*(Def.) Question No. 25 Senator Danesh Kumar:

(Notice Received on 6/09/2024 at 12:15 PM) QID: 42377

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state whether it is fact that the directions of Hon'ble Supreme Court of Pakistan in Criminal Original Petition No.89/2011 (2013SCMR1752) and Civil Review Petition No. 193 of 2013(2015SCMR456) regarding repatriation of employees appointed on deputation are not being observed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, if so, the reasons thereof?

Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar: Ministry of Foreign Affairs has duly complied with the directions Honorable Supreme Court of Pakistan in Criminal Original Pet. No. 89/2011(2013 SCMR1752) and Civil Review Petition No.193 2013 (2015SCMR456) regarding repatriation of employees appointed on deputation.

Under the Civil Servants (APT) Rules, 1973, three modes of appointment have been provided, that is, by promotion, transfer and initial appointment. Rule 20A deals with appointment on deputation.

Ministry of Foreign Affairs utilizes the services of officers and officials for deputation who possess the requisite qualification and experience, for an initial period of three years by following in letter and spirit government instructions regarding the appointment of a deputationist.

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state whether it is a fact that there are no road lights installed form Chungi No. 26 to

Sangjani Toll Plaza on G.T. Road, if so, the reasons thereof, indicating also the timeline by which road light infrastructure would be installed and made operational?

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:The road section of G.T. Road from Chungi No. 26 to Sangjani Toll Plaza is under the jurisdiction of National Highway Authority under NHA Central Zone, Lahore. NHA undertakes repair and maintenance of the road section through various maintenance contracts, including provision of highway safety works, such as signboards, gantry signs, road markings and delineators, etc.

The NHA, however, does not provide any street lighting works on this or any other road network, being outside its mandate as per SOP. This road section and area falls under the domain of Capital Development Authority and various housing schemes along this road stretch of N-5. It is their prerogative to provide and maintain street lighting or otherwise. NHA is only restricted to the maintenance of road and thus, the provision of street lighting is outside its domain, as explained above.

*Question No. 67 **Senator Rana Mahmood Ul Hassan**: (Notice Received on 11/11/2024 at 9:54 AM) OID: 42608

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state whether it is a fact that a project for construction of a flyover was approved at Tarnol railway crossing, if so, the reasons for delay in starting said project and the timeline by which the said project will start?

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan: The consultancy contract agreement for the project, "Feasibility study and detailed design of Tarnol - Fatehjang- Jand N-80" was signed between NHA and M/s NESPAK (Pvt.) Ltd. in JV with M/s Al Engineers (Pvt.) Ltd and commenced on 07th Jan, 2021. The section-I of the said project is Flyover over Tarnol Railway Phattak along with Dualization of Tarnol Urban Area up to Naogazi (6.5Km approx).

The PC-1 for section I i.e. "Construction of Flyover over Tarnol Railway Pathak along with dualization of National Highway N-80 from Urban Area up to Noagazi" was submitted to the Ministry of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives through the Ministry of Communications dated 14th February, 2022 on IPAS for approval and allocation of funds for execution of the project. Unfortunately, the PC-1 was returned back on12-12-2022 citing financial constraints. NHA will only be in a position to execute the project, if Ministry of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives can assure the availability of funds for the project.

NHA does not have sufficient funds to initiate new projects. NHA therefore is prioritizing the allocation of available resources, towards the completion of ongoing projects.

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Pakistan Mission in Germany has communicated the request for signing dual nationality / citizenship agreement with Germany to accommodate the Pakistani diaspora in Germany, if so, the steps taken / being taken by the Government indicating also the time required for signing such agreement between Pakistan and Germany?

Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar: The German government has created a space for dual citizenship in their law effective from 27 June 2024. This has

enabled the applicants to retain their original citizenship in addition to German citizenship.

- 2. Subsequent to the significant shift in Germany's citizenship policy, the Ministry and Pakistan Embassy in Berlin have been requesting the Ministry of Interior to consider either of the following:
 - (i) Signing Dual Nationality Agreement with Germany or
 - (ii) Making necessary provisions/amendments in our law to allow dual nationality arrangement with Germany, enabling German citizens of Pakistani origin, to reclaim their Pakistani nationality, that they had renounced on acquiring German citizenship.
- 3. Currently, in the context of Germany, the Government of Pakistan allows the dual citizenship only for the children of Pakistani parents who have grown up in Germany, and who have due to their birth in Germany acquired German nationality in addition to their parent's nationality from the other state. It, however, does not allow Pakistani origin individuals to reclaim their Pakistani citizenship, earlier renounced to acquire the German Nationality.
- 4. Last year Directorate General of Immigration & Passport (IMPASS) conveyed NOC to the Ministry of Interior regarding dual nationality arrangements with Germany. IMPASS also intimated that Amendments in Section 14-A of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951 is already proposed and the Bill in this regard has been sent to the quarters concerned. After passing the Bill from the Parliament, such Pakistani citizens who have renounced their Pakistani nationality in the past, will get the opportunity to reclaim their Pakistani Citizenship.
- 5. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, on its part is pursuing with Interior Ministry to expedite the process, to enable the Pakistani Diaspora in Germany to regain their Pakistani Nationality.

