Will the Minister for Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety be pleased to state the steps taken or being taken by Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal to provide social protection to the poor marginalized segments of the society?

Ms. Shazia Marri: Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal is a Body Corporate established in 1992 through an Act of Parliament. Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal is a Premier Public Sector Social Safety net of the Federal Government, working under Ministry of Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety. Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal is endeavoring to eradicate poverty from the country and executing various pro-poor programs, projects and schemes in the field of healthcare, education, women empowerment, child protection, rehabilitation of the persons with disabilities etc.

Steps taken by Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal to provide social protection to the poor marginalized segments of the society are as under:—

I. Women Empowerment Centres (WECs):

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has established Women Empowerment Centres throughout the country at district level including Azad Kashmir &

Gilgit Baltistan since 1995. Sole objective of the Women Empowerment Center is to make poor widows and orphan girls self-reliant, improve their living standard and provide them financial security. This is ensured by improving their skills and efficiency through training in the traditional and non-traditional skills based on the market needs/demands. 163 Women Empowerment Centers have been established so far throughout Pakistan in phased manner (Regional Office-Lahore-37, Regional Office Multan-18, Sindh-33, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa-30, Balochistan-23, Islamabad Capital Territory/Azad Jammu Kashmir-16, Gilgit Baltistan-6). Trainees of these centers are being paid stipend @ Rs. 50/- per day on attendance basis.

II. Schools For Rehabilitation of Child Labor (SRCLs):

It is Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal initiative to pull out the children from labor and to impart them education, in line with the United Nations & other International Labor Organization's Conventions. So far, 159 Schools for Rehabilitation of Child Labours are functional all over the country (46 are in Regional Office-Lahore, 20 are in Regional Office-Multan, 37 are in Sindh, 24 are in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, 14 are in Balochistan, 13 are in Islamabad Capital Territory/Azad Jammu Kashmir and 5 are in Gilgit-Baltistan). The children involved in child labor are enrolled in these schools and free education imparted up to primary level. They are provided free books, stationery, uniform/shoes and Rs.10/- daily stipend/parents subsistence allowance of Rs. 300/- per month. At present, 17,589 children are enrolled in these schools. So far 47,441 students have been passed out (since inception of this project).

III. Individual Financial Assistance (Medical):

A person having monthly income upto Rs. 30,000/- will be treated as poor and is eligible for receiving financial assistance under Individual Financial Assistance Medical. The beneficiaries may apply for medical assistance directly at Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Head Office, Provincial / Regional Offices, District Offices along-with Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Facilitation Desks at designated hospitals (since 1992).

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal also provides individual financial assistance to destitute and marginalized segments of society by provision of Hearing Aids, Artificial Limbs, Education, General and Sewing Machine.

In addition to these facilities Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal also provides Individual Financial Assistance and Wheel Chairs to Disabled Persons.

IV. **Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Sweet Home:**

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has established 51 Orphanages titled as **“Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Sweet Home”** throughout the country since 2009. The objectives of establishment of Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Sweet Home(s) are, to develop modern approach towards welfare of orphans, to provide modern education and impetus to participate in the main stream of life with pride and dignity. A special individual attention is given on the physical, mental and psychological condition of each child. A clean and hygienic environment is provided to these sweet angels. The children are admitted in the renowned and well reputed schools of the city for formal education from Class-1 to Class-10. Each center accommodates 100 orphan children. The age limit for enrolment is 4-6 years.

V. **Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Old Home:**

A Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Old Home has been established at Lahore in 2014 and is serving senior citizens of Pakistan. At present, 29 residents are provided with well-furnished accommodation, food, clothing and medical facilities in this center. The main goal of this programme is to provide care, love, hope and security in the 3rd phase of life to the un-cared senior citizens.

VI. **Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Shelter Homes and Roti Sab Kay Liye Programme:**

Federal Government has initiated the Shelter Home & Roti Sab Kay Liye Program in the year 2020 to ameliorate the sufferings of the poor masses. Province wise detail of Shelter Homes and Roti Sab Key Liye Program presently functional is as under:

VII. Orphan and Widows Support Program (OWSP):

The “Orphan & Widows Support Program” (OWSP) is a Conditional Cash Transfer (CCT) program and its core objective is to provide quality education, socialization and protection of Orphans (especially female orphans) & Widows with fiscal support. At present, Orphan Widow Support Program is functional on pilot basis in ten (10) districts from 2020. Through this programme 672 families have been benefitted during the last Two (02) years (since its inception *i.e.* year 2020).

VIII. Civil Society / Non-Government Organizations:

The main objective of the Civil Society/ Non-Government Organizations is basically to provide rehabilitative services to the poor segments of the society through its grant-in-aid to specific Non-Government Organizations since 2001. To achieve its objectives, Civil Society has categorized its policy under different components.

IX. Pakistan Thalassemia Centre:

PBM has established State of the Art “Pakistan Thalassemia Centre (PTC)” at F-9 Park, Islamabad (joint venture), which was inaugurated in 2015. In this Centre, needy and deserving thalassemia patients are being provided free of cost blood transfusion services and medicines.

