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

Tuesday, December 3, 1974

The Senate of Pakistan met in the Senate Chamber, (State Bank Building), Islamabad, at five of the clock in the evening, Mr. Chairman (Mr. Habibullah Khan) in the Chair.

(Recitation from the Holy Quran)

Mr. Chairman : Sorry, I am late. I apologise.

STARRED QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Mr. Chairman : This is a request from the Finance Minister that he is busy in the National Assembly, probably he has to answer some questions there and some other legislative work to do, so he has asked me to wait for him for some time and then he will rush to the Senate to take up his work here. So there is no other Minister to answer the question on his behalf.

Mr. Chairman : Then you can entertain the House with supplementaries. You can prolong it in this way.

(At this stage Minister for Finance enters the House) Oh yes, he is here.

Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan : Sorry Sir, I was busy in the National Assembly.

Mr. Chairman : Now, he is here.

So we take up questions.

Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan : Sir, the Minister for Education will be coming just now, he will be here in a few minutes.

Mr. Chairman : All right Question No. 38 stands over. Question No.39 relates to Finance. Yes Question 39.

Khawaja Mohammad Safdar : Supplementary Sir.

A.D.B.P. LOANS

39. Mr. Mohammad Zaman Khan Achakzai : Will the Minister for Finance, Planning and Development be pleased to state :

(a) the number of loans granted by Agricultural Development Bank of Pakistan in the Punjab, Sind, N.W.F.P. and Baluchistan during the years 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74;

(b) the number of persons belonging to the Punjab, Sind N. W. F. P. and Baluchistan to whom loans were granted by the Agricultural Development Bank of Pakistan during 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74 together with the amounts granted to and the amounts recovered from each province;

(c) the proportion in which the Bank advances loans in each of the Provinces;

(d) the conditions on which loan is advanced by the Agricultural Development Bank of Pakistan;

(e) the purposes for which loan can be obtained from the Agricultural development Bank of Pakistan ; and

(f) the places in Baluchistan where the Agricultural Development Bank of Pakistan has established its offices and branches and the names, parentage and addresses of officers working in grade 16 and above in those offices, etc ?

**Rana Mohammad Hanif Khan :** (a) The number of Agricultural Development Bank of Pakistan loans granted in the provinces of Punjab, Sind N. W. F. P., and Baluchistan during the year 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74 is given in the tabulated form as below :

(b) Disclosure of matters relating to customer's financial position is not in the public interest. Section 33. (1) of ADB Ordinance, 1961 also prohibits the Bank from disclosing information given by persons applying to the Bank for financial assistance and it is against general banking practice.

(c) No proportion is fixed for any province. Loans are given in each region according to the demand in that region. No loan case in any Province has so far been rejected on the ground of shortage of funds.

(d) The loans ordinarily given in kind are sanctioned on short, medium or long term basis. The short term loans are repayable immediately after harvest of the crop for which they are granted subject to a maximum period of 18 months; medium term loans are repayable in periods exceeding 18 months but within 5 years; and long term loans are repayable over a period exceeding 5 years. The present rates of interest are 10% on loans not exceeding Rs. 5,000 and 11% on loans exceeding Rs. 5,000.

Medium and long term loans are required to be secured by a mortgage of immovable property but the Bank may, in suitable cases, accept a pledge or assignment in favour of the Bank in lieu of such mortgages. Such loans are also granted against hypothecation of crops and assets, such as tractors and tubewells, created out of Bank's funds, the un-conditional guarantees of scheduled banks or fixed deposits held with the Bank. Short term loans are advanced against Loans guaranteed by the Federal or Provincial Government require no other security.

(e) The Bank advance loans for the purpose of agriculture, which includes the raising of crops, horticulture, forestry, fishery, animal husbandry, poultry-farming, dairy, bee-keeping and sericulture. Any individual engaged in agriculture, or in the development of agriculture or agricultural products or in storage, warehousing, marketing or processing of agricultural produce and any public or private company or cooperative society so engaged is entitled to a loan under the provisions of ADB Ordinance, 1961.