- **Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar:** (a) Currently, there are 26 sanctioned posts of Pakistani diplomats of BS-18 and above serving in 10 Pakistani High Commissions/Embassies/Consulates in Australia, USA, New Zealand and Bangkok.
- (b) Details of incumbents are given as Annexure. The Ministry is consolidating details and will share the same with Honourable mover of the question as & when the same are compiled.

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state whether it is a fact that Crown Prince Muhammad bin Salman during his visit of 2019 announced release of 2107 Pakistani prisoners from Saudi jails, if so, the progress made in this regard, indicating also the number of Pakistani prisoner released so far?

Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar: The data of the prisoners released since the visit of HRH Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman to Pakistan is as follows:

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Government is drafting a uniform consular protection policy for Pakistanis imprisoned in foreign jails, if so, details thereof?

Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar: The Ministry is developing a comprehensive consular policy through stakeholder consultations. While this policy is being formulated, Pakistan continues to protect its citizens abroad through established international frameworks such as consular protection enshrined in Article 36(c) of the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations 1963. Under this framework, our consular officers: visit Pakistani nationals in prison or

detention, converse and correspond with detained nationals and arrange legal representation for them.

Our missions abroad continue to facilitate repatriation/deportation, provide legal support, and offer financial assistance where possible.

*Question No. 73 **Senator Dr. Zarqa Suharwardy Taimur**:

Will the Federal Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state:

- (a) total number of Pakistani prisoners presently imprisoned in the foreign jails with country, gender, crime and sentence-wise breakup indicating also the dates of release from jail in each case; and
- (b) total number of Pakistanis on death sentence in foreign countries with country, gender and crime-wise breakup in each case during past 10 years?
- **Mr. Mohammad Ishaq Dar:** (a) The Ministry of Foreign Affairs maintains records of Pakistani nationals imprisoned abroad based on information provided by our diplomatic Missions. According to the current data, approximately 23,456 Pakistani nationals are imprisoned in various countries worldwide. The largest concentrations are in the Gulf region, particularly in Saudi Arabia (12,156) and UAE (5292). The list containing the information is attached.
- (b) The Ministry is in the process of obtaining and consolidating updated data of past 10 years, as desired by the Mover of the Question, from all of its Missions and submissions. The same will be shared with the Honourable Mover, as and when the same is compiled.

*Question No. 74 **Senator Aon Abbas:**

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that cotton cess has not been collected from cotton mills since 2016, if so, the total amount of such cotton cess

indicating also the cotton mill wise details of unpaid cotton cess; and

(b) whether it is also a fact that a cut of 25-35% has been imposed on the salaries and pensions of employees of Pakistan Central Cotton community for making up a recovery on failure of cotton mills in paying cotton cess?.

Rana Tanveer Hussain: (a) Yes, it is a fact that cotton cess is not being paid by textile mills since 2016. Few mills are making partial payment and some mills are not paying at all their cess liability.

The total cess collection has fallen from Rs. 631.72 million in 2014-15 to Rs. 293 million in 2023-24, while arrears have accumulated to over Rs. 3 billion. The summary of mills paying, partially paying and not paying is as below:

(b) No. It is not the cut of 25-30% rather employees of PCCC are getting only 25-30% of their salaries (since June 2022) due to financial crunch the institution is facing. Cotton cess is the only source of funding for PCCC and drop in cess recovery is the main reason for this state of affair. Efforts have been made for recovery of outstanding cess amount from the defaulter textile mills.

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Government plans to start construction of M-6 Motorway from Karachi to Sukkur, instead of the previously planned route from Hyderabad to Sukkur, if so, indicate specific modalities being considered for its construction such as potential Public Private Partnership (PPP) or consortium options between the Federal and Provincial Governments?

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:

- ➤ The Government plans to construct a green field motorway project from Karachi to Sukkur.
- > The detailed design and revised cost estimation of the Hyderabad Sukkur motorway section has already been completed and will be undertaken as per its Original alignment/route under Public Private Partnership (PPP).
- As per P3A law NHA has submitted the Project Qualification Proposal (PQP) of Hyderabad-Sukkur motorway to Public Private Partnership Authority (P3A) on the basis of sections for their approval.
- ➤ Regarding, new Karachi-Hyderabad motorway section, it is apprised that the PC-II .for hiring of consultant to undertake feasibility study; is under process for the approval of DDWP. The procurement of consultant to undertake the feasibility study will be initiated after approval of DDWP.
- ➤ GoP/NHA and Sindh government have had consultative meetings to explore the possibilities of collaboration and further meetings will be held in due course of time.