Will the Minister for Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety be pleased to state:

- (a) *whether it is a fact that the biannual stipend amount under Ehsaas Kafaalat programe has been increased from Rs. 12,000 to 13,000; if so;*
- (b) *steps taken / being taken to control illegal deductions and safe transfer of amount to concerned people?*

Ms. Shazia Marri: (a) Yes, it is a fact that bi-annual stipend under Unconditional Cash Transfer (UCT) was increased from Rs. 12,000/- to 13,000/- per beneficiary. The same has been increased further to Rs. 14,000/- per beneficiary *w.e.f* 1st January, 2022.

(b) BISP has taken several steps/ measures to control illegal deductions and safe transfer of amount to its beneficiaries, such as;

- As per contracts signed between BISP and its partner banks, the banks are fully responsible to compensate the aggrieved beneficiaries on spot in case of illegal deductions/ embezzlements as well as to blacklist the involved Point of Sale (POS) agents.
- Payment mechanism has been fully converted to Biometric Verification System (BVS).
- Payments are being disbursed under control environment at campsites for ensuring transparency.
- Monitoring of payments at all levels is ensured to cater the issues of illegal deductions/ embezzlements.
- Spot checks and surprise visits at disbursement points are made by BISP Head Office and regional/ provincial teams during disbursement days.
- Incidents of illegal deductions/ embezzlements are also reported to State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) to take action against involved banks/ agents.
- FIA, District Administration, and local police have also been taken on board to cater the issues of illegal deductions/ embezzlements.

Cases involving cyber security and large sums have been reported to FIA for taking criminal proceedings against the culprits.

Mr. Abdul Wasay: (As per record no Budget was Allocated for Federal Lodge (Qasr-e-Naz) for the year 2021-22.

Due to none availability of funds no expenditure was incurred on Renovation and Maintenance work of Federal Lodge (Qasr-e-Naz) for the year 2021-22.

An amount of **Rs. 11.798 (M)** was received as Rent by the Government in Federal Lodge (Qasr-e-Naz) Karachi for the year 2021-22.

- (a) *the details of scheme wise budget allocated for the ongoing poverty alleviation schemes of BISP and the new schemes in the increased allocation of Rs. 364 billion with provincial share; and*
- (b) *the mechanism of adding and removing households in this vital social protection program?*

Ms. Shazia Marri: (a) Finance Division, Government of Pakistan has allocated a total budget of Rs. 364,078 million to BISP for the Financial Year (FY) 2022-23. This includes Programme's operational cost of Rs. 360,000 million and general and administrative cost of Rs. 4,078 million. Programme wise breakup is as under:—

- Besides existing schemes as mentioned above, the fuel subsidy scheme has been introduced afresh to provide financial relief to additional households to offset the impact of increase in prices of petroleum products, apart from regular beneficiaries of Benazir Kafaalat Programme, in the form of Rs. 2,000 per month paid on a quarterly basis. The proposed allocation of Rs. 48,000 million will cover payment to 2.0 million beneficiaries @ Rs. 2,000 per month.
- It is pertinent to mention that BISP programmes are not implemented with respect to provincial shares. There is a single PMT formula and score approved for national Programmes, without discrimination of regional or provincial quota.

(b) BISP Uses National Socio-Economic Registry (NSER) data for its unconditional and conditional Programme targeting. NSER data collection is based on a scientifically designed Poverty Scorecard Survey Questionnaire which is then analyzed through a technique known as Proxy Means Test (PMT). The assessment approach has high predictability and is widely accepted as a very efficient tool for evaluating households living standards by world-renowned social protection Programme. The poverty

scorecard captures information on surveyed households with respect to; *household size, education level, employment status, disability, assets, agriculture, health* etc.

Based on this approach, the score of each household is being calculated which lies between PMT 0-100. PMT score is directly linked with the socio-economic status of the household; meaning lesser the PMT score, lower is the socio-economic status of the household and *vice versa*.

Currently, all ever-married women of households falling under the PMT cutoff score of 32 are “eligible beneficiaries” of Benazir Kafalat Programme. As a final step, the household data of these eligible beneficiaries is verified from NADRA and profiling filters are also applied to further refine the list of beneficiaries.

Ms. Shazia Marri: It is clarified that word “Ehsaas” was prefixed with different programs of Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety and its allied entities/ organizations without any legal cover. Therefore, it may be noted that the word “Ehsaas” cannot be used with any of the programs and ongoing projects under this Ministry.

(a) The District wise detail of the number of persons benefitted and the amount disbursed in Education Stipend Program (Benazir Taleemi Wazaif) in Balochistan is attached at (**Annex-A**).