(f) The particulars of officers in grade 16 and above working in the branches of the Bank in Baluchistan are given in the statement placed on the table of the House.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** Altogether 1971-72, 1972-73.

**Mr. Chairman :** Your question relates to these years.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** All the three years.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** You want number province-wise.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** First part of the question is about the number of loanees belonging to each province separately.

**Mr. Chairman :** The number of persons belonging to the Punjab, Sind, N. W. F. P. and Baluchistan to whom loans were granted by the ADBP for three years.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** That information I have already given. The number of loans province-wise was only .....

**Mr. Chairman :** He wants number of persons.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** Actually the number of persons must be same.

**Mr. Chairman :** No. no. One person may be given more than one loan.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Number of loans advanced.

**Mr. Chairman :** Loans and the number of persons don't go together.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** Well, I doubt it very much, sir. That is quite possible because this much information I have got. But I can give the information as to the amount of loans granted to different provinces.

**Mr. Chairman :** No. What will be the procedure, supposing if the answer is incomplete.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** It should be deferred.

**Mr. Chairman :** Supposing, if the answer is not complete, can this one part of the answer be postponed for some other day.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Yes, sir.

**Mr. Chairman :** You have not got complete answer to this.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Then it should be deferred, sir.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** About this particular point, the number of persons belonging to different provinces. The total number of persons who have been granted loans is with me. But so far as the number of loans advanced is concerned, I think, probably the number is the same.

**Mr. Chairman :** Province-wise.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** But, sir, as you just observed that the number of persons can be different from the number of loans granted because one person can be granted more than one loan. So, that is quite reasonable and if the honourable Member wants a break-up in that respect then I would certainly like to have a notice for that.

**Mr. Chairman :** The notice is there. Part (b) itself is a notice but your reply has no answer to his supplementary.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Sir, I would request that as the reply is incomplete part (b) of the question may be deferred to some other day.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** Sir, I have received the information just now. It is separate information. Now, I can give you the number of loans/cases dealt with during this period. The number of loan cases received during 1973-74 is ...

**Mr. Chairman :** No. no. He has been asking about the persons who have been granted loans.

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** Sir, I can give the number of loan cases sanctioned during 1973-74

#### FOREIGN LOANS

**40. Mr. Mohammad Zaman Khan Achakzai :** Will the Minister for Finance, Planning and Development be pleased to state :

- (a) the present total amount of Pakistan's external debt;
- (b) the names of countries from which loans have been obtained along with the amount of loan from each country;
- (c) the places where the amount of loans drawn so far has been spent and the procedure of such spending;
- (d) the amount of interest paid annually for the loan; and
- (e) the amount out of the total loan spent in the Punjab, Sind, Baluchistan and N. W. F. P. separately together with the places and projects on which it has been spent and the annual income derived from it by each province?

**Rana Mohammad Hanif Khan :** It is not in the public interest to disclose the information sought by this question.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** I beg to draw the attention of the honourable Minister to the fact that there are several books published by the Finance Division itself which disclose almost all this information which the honourable Senator has sought.

**Mr. Chairman :** When the information is available in public then why don't you get that from there?

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Sir, my objection is this that the answer is incorrect. This information is available everywhere except to the part (c) and part (e). That is not available. He can say so that it is not in the public interest to disclose the information sought in parts (c) & (e).

Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan : That might be something which happened in the past, sir. What is happening today.

Mr. Chairman : But he is quite satisfied with your answer if you only say, referred to Survey of Pakistan. That is all. He says that is a complete answer.

PROVINCIAL QUOTA IN PAKISTAN SECURITY PRINTING CORPORATION

**41. Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Will the Minister for Finance be pleased to state :

(a) the number of officers in the Pakistan Printing Corporation domicile-d in Sind, the Punjab, Baluchistan and N. W. F. P. respectively;

(b) whether it is a fact that the General Manager, Pakistan Security Printing Corporation *v/o* his letter No. PO/15—A/1117 dated 22.11.73, refused to implement the Provincial/Regional quota system for recruitment to posts in the Corporation;

(c) whether it is a fact that officers of Punjab domicile are being victimised because of parochial feelings of higher officers of the Corporation; and

(d) the steps the Government has so far taken or intends to take to get the Provincial/Regional quota system implemented in the Corporation and to eradicate parochial feelings which result in the victimisation of the officers from the Punjab ?

