Precious Natural Forests.

2. To rehabilitate the degraded Forests of the area, the communities have been organized into VDCs under 10-BTTP and 2000 Nos Closures (each having 40 ha area) have been established where 2000 Forest negahbans have been employed for the Protection of Natural regenerations, beside raising afforestation of multipurpose fast growing species on barren lands.

3. To control the timber smuggling a total of 38 Nos Forest Check Posts, have been established in all the merged areas Districts.

Particularly in South Waziristan District the following steps have been taken:-

### In Pre-Merger Scenario

- (i) Awareness meetings and constitution of forest committees under different developmental schemes was carried out to minimize the cutting of forests for commercial purposes.
- (ii) Trainings on Chalghoza and forest protection to local communities.
- (iii) Income generation activities.
- (iv) Imposition of complete ban on cutting and transportation of timber and firewood Vide Additional Chief Secretary FATA Office Order No. FS/L&O/34/Gen/1802-06 dated 13-07- 2017.
- (v) The Forest Department resorted to community involvement in forest conservation and development and utilized the already

established forum of Jirga. At the same time forest cutting issue was taken up with Political Administration and Law Enforcing Agencies (LEAs) Vide this office letters No. 777/B&A dated 22/5/2018, 41/B&A dated 23/7/2018.

### In post-merger scenario

- (i) Approach local communities through VDCs established for closures establishment to raise awareness about forest protection, climatic changes and its importance of trees for tourism.
- (ii) Held meetings with Khamrang Brigade, Kanigurum Brigade, Barwand Task Force Brigade, newly established Police Department, District Criminal Justice Committee under District & Session Judge and District Administration of South Waziristan to extend helping hand to Forest Department to establish writ in the area for forest protection vide this office memos No. 195/E dated 02-10-2018, 251/E dated 12-11-2018, 204/B&A dated 29-08-2019, 517/B&A dated 13-11-2019, 574/B&A dated 28-11-2019.
- (iii) Imposition of ban on cutting and transportation of forest by District Administration vide DC South Office Order No.4015/Dev:18 dated 2-10-2018.
- (iv) Constitution of temporary blocks and beats of the communal natural forests on map to ease the management of forests for field staff.
- (v) Mobilization of forest staff for forest protection as well as extension services for sensitization of communities.
- (vi) Take help of Deputy Commissioner being Chairman of the district committee constituted by Worthy Chief Secretary for implementation of Forest Ordinance 2002 in Merged Areas alongwith extending facilitation to Forest Department in establishment of forest Check posts and classification of forests vide notification No. SO (Tech)/FE&WD?V-544/2019/Vol-IX dated 28-10-2019.

- (vii) Establishment of five (05) number of forest Check posts to control the illegal movement of timber and firewood. Two (02) more check posts one at Shakai and one at Ladha newly notified for the purpose. Forest Check Posts at Khamrung and Angoor Adda could not be operationalized due to locals agitations.
- (viii) Imposition of Section 144 CrPc on cutting and movement of timber and firewood vide DC South Waziristan vide No.1153-66/VO dated 27-07-2020.
- (ix) Constitution of Vigilance/Surveillance/ Monitoring Committees at Range level for forest protection as directed by Worthy Chief Conservator of Forests –I.
  - (x) Jirga meetings with firewood traders and LEAs alongwith your goodself for early solution of the problem with no result.
  - (xi) Institution of case against forest offenders by RFO Wana at Police Station Serveki for lodging FIR but not yet lodged and one at Shakai. The case is in the civil court of South Waziristan.
  - (xii) Meeting of Conservator of Forests Merged areas and DFO South Waziristan with worthy IGFC KP (South) on 03/09/2020 wherein IGFC very kindly directed Colonel General Staff HQ FC KP (South) Javed Sultan Camp Wana to provide one room to forest staff with wash room facility at each check post till Forest Department has permanent infrastructure but not yet provided. He also stressed to raise awareness among local communities about Forest rules and regulations through workshops and jirgas along with using service of local radio FM channel.
- (xiii) Meeting of Secretary FE&WD with elders on 16/02/2020.
- (xiv) Awareness Jirga of Youth Fourm Wana with support of Forest Department at Angoor Adda.
- (xv) Grand Jirgas with Wazir and Mehsood Tribes about Forest Classification as per directives of worthy Chief Secretary Khyber Pakhtunkhwa attended by Chief Conservator of

Forests Central Southern Forest Region-I and Conservator of Forests Merged Areas Peshawar.