(b) Eligibility criteria for enrollment of children in Benazir Taleemi Wazaif program is as under:

- Age 4-12 years for Primary Education
- Age 8-18 years for Secondary Education
- Age 13-22 years for Higher Secondary Education

Benazir Taleemi Wazaif program has two co-responsibilities that the children have to comply with in order to receive cash transfers

- (i) Admission in a school/College
- (ii) 70 percent quarterly attendance

i. Admission Co-responsibility:

Each child (under the eligible age criteria) of existing active Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) family, is verified only once in the program during registration (when she/ he enters the program). In order to become a beneficiary child of the program, an eligible child has to be admitted in primary/ high school/ college of any district of the country. A beneficiary parent has to visit any enrolment camp/ field office of BISP along with B-form, School Registration Certificate together with child to enroll in Benazir Taleemi Wazaif program:

ii. Attendance Co-responsibility:

A beneficiary child must attend school/ college for at least 70 percent of the school/ college effective days within a quarter to receive education stipend from 2nd quarter and onwards.

Ms. Shazia Marri: It is clarified that word “Ehsaas” was prefixed with different programs of Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety and its allied entities/ organizations without any legal cover. Therefore, it may be noted that the word “Ehsaas” cannot be used with any of the programs and ongoing projects under this Ministry.

(b) Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) uses National Socio Economic Registry (NSER) data for its unconditional and conditional Programme targeting. NSER data collection is based on a scientifically designed Poverty Scorecard Survey Questionnaire which is then analyzed through a technique known as Proxy Means Test (PMT). This assessment approach has high predictability and is widely accepted as a very, efficient tool for evaluating households’ living standards by world-renowned social protection Programme. The poverty scorecard captures information on surveyed households with respect to; *household size, education level, employment status, disability, assets, agriculture, health* etc.

Based on this approach, the score of each household is being calculated which lies between PMT 0-100. PMT score is directly linked with the socio-economic status of the household; meaning lesser the PMT score, lower is the socio-economic status of the household and *vice versa*.

Currently, all ever-married women of households falling under the PMT cutoff score of 32 are “eligible beneficiaries” of Benazir Kifalat Programme. Ms. Shazia Marri: It is clarified that word “Ehsaas” was prefixed with different programs of Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety and its allied entities/ organizations without any legal cover. Therefore, it may be noted that the word “Ehsaas” cannot be used with any of the programs and ongoing projects under this Ministry.

(a) **NATIONAL POVERTY GRADUATION PROGRAMME (NPGP):**

NPGP is funded by International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) and Government of Pakistan and is being implemented through Project Management Unit under Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety.

Household Selection Criteria:

- Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) Poverty Score Card and National Socio-Economic Registry (NSER) are used as instrument data for target household identification.
- Project’s priority target group is the ultra-poor in the poverty bands of 0-23, from which the household falling on Proxy Means Test (PMT) score 0-18 is eligible for tangible and 0-23 for intangible assets.
- Baseline Poverty Score Card (PSC)/ PMT survey of the households carried out by Partner Organization(s) after community validation.

So far, no ghost beneficiary has been reported in NPGP.

BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME (BISP):

Beneficiary Selection Criteria:

The beneficiaries of BISP are identified/ selected through scientific mode of National Socio Economic Registry (NSER) survey based on Proxy Means Test (PMT) score. The score determines the welfare status of a household on a scale between 0-100. The PMT cut-off score for eligibility is decided by the BISP Board on the basis of available fiscal space, and is presently set at 32. However, for families with disabled persons, the PMT cut-off score is set at 37. Recipient of the cash assistance can only be female head of the eligible family with valid Computerized National Identity Card (CNIC).

Beneficiary Verification Process:

During survey process, data of all beneficiaries is verified/ validated from National Database and Registration Authority (NADRA) before inclusion under any initiative. For disbursement purpose, bank accounts of all beneficiaries are opened/ activated after live biometric verification by NADRA and Know Your Customer/ Client (KYC) verification by BISP's partner banks. Moreover, beneficiaries can withdraw their payments only after live biometric verification by NADRA.

Therefore, it is not possible that any ghost person can be included under any initiative of BISP and no such case has been reported since inception of Programme in 2008.

PAKISTAN BAIT-UL-MAL (PBM):

Since its inception, PBM has transparent system for providing assistance to deserving beneficiaries under various programs.

Beneficiary Selection/ Verification Criteria:

To identify deserving beneficiaries, an officer of BPS-18 is posted in all Districts throughout the country. When an applicant submits his/ her application for provision of assistance, it is a primary responsibility of the

officer to visit applicant's given address for checking his/ her eligibility/ deserving status in order to complete the inquiry report.

Therefore, no ghost person has been indicated under programs/ projects being run by PBM including projects functioning in Balochistan Province.

(a) **NATIONAL POVERTY GRADUATION PROGRAMME:**

Programme Overview:

National Poverty Graduation Programme (NPGP) is funded by International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) and Government of Pakistan. The Programme is being implemented through a Project Management Unit under Ministry of Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety as Lead Programme Agency, and its eight partner organizations in 21 districts of four provinces of Pakistan. The programme aims “to assist the ultra-poor and very poor in graduating out of poverty on a sustainable basis while simultaneously improving their overall food security, nutritional status, and resilience to climate change”. The development objective of the project is “to enable the rural poor and especially women and youth to realize their development potential and attain a higher level of social and economic wellbeing through a proven, flexible, and responsive menu of assistance”.