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** (a) The number of officers employed in the Pakistan Security Printing Corporation together with their domicile is as follows:

(d) (i) Provincial quota system is now being observed for fresh recruitment. Vacancies are advertised in local and regional papers. For officer's posts even travelling allowance is allowed to candidates from up-country.

#### MARKET CAPITALISATION OF SHARES

**42. Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Will the Minister for Finance, Planning and Development be pleased to state :

(a) where it is a fact that the aggregate market capitalisation of ordinary shares in Pakistan has fallen from Rs. 4805.4 million in August 1973, to Rs. 345.32 million in August 1974 ;

(b) whether it is also a fact that the fall in the aggregate market capitalisation of ordinary shares in the period mentioned in (a) above, is constant and unchecked; and

(c) the steps so far taken by the Federal Government to stop this trend ?

**Ch. Mohammad Hanif Khan :** (a) yes.

(b) No. Of late the trend has reversed.

(c) The Government has taken the following steps to encourage and revive healthier investment ;

(i) In the Budget for 1974-75 Government announced the measures enumerated in the statement placed on the table of the House.

(ii) The Government has asked the financial institutions responsible for development and stabilisation of the stock market to effectively lend support to the market operations. As a result aggregate market value of shares has increased since October, 1974 by Rs. 185.9 million. The Government is constantly keeping the situation under watch with a view to taking appropriate measures to revive the stock market.

#### STATEMENT

#### MEASURES ANNOUNCED FOR REVIVAL OF INVESTMENT IN THE BUDGET FOR 1974-75

The Finance Minister announced the following measures in his Budget Speech for the year 1974-75 to encourage and revive healthier investment :—

(1) for a period of two years capital gains in respect of shares, bonds and Debentures were exempted from income tax. Capital losses during this period of two years were, however, allowed to be carried forward by the stock holders concerned to be set off against capital gains after this period;

(2) The existing overall exemption limit of Rs. five thousand in respect of income from interest and dividends was removed and the following exemption ceilings were fixed :

- (a) exemption limit for dividend income from the National Investment Trust and the Investment Corporation of Pakistan was increased from Rs. two thousand to Rs. ten thousand;
- (b) exemption limit for other dividends was increased from Rs. two thousand to Rs. five thousand;
- (c) Interest on securities and debentures continued to be exempt upto Rs. 5,000. The interest on compensation bonds issued in lieu of shares of nationalized concerns was also to be treated at par with the interest on securities for the purposes of tax exemption.
- (3) The guaranteed return on NIT units was increased from paisas eighty-five to one Rupee ten paisas per unit and interest on Defence Savings Certificates was also increased for various periods of retention by about two per cent;
- (4) the investment limits were raised to Rs. one lac in respect of Defence Savings Certificates, National Deposit Certificates and Seven-year Deposit account and to Rs. seventy-five thousand in respect of Three-year Khas Deposit Certificates.

The Government introduce a new tax credit scheme to encourage the investment of corporate savings. According to this scheme the investment in equities of approved industrial undertakings set up between 1st July, 1974 and 30th June, 1980 will qualify for a tax credit equal to 15% of the amount invested provided the undertaking is not located in the Tehsils of Karachi, Lahore and its contiguous areas of Shahdara across the river, Lyallpur and Hyderabad. For undertakings located in Baluchistan, Northern Areas, the Tribal areas and Azad Kashmir, a tax credit of thirty percent will be allowed. The minimum period of investment will be five years.