**Syed Amin Ul Haque:** Detail of various steps taken by Ministry of Information Technology and Telecommunication to provide cyber security Solutions to different governmental organizations/Ministries etc. are annexed at <u>Annex-A</u>.

Annex-A

National Cyber Security Policy:

National Cyber Security Policy has been approved by the Federal Cabinet. The new policy aims to support both public and private sector bodies, including critical national infrastructure helping centralized/ standardized ICT security across all institutions.

National CERT:

MoIT has approved National Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT) project titled "Cyber Security for Digital Pakistan" worth Rs.1.922 Billion. Hiring for which is already advertised and National CERT will be operational by June, 2022. CERT will consist on following components:

- o CERT & Security Operation Center setup
- o IT Security audit, Coordination & capacity building.
- o Incident detection, prevention and management facility
- o Supporting digital Forensic & screening labs

### • CERT Rules:

- o To provide governance and institutional framework, MoITT is in the process of formulating Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT) rules under Section-49 and Section 51 (i) of PECA 2016. Through these rules, the governance and coordination of National, Governmental and various sectoral CERTs will be enabled. Through the CERT rules, MoITT will enlist the roles and responsibilities of stakeholders (ministries and relevant sectors) the key deliverables, processes, tools and technologies which need to be enabled from for a cyber secure ecosystem in Pakistan. MoITT has already carried out consultative sessions with businesses and public at large.
- o It is the sole responsibility of the digital asset owner to ensure the safety, security boundaries of those responsibilities, their response mechanism and coordination in line with the international benchmarks. It is the core responsibility of Secretaries /CEOs/organizations heads to ensure the delivery of key compliance parameters outlined in the rules which include devising Cyber security strategy for the organizations/ministries ensuring required human financial resources and deployment of adequate tools and technologies. Ministry of IT & Telecom will ensure its full support to hand hold these organizations through national and government CERT.

- Critical Telecom Data & Infrastructure Security Regulations, 2020:
  - The regulations contain establishment of Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT) by the licensee to ensure a quick, effective and orderly response to Cybersecurity incidents.
- Digital Pakistan Cybersecurity Hackathon 2021:
  - o Government sector may also participate in addition to private sector.
- Demand Driven Industry Quality & Capacity Enhancement Program:
  - This Project defines the standards, policies, benchmarks and frameworks for government departments to conceive, plan, design, procure, develop or deploy and implement ICT solutions.
- Regular Advisories on Cyber Threats:
  - o NTISB with support of all relevant stakeholders regularly share cyber security advisories on various emerging cyber threats. These advisories are shared across the Government departments for taking necessary actions against emerging threats which will include some proactive & reactive services/measures. Moreover, the CERT rules will formalize the national response framework against the cyber threats by establishing nationwide Cyber Governance organizational framework.

Will the Minister for Climate Change be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Government is providing sapling / plants to the private land owners for plantation under the Ten Billion Tree Tsunami program, if so, criteria thereof and if not, reasons thereof?

**Ms. Zartaj Gul:** The Programme "Ten Billion Tree Tsunami Programme (TBTTP is being implemented in all provinces including Gilgit-Baltistan (GB), and Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJ&K) by the Provincial Forest and Wildlife Departments.

Province wise general criteria for distribution of plants to land owners/farmers for different activities is given below:

### (1) **Khyber Pakhtunkhwa**

- (a) Free Distribution of forest, ornamental and fruit plants:
  - i. Land available for planting

- ii. Submission of written application/request for more than 5 plants.
- iii. Ensure 30% of the pits digging for demanded plants beforehand
- iv. Ensure protection and maintenance of plants to get the desired results.