The program consists of two major components:

- (1) **Poverty Graduation:** The first component mainly focuses on assets creation, Interest Free Loan (IFL) and training of assets and IFL beneficiaries.
- (2) **Social Mobilization and Programme Management:** Under this component, following training opportunities are provided to the households that benefit from Livelihood Assets and Interest-Free Loans.
 - Community trainings on Climate Change resilience/ mitigation.
 - Sessions with Households around nutrition.

- Training of Village Organizations around gender.
- Youth engagement activities.
- Campaigns on Health & Nutrition/ Gender/ Environment/ Peace & Justice.
- Training of Community Resource Persons.

TAHAFUZ PROGRAMME:

Tahafuz Program is a PSDP program (FY-2021-2024) running under the Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety, Government of Pakistan. It is a demand-driven initiative designed to protect the extremely poor from catastrophic health expenditures.

Tahafuz Program is providing healthcare services across Pakistan to the patients in its empaneled public sector hospitals irrespective of geographical limitations and domicile. Furthermore, Program is providing healthcare assistance to the poor who fall under the pre-defined eligibility criteria primarily based on BISP/ NSER Poverty scores *i.e.* PMT<44.

Tahafuz facilitates patients from all provinces. The lump sum allocation of funds is made to Tahafuz Program by the Federal Government. No, province-wise allocation of funds is made and subsequently, the surrender of funds is also not province based. As the program is demand-driven, requests from all provinces are facilitated keeping in view the pre-requisites.

3. 14th Executive Board meeting was held on 24-06-2021 and minutes were issued on 05-07-2021.

4. The Board was apprised that no observation had been received from any member of the Executive Board.

6. The Board unanimously approved minutes of the 14th Executive Board meeting, circulated on 05-07-2021.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 03

SUBJECT: UPDATE ON THALLIAN HOUSING SCHEME

19. FGEHA (then FGEHF) signed a JV agreement with M/s KSDB Pvt Ltd. after Executive Committee's approval in its 132nd meeting. The aim was to provide developed plots preliminary in Mouza Khairi Mourat, Mouza Chahan, Mouza Mandowal, Mouza Thallian and any land in adjoining Mouzas contiguous to proposed land.

20. The Project remained at a standstill due to lack of accessibility to the preliminary proposed land, provision of clear land by JV partner and audit observations etc. The matter was taken up by the PAC. FGEHA was directed to devise a way forward.

21. FGEHA opened the membership for Government Employees and General Public in March 2017. Approximately, 9105 residential plots of various categories were planned. 5317 members deposited the down-

payments against offer/letters issued. The mutation of 1407 kanals in Mouza Chahan was entered in the name of FGEHA, but mutation (Integal) remained pending. Moreover, the Firm could not provide the requisite access to the proposed site.

22. The authorities made an effort to revive the project and to this effect Project Supervisory Committee (P. S. C.) for Thallian was notified in 2020. The meetings of P.S.C were held weekly/fortnightly to find a pragmatic way forward. In this regard, the following was worked out:

- a) FGEHA signed an addendum with MORE and FWO for provision of access from M-2 after approval of E-B in its 6th meeting.
- b) Land documents of 2500 kanals in Mauza Rajar were provided by the Firm, which were under evaluation.

Following were pending with M/s KSDB:

- i. Approval from NHA for interchange on M-2 and provision of 300 kanals of land by M/s KSDB Pvt Ltd for transfer to NHA
- ii. Mutation of 100 kanals of land as Performance Security in favor of FGEHA.

23. M/s KSDB (Pvt) Ltd provided an undertaking for the provision of developed residential plots on rates agreed in the already signed JV Agreement. Details of same are as below:

24. The Firm requested to change the Project Site from Mouzas listed in para 1 to Mouza Rajar, which was approved in principle by 14th EB meeting in the following word, *"The Executive Board directed to place the addendum in next EB meeting, after incorporating all the changes, to the original JV agreement duly vetted by Law Wing, FGEHA"*. This would require fresh land evaluation for the proposed land. Recently Mr. Abdur Rauf, Director of K/S Developers, wrote a letter to FGEHA, indicating that the company wished to withdraw from the Joint Venture Agreement dated 04 July, 2021. As per letter written, and previous correspondence with FGEHA, Mr. Abdur Rauf stated that he was the authorized signatory of the company (M/s KSDB) registered with SECP. Verification of the same is awaited.

25. If the EB agrees to the JV agreement, the liabilities of any party, terms and conditions and procedural matters regarding the closure of the agreement would be worked out keeping in view legalities and terms of the JV agreement. The future course of action as far as the allottees of the scheme would also have to be decided. FGEHA could place advertisements to the effect, in all national newspapers or send letters to the allottees. Allottees would be given the option to either withdraw their deposited amount or be accommodated in the upcoming/next schemes, as per FGEHA policy. Any further modalities may be decided as per law.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

26. The matter was placed before the Executive Board for decision.

✓ DECISION:

27. The Board decided to formally close the Thallian Housing Scheme subject to adherence to the following directives:

- i. Those allottees of the Thallian Housing Scheme who would opt for the option of refund, would get the refund of principle amount deposited alongwith the profit accrued over the deposit period calculated on the basis of profit offered by the commercial banks.
- ii. 10% quota would be reserved in all future schemes of FGEHA including F-12 & G-12 for the allottees who did not opt for a refund.
- iii. FGEHA would not launch any JV project in the Mouzas mentioned in the original and amended JV Agreements, in any and all future EOIs.