**Khawaja Mohammad Safdar :** Supplementary, Sir.

**Mr. Chairman :** Question No. 43.

#### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY QUETTA

**43. Mr. Zamarrud Hussain :** Will the Minister for Commerce be pleased to state :

(a) whether Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Quetta (Baluchistan) is a registered body according to the law and Federal Government has issued the requisite licence;

(b) where it is a fact that elections to the said body were held according to its Articles of Association and intimation to this effect was given to the Government;

(c) whether it is a fact that representation was given to the said body at different levels such as local and central advisor committees and trade mission abroad, etc.; and

(d) if reply of (a), (b) and (c) be in the affirmative the reasons for appointment of an Administrator and the dissolution of an elected and constitutional body?

**Mir Afzal Khan** (a) Yes.

(b) No.

(c) No, it was given representation only on the Commerce Ministry's Advisory Council.

(d) In view of replies to (b) and (c), this question does not arise. However, the facts are that soon after its registration in 1973, the Chamber got split up into two factions, each claiming the right to manage its affairs. Besides sending representations and counter-representations to the Federal Government, they resorted to litigation against each other. One of them took away the records, furniture establishment. The Federal Government made efforts to have the matter settled amicably first through the Provincial Government, and later through the Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry, but failed in these attempts because of the adamant attitude adopted by the two factions. Finally, an Administrator was appointed with effect from 1-8-74 for 6 months, with the object of holding elections and in the meantime, to manage its affairs. The Administrator will hand over the management of the Chamber to the elected representatives immediately after holding the elections.

**Mir Afzal Khan :** Soon after its registration in 1973, the Chamber got split up into two factions, one led by Prince Jam M. Yousaf and the other by Mr. Ibrahim Baloch. I do not have the names of the other members.

## SCHOLARSHIPS ABROAD

38. **Mr. Mohammad Zaman Khan Aghakzai** : Will the Minister for Education and Provincial Co-ordination be pleased to state :

(a) the number of students, year-wise and province-wise, to whom scholarships were awarded during the years 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74 for studies abroad;

(b) the province-wise aggregate amount of the scholarships for the years 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74;

(c) the field of study of the scholarship-holders and the names of the countries where studies were to be pursued;

(d) the names, parentage, profession and complete addresses of the persons belonging to Baluchistan who were sent for studies abroad during 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74; the field and duration of their studies and the amount of scholarship awarded to each of them ;

(e) the number of scholarships for studies abroad for 1974-75 reserved for persons belonging to Baluchistan; the amount of each scholarship alongwith the field of study; the names of countries where studies are to be pursued and the date when these scholarship-holders will be sent abroad; and

(f) the procedure prescribed for selection of candidates for awarding scholarships for studies abroad and the authority who makes the selection?

**Mr. Abdul Hafeez Pirzada :** (Minister for Education) : (a) The number of scholarships awarded during the years 1971-72, 1972-73 and 1973-74 for studies abroad to the students of various Provinces is detailed below :—

(c) The fields and countries of study are given in Annexure I.

(d) Necessary details in respect of the scholars who actually proceeded abroad during the period in question are given in Annexure II.

(e) (i) Out of the facilities offered by the Ministry of Education 8 were reserved for Baluchistan for the year 1974-75. In respect of scholarships offered by foreign countries/donor agencies, no reservation for any province is possible as the selection is made through an open competition on the basis of merit only. However, due consideration is given to candidates from Baluchistan and so far 6 nominations have been made for the year 1974-75.

(ii) The amount of scholarships vary in each case. In case of facilities offered by foreign Governments all expenses are borne by the donor agencies whereas the rates of allowances admissible to scholars financed by this Ministry are given in Annexure III.

(iii) The fields of studies along with the names of countries of study are the same as in Annexure I.

(iv) Date of departure varies from programmes to programmes.

In respect of facilities offered by the Ministry of Education the nominations are obtained from Provincial Government/Universities. In case of scholarships offered by foreign agencies nominations are asked for in certain cases while in others, the facilities are advertised, and the selection is made by a Selection Committee of the Ministry of Education on the basis of prescribed criteria and merit. However, due attention is paid to ensure appropriate representation of candidates from various provinces, particularly in case of candidates from under developed areas.

The following sentence was added at the end of printed answer at (d) (i) :-

"This is in addition to 8 reserved by the Federal Government."