### (a) Establishment of Woodlot:

- i. Availability of land (minimum 1 hectare to maximum 20 hectares)
- ii. Excavation of pits by the farmer
- iii. Submission of written application/request.

### (2) **Punjab**

In Punjab, plants are being distributed to the interested farmers on support price of Rs. 2/plant and Rs. 0.5 per stump (root-shoot cutting). Whereas, plants d stributed to armed forces for plantation is free of cost.

Plants are also provided to the land owners/ farmers for below mentioned activities with given criteria under the PC-1:-

### (a) Dry Afforestation on Private lands (Potohar areas):

- i. Availability of litigation free land
- ii. Farmer will bear cost for preparation of land, planting of plants and maintenance etc. (in cash or kind)

### (b) Establishment of Woodlots

- i. The farmers submit the applications to their concerned Divisional Forest Officers.
- ii. Farmer will bear cost for preparation of land, planting of plantd=s and maintenance etc. (in cash or kind)
- iii. The farmers will be bound for retention, protection and maintenance of dry afforestation area for a period of at least five years.

### (3) **Sindh:**

**Distribution of plants and cuttings** to farm owners and interested growers on subsidized rate of Rs. 5/plant are provided under TBTTP in Sindh. Plants to armed forced are provided free of cost for plantation.

### Criteria:

- i. Availability of land for the required number of plants
- ii. Submission of written request by the farer/land owner
- iii. Protection and maintenance of plants by the farmer/land owner.

### (4) Balochistan

In Balochistan, under the TBTTP, Forest Department distribute plants to general public, armed forces and educational institutions free of cost.

Under the following various categories plants are provided to land owners/farmers as per laid down criteria against the mentioned activities.

### (a) **Cluster/Block plantation**

### Criteria:

- i. Availability of suitable site of 100 acres.
- ii. The farmer or community should have the right, dependence and clear use over the forest.
- iii. Signing of agreement/TOP for retention of forest for at least 20 years by the farmer/community.

### (b) **Energy-cum-high value planting**

Under this activity, fruit and firewood trees are planted and the activity is carried out on farmlands, wastelands around farm lands, water channels and waster bonds.

### Criteria:

- i. Site with good soil conditions
- ii. Signing of agreement
- iii. The entire plantation raising, protection, watering, and maintenance will be the responsibility of the farmer.

### (c) Block plantation in Command Areas

### Criteria:

- i. Plantation site with availability of water.
- ii. Farmers should have adequate share of water in irrigation system.
- iii. After entering into agreement, planting, maintenance, watering electricity bills, Aabyana will be responsibility of the farmer.

### (d) **Reclamation of water logged and saline areas**

Under this component, plants are planted in the canals irrigated areas having the problems of waterlogging and salinity.

### Criteria:

- i. Written application to the department which are prioritized on first come first serve basis.
- ii. Signing of Agreement between the farmer and Department
- iii. The entire plantation raising, protection, watering, and maintenance will be the responsibility of the farmer.

### (5) Azad Jammu & Kashmir

### (a) **Free distribution of plants**

In AJ&K, under the TBTTP, Forest Department provide forest, fruit and ornamental plants to farm owners and armed forces on need basis

and free of cost and also to non-government organisations and government institutions.

### Criteria:

- i. Availability of land
- ii. Written application by the land owner/farmer
- iii. Earth work/pits digging, protection and watering is responsibility of the land owner

### (6) **Gilgit-Baltistan**

### (a) **Free distribution of plants**

Plants to the landowners/individual farmers, armed forced, government departments and educational institutions are provided free of cost.

### Criteria:

- i. Availability of land
- ii. Earth work/pits digging, protection and watering is responsibility of the land owner

### (b) **Collaborative planting**

Under collaborative planting, plants to local organisations (AKRSP, Community/Village Organisations) are provided as per below laid down conditions/Criteria.

### **Criteria:**

- i. Local community will arrange to plant long shoot cuttings (Poplar, willow) on their land
- ii. Local community is responsible for earth work, planting, watering and protection