- (a) *whether it is a fact that in March 2020, Government had launched Ehsaas District Development Portal called 'Data4Pakistan' initiative, if so, its purpose; and*
- (b) *the details of measures taken so far under the said initiative?*

Ms. Shazia Marri: It is clarified that word "Ehsaas" was prefixed with different programs of Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety and its allied entities/ organizations without any legal cover. Therefore, it may be noted that the word "Ehsaas" cannot be used with any of the programs and ongoing projects under this Ministry.

(a) It is confirmed that 'Data4Pakistan' (www.data4pakistan.com) is the first initiative of its kind in the country which was launched to provide open and public access to a spatial interactive portal that has poverty estimates for every district in Pakistan. The portal has been developed in collaboration with the World Bank and its purposes are as under:

- i. A value resource for federal, provincial and district level policymakers, for decision making.
- ii. Interactive maps allow the users to visualize and compare districts on poverty and population density.

(b) Under the said initiative, following measures have been taken:

- i. To develop a secured and rapid interactive mapping portal, international standard software “ArcGIS Server” has been purchased.
- ii. Few datasets have already been published; however other additional datasets in the form of GIS maps have been prepared and will be hosted online on this portal using ArcGIS server at the end of October, 2022.
- iii. An ‘Additional Resources’ section on the website provides information on the indicators included in the portal and other background material and reports.
- iv. New material as well as new data and indicators will be added frequently.

Will the Minister for Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety be pleased to state:

- (a) *the number of persons fell below the poverty line during the last four years in the country; and*
- (b) *steps taken by the Government to elevate such persons above the poverty line, if so, the details thereof?*

Ms. Shazia Marri: (a) This part of question does not relate to the Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety as the Poverty in the country is officially measured by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) which is working under the M/o Planning, Development & Special Initiatives (M/o PD&SI).

(b) The details of steps taken by the Federal Government to alleviate poverty and to elevate poor above poverty line through Ministry of Poverty Alleviation & Social Safety and its allied Organizations are as under:

1. **BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME:**

BISP has completed National Socio Economic Registry (NSER) in January, 2022 through a Door to Door survey of around 34 Million Households in Pakistan. The Socio Economic status of Household has been calculated by employing a scientific method of Proxy Means Test (PMT) scoring which ranges from 0 to 100. PMT score is directly linked with the socio-economic status of the household; meaning lesser the PMT score, lower is the socio-economic status of the household and *vice versa*. BISP is providing financial assistance to the Households falling under a certain approved PMT cut-off. Unconditional cash transfers @ Rs.7,000/ per beneficiary family per quarter are being provided for basic sustenance under “Benazir Kifalat Program”. The program has around 8 million regular beneficiaries with overall disbursement of Rs.1.2 trillion to-date. To eliminate intergenerational poverty, BISP is implementing Conditional Cash Transfer (CCT) programs. (i) “Benazir Nashonuma Program” provides health and nutrition services for the Pregnant and Lactating Women (PLWs) of the BISP beneficiary Households. Around 0.2 million children are enrolled and Rs.8 billion have been disbursed to date. (ii) “Benazir Taleemi Wazaif Program” focuses on school enrollment and reducing the dropout of children of BISP beneficiaries through Cash incentives. Around 8 million children are enrolled and Rs. 40 billion have been disbursed to date. (iii) “Benazir Undergraduate Scholarship program” provides merit cum need-based scholarships for undergraduate education

of the deserving students from low income families Rs. 13.295 billion have been disbursed to 92,000 deserving students in past two years.

2. **PAKISTAN BAIT-UL-MAL:**

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal (PBM) is a Body Corporate established in 1992 through an Act of Parliament. PBM is a Premier Public Sector Social Safety net of the Federal Government, working under Ministry of Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety. PBM is endeavoring to eradicate poverty from the country and executing various pro-poor programs, projects and schemes in the field of healthcare, education, women empowerment, child protection, rehabilitation of the persons with disabilities etc. During the last four years, PBM has launched three new initiatives namely; Shelter Home, Roti Sab Key Liye and Orphan Widow Support Programme.

Steps taken by PBM to elevate poor persons above the poverty line are as under:—

i. **Women Empowerment Centres (WECs):**

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has established Women Empowerment Centres (WEC) throughout the country at district level including Azad Kashmir & Gilgit Baltistan since 1995. Sole objective of the WECs is to make poor widows and orphan girls self-reliant, improve their living standard and provide them financial security. This is ensured by improving their skills and efficiency through training in the traditional and non-traditional skills based on the market needs/demands. 162 WECs have been established so far throughout Pakistan in phased manner (Punjab-37, South Punjab-18, Sindh-33, KPK-30, Balochistan-22, ICT/AJK-16, G.B-6). Trainees of these centers are being paid stipend @ Rs. 50/- per day on attendance basis. Province/Region wise detail of Passed out trainees from Women Empowerment Centers during last Four (04) years *w.e.f* 01-01-2018 to 31-12-2021 is placed at **(Annex-A)**.

ii. **Schools For Rehabilitation of Child Labor (SRCLs):**

It is PBM's initiative to pull out the children from labor and to impart them education, in line with the LLN & other International Labor Organization's Conventions. So far, 159 SRCLs are functional all over the country (46 are in Punjab,

20 are in South Punjab, 37 are in Sindh, 24 are in KPK, 14 are in Balochistan, 13 are in ICT/AJK and 5 are in G.B). The children involved in child labor are enrolled in these schools and free education is imparted up to primary level. They are provided free books, stationery, uniform/shoes and Rs.10/- daily stipend/parents subsistence allowance of Rs.300/- per month. About 18,488 children are enrolled in these schools. So far 45000 students have been passed out and out of which 38000 students are getting higher education. The detail of enrolled and passed out students for the last Four (04) years is as under:—

iii. **Individual Financial Assistance (Medical):**

A person having monthly income upto Rs. 30,000/- will be treated as poor and is eligible for receiving financial assistance under IFA Medical. The beneficiaries may apply for medical assistance directly at PBM Head Office, Provincial/Regional Offices, District Offices along-with PBM Facilitation Desks at designated hospitals (since 1992). The detail IFA Medical disbursement during last Four (04) years *w.e.f* 01-07-2018 to 30-06-2022 is placed at **(Annex-B)**.

iv. **Individual Financial Assistance (IFA):**

Keeping in view, its pro-poor services, Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal provides individual financial assistance to destitute and marginalized segments of society. A person having monthly income upto Rs. 30,000/- will be treated as poor and is eligible for financial assistance under IFA since 1992 (Hearing Aids, Artificial Limbs, Education, General, Sewing Machine).

In addition to these facilities PBM also provides IFA (Special Friends, Wheel Chairs). The detail of IFA disbursement during last Four (04) years *i.e.* 2018 to 2022 is placed at **(Annex-C)**.

v. **PBM Sweet Home:**

PBM has established 51 Orphanages titled as **“Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Sweet Home”** throughout the country since 2009. The objectives of establishment of PBM Sweet Home(s) are, to develop modern approach towards welfare of orphans, to provide modern education and impetus to participate in the main stream of life with pride and dignity. A special individual attention is given on the physical, mental and psychological condition of each child. A clean and hygienic environment is provided to these sweet angels. The children are admitted in the renowned and well reputed schools of the city for formal education from Class-1 to Class-10. Each center accommodates 100 orphan children. The age limit for enrolment is 4-6 years. 4403 orphan children have benefited during the last Four (04) years. Province wise detail is as under:

vi. **PBM Old Home:**

A PBM Old Home has been established at Lahore in 2014 and is serving senior citizens of Pakistan. At present, 29 residents are provided with well-furnished accommodation, food, clothing and medical facilities in this center. The main goal of this programme is to provide care, love, hope and security in

the 3rd phase of life to the un-cared senior citizens. During last Four (04) years (171) persons have benefitted from PBM's Old Home, Lahore.

vii. PBM Shelter Homes and Roti Sab Kay Liye Program:

Federal Government initiated the Shelter Home & Roti Sab Kay Liye Program in the year 2020 to ameliorate the sufferings of the poor masses. Province wise detail of Shelter Homes and Roti Sab Key Liye program since its inception *i.e.* August, 2020 is as under:

viii. Orphan and Widows Support Program (OWSP):

The “Orphan & Widows Support Program” (OWSP) is a Conditional Cash Transfer (CCT) program and its core objective is to provide quality education, socialization and protection of Orphans (especially female orphans) & Widows with fiscal support. At present, OWSP Program is functional on pilot basis in ten (10) districts from 2020. Through this programme 672 families have been benefitted during the last Two (02) years (since its inception *i.e.* year 2020). Province/Region wise detail is placed at (**Annex-D**).

xi. Civil Society / NGOs:

The main objective of the CS/NGOs is basically to provide rehabilitative services to the poor segments of the society through its grant-in-aid to specific NGOs since 2001. To achieve its objectives, Civil Society has categorized its policy under different components. The detail of amount disbursed along-with beneficiaries during last Four (04) years is placed at (**Annex-E**).

x. Pakistan Thalassemia Centre:

PBM has established State of the Art “Pakistan Thalassemia Centre (PTC)” at F-9 Park, Islamabad (joint venture), which was inaugurated in 2015. In this Centre, needy and deserving thalassemia patients are being provided free of cost blood transfusion services and medicines.

3. **PAKISTAN POVERTY ALLEVIATION FUND:**

PPAF is mandated with the implementation of Interest Free Loan program. As required attached “Annex-I” provides numbers of beneficiaries provided loans in last 04 years.

4. **NATIONAL POVERTY GRADUATION PROGRAMME:**

Programme Overview:

National Poverty Graduation Programme (NPGP) is funded by International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) and Government of Pakistan. The Programme is being implemented through a Project Management Unit under Ministry of Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety as Lead Programme Agency, and its eight partner organizations in 21 districts of four provinces of Pakistan. The programme aims “to assist the ultra-poor and very poor in graduating out of poverty on a sustainable basis and simultaneously improving their overall food security, nutritional status, and resilience to climate change”. The development objective of the project is “to enable the rural poor and especially women and youth to realize their development potential and attain a higher level of social and economic wellbeing through a proven, flexible, and responsive menu of assistance”.

The program consists of two major components:

A. Poverty Graduation:

The first component mainly focuses on assets creation, interest-free loan and training of assets and IFL beneficiaries.

B. Social Mobilization and Programme Management:

Under this component, following training opportunities are provided to the households that benefit from Livelihood Assets and Interest-Free Loans.

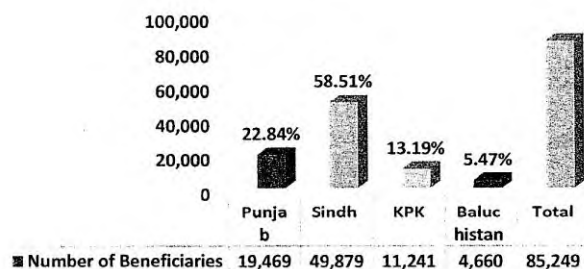
- Community trainings on Climate Change resilience/mitigation.
- Sessions with Households around nutrition.
- Training of Village Organizations around gender.

- Youth engagement activities.
- Campaigns on Health Nutrition/ Gender/ Environment/ Peace & Justice.

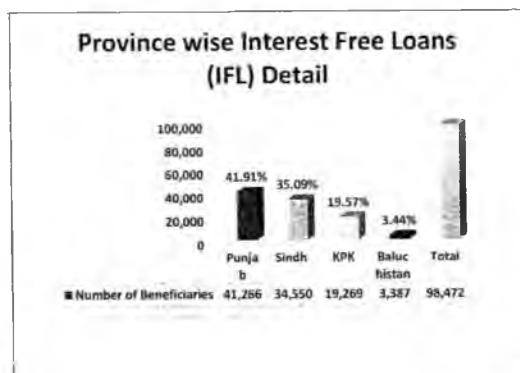

- The Date of Commencement of the Project is 6-May-2020.

- (c) The date of commencement of the project is 6 May, 2020.
- The percentage details of work completed so far has been described in reply to part (a) of the question.
 - Till date no extension of time is granted to the Contract but subsequent to resolution of the issues as stated in part (a) and resumption of work at site at full scale, the project's remaining works would require thirty months to complete the job.

- The Project is currently at its 3rd stage which is execution. The works on all three towers has commenced.
- Total project overall progress achieved so far is 16%.
 - Tower A Overall Progress 23.92 %
 - Tower B Overall Progress 19.25 %
 - Tower C Overall Progress 4.9 %
- Earthwork (Excavation in Shale & Rock) 99.9% Completed.
- Casting Pile Foundations 100% Completed.
- Basement Raft Foundation 76.26 % Completed.
- Construction of 3 Level Basements 27.7 %
- The financial progress of the project is 15.6%
- The work at site is currently stopped by the Contractor due to the unprecedented price hike of construction materials, and the existing mechanism of Price adjustment included in the Contract (which is in line with the Pakistan Engineering Council Standard price adjustment guidelines) does not cover the current hyper escalation of the Construction materials.
- The Contractor has initiated the dispute proceeding under the clause 67.1 of the Contract. The proposals submitted by the contractor mainly include:
 - a. Revision of contractual weightages of the steel and cement in the Price adjustment formula of the contract.
 - b. The special financial assistance in order to maintain the cash flows against bank guarantees.
 - c. Direct payments to the Suppliers of Construction materials by the Employer.
 - d. The revision of rates of bill of quantities.
- The Engineer has given his decision regarding 67.1 of the Contract that price adjustment formula, secure and mobilization advances are already available under the contract and as per the authority vested to the office of the engineer under the contract, the proposed options are extra contractual and the office of the engineer is not authorized to provide

any financial assistance to the contractor which is beyond the ambit of its contractual authority.

- Furthermore under the clause 67, the Contractor has expressed his intention to initiate the arbitration proceedings but as per Contract the notice for amicable settlement between the Employer and the Contractor has also been requested in parallel.
- The Pakistan Engineering Council in its letter to MoH&W dated 28-Feb 2022, has also acknowledged that there is unprecedented inflation and exorbitant price hike in the country which has crippled the construction activities. Which has resulted in making the ongoing projects unviable.
- As per PEC the matter has already been taken up by PEC with the Planning Commission and other relevant agencies. PEC has also informed that they have already taken up the matter with Prime Minister of Pakistan.
- Forgoing in view, the PEC has desired in its letter to the Secretary MoH&W that no default, liquidated damages or any other punitive clauses of Conditions of the Contract be invoked against any Contractor till a revised Price adjustment policy is approved and notified.
- PEC has now issued revise guidelines regarding price adjustment which has been uploaded on PEC website in June 2022 which primarily addresses the new/upcoming projects/contracts. However, the issues of price hike in ongoing projects, as acknowledged by PEC, still persist and adversely affecting the works. In this regard FGEHA has written a letter to PEC on 13th July, 2022, where PEC is requested to apprise the Ministry regarding measures taken/ under-consideration for ongoing projects to mitigate the effects of the exorbitant price hike.
- Ministry of Housing and Works had forwarded a summary for ECC regarding recent unprecedented price inflation in steel, cement and other construction materials. ECC has returned the summary stating that the said proposal is beyond their jurisdiction.
- The matter is now being taken up to FGEHA Board for further direction.
- The Kashmir Avenue Apartments project, subsequent to resolution of the price hike issue, may be completed in next 30 Months after recommencement of works at full scale.

**RULES FOR THE USE OF STAFF CARS
1980**

**GOVERNMENT OF PAKISTAN
CABINET SECRETARIAT
CABINET DIVISION**

24. **Categories of Staff Cars and their Entitlement for use:-** (1) Staff cars for government use may be categorized as under:-

- a Small Cars Up to engine power not exceeding 1300 CC.
- b Medium Cars Cars with an engine power ranging from over 1300 CC to 1600 CC.
- c Big Cars Engine power exceeding 1600 CC.
- d All cars earmarked for foreign dignitaries and Federal / Provincial Ministers, Hon'able Judges of Supreme Court and Chief Justices of the High Court will be air conditioned. (Add. vide No. 12/65/81-CS, dated 4th August, 1983)

(2) The Prime Minister of Pakistan has been pleased to approve the following revised entitlement of staff cars:-

- a. Federal Ministers/Ministers of State/Advisors/ 1800 CC
Special Assistants to the Prime Minister with status of Minister/Minister of State.
"Provided that the protected vehicle shall be allocated to a vulnerable dignitary subject to availability and approval of the Prime Minister. However, Secretary, Cabinet Division may allow expenses on maintenance, repair and POL of any vehicle from the budget of Cabinet Division, Foreign Office or any other Division, which he may approve; provided that the vehicle was bought by a Government Authority / Ministry / Division and was used by anyone, after due authorization, whose assigned work falls within the ambit of that Division".
- b. Secretaries General/Secretary/Parliamentary 1300 CC
Secretaries and Officers equivalent to BPS-22.
- c. Additional Secretaries/Senior Joint Secretaries/ 1000 CC
Officers in BPS-21/20 and equivalent.

Mr. Abdul Wasay: i. The FGEHA executed a JV agreement with M/s Commoners Sky Gardens (Pvt.) Ltd. (M/s. CSG) on 11th October, 2019 for provision of land in Mouza Mengal and Mouza Kathar on land sharing basis. Accordingly, land measuring 6021 Kanals 6 Marlas (753 acres Approx.) was mutated in the name of FGEHA (4086 Kanals 11 Marlas in Mouza Mengal and 1933 Kanals 15 Marlas in Mouza Kathar).

ii. The NAB initiated an inquiry against M/s CSG and others, on the direction of the Honourable Supreme Court of Pakistan in its Judgment in Criminal Original Petition No. 57 of 2015 dated 4th may, 2018 on the issue of Shamilat land. Resultantly, the project remained stalled. On 17th December, 2020, NAB issued NOC to FGEHA by allowing to proceed on the clear land in Mouza Kathar. Therefore, Executive Board of FGEHA in its 20th meeting held on 15-02-2022 decided to reduce the scope of the work as follows:

“The Board decided that scope of the JV Agreement shall be restricted/reduced only to the extent of the clear land offered in Mouza Kathar. Land offered in Mouza Mangal shall be treated as cancelled and will not be considered in this joint venture. The addendum to this effect is restricted to the extent of Mouza Kathar only based on the LOP submitted duly vetted by the consultant”

iii. Accordingly, an addendum to JV agreement was signed between FGEHA and M/s CSG with reduction in scope on 14/03/2022 for minimum of 2000 Kanals (250 Acres Approx.) in Mouza Kathar. The layout plan (LOP) of housing scheme for land measuring 2,403 kanals of clear land in Mouza Kathar, which is already mutated in the name of FGEHA, was approved by FGEHA on May 11, 2022.

iv. FGEHA has signed the construction agreement with JV partner on June 21, 2022.

v. It is a Design & Built Type of Construction Contract. Currently, Detailed Design Phase is in progress. Moreover, Phase-1 of Project is inaugurated by the Federal Minister (Housing & Works) on August 23, 2022.

vi. The allotment will be issued to those who deposited down payment in Green Enclave-II according to available number of plots.