Will the Minister for Maritime Affairs be pleased to state whether it is a fact that Government has initiated or plans to initiate public awareness campaigns addressing the devastating effects of marine pollution on Karachi's marine life, if so, the details thereof?

Mr. Qaiser Ahmed Sheikh: Ministry of Maritime Affairs cognizant of increasing marine pollution issue is actively engaged with stakeholders to mitigate the impacts of marine pollution i.e. one is from ships and the other is from land & industries. The pollution by ships is effectively being managed by compliance to international Convention MARPOL. Pakistan is a signatory of this Convention, and the Ministry of Maritime Affairs is committed to follow international precautionary standards especially those pertaining to oil and garbage from the ships. The Ministry implements these standards / SOPs through the Karachi Port Trust, Port Qasim Authority and Gwadar Port Authority. However, the pollution from land sources is still a challenge as it involves multiple stakeholder's i.e. local government institutions. Moreover, Ministry of Maritimes constituted Marine Pollution Control Board (MPCB) on 25th February, 2009 to address Marine Pollution issues and to ensure remedial steps to mitigate its effects on sea lives. Further, a Working Group constituted under MPCB has actively engaged the stakeholders and had various follow up meetings. Further, a Task Force under convenorship of Pakistan Navy has been established on 30.10.2024 and first meeting was held on 03-01-2025. The Task Force will prepare on marine pollution and submit its report within three months and its recommendations will be presented in MPCB for policy directions. Such regulator meeting of MPCB and Working Group are not only a source of interaction amongst the stakeholders but also create awareness at various levels on the subject matter.

In additions Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ports & Shipping Wing, has planned a series of awareness seminars and public meetings on reduction of marine pollution.

Will the Minister for Inter-Provincial Coordination be pleased to state whether it is a fact that Government has taken note of poor performance of Pakistan Football team during the last five years, if so, the details thereof, indicating also if there is any proposal under consideration to allocate funds to Pakistan Football team?

Minister for Inter-Provincial Coordination: The Pakistan Football Federation (PFF) is affiliated with the Pakistan Sports Board (PSB) and recognized by the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) and Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA). The last elections of the PFF were held in 2018 but were not recognized by FIFA. Subsequently, FIFA appointed a Normalization Committee on 13th September 2019 with certain mandates including to conducting PFF elections. The composition of the Normalization

Committee has been revised multiple times, with the current Chairman, Mr. Haroon Malik, appointed on 19th January 2021.

The Normalization Committee has been arranging participation of the Pakistan Football team. The PSB has been facilitating the team with provision of No Objection Certificates (NOCs) for international events. However, the Normalization Committee has never submitted Post Visit Reports, which are required by PSB within 10 days of an event's conclusion to evaluate the team's performance.

Due to the absence of a democratic setup within the PFF, the PSB has not provided any financial grants to the federation. Elections at the provincial level have been conducted, and the next steps for the Normalization Committee are to amend the PFF Constitution and hold PFF elections. once a democratic structure is established, the government will support the Pakistan Football team within available resources. It is noteworthy that the PSB has raised concerns about the election process adopted by the Normalization Committee but has not received any satisfactory response.

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state whether it is fact that G.T Road stretch connecting Motorway with Tarnol railway crossing leading towards B-17 is in deteriorating condition and metro buses are also plying on the same route, if so, the reasons for delay in its repair, indicating also the department responsible for its maintenance and the time by which the said portion of the G.T road will be repaired?

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan: It is a fact that NHA is responsible for maintenance of G.T Road stretch connecting Motorway with Tarnol Railway crossing leading towards B-17, which is in a satisfactory, motorable condition and presently, traffic is plying smoothly on it.

It is further submitted that the Routine Maintenance Contracts on the said reach of N-5 have recently expired. The acceptance letters of new RM Contracts have been issued. Subsequently, the concerned; contractors shall be directed to mobilize at site and execute the required repair work on main carriageway so as to provide smooth and pothole-free road to the commuters and general public.

Moreover, the G.T Road portion from Rawalpindi to Hassanabdal has been selected for addition of 3rd lane in the project to be funded by Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) which is presently at design stage. After execution, it will further improve the road condition of this section.

(a) whether it is a fact that National Agricultural Research Council (NARC) has imparted training to farmers belonging to Sindh, if so, number of farmers trained during the last five years alongwith nature of training imparted in each case with year-wise breakup; and

(b) whether there is any proposal to conduct more of such trainings for the farmers of Sindh in future, if so, the details thereof?

Rana Tanveer Hussain: (a) Pakistan Agricultural Research Council (PARC), through its premier institute, the National Agriculture Research Centre (NARC), has played a pivotal role in capacity building by training farmers, agriculture officers, extension personnel's and field assistants across Pakistan. These training initiatives are implemented through various institutes under NARC, including the Agricultural Polytechnique Institute (API).

API, NARC, organized a specialized training program on **Integrated Pest Management of Sugarcane by Developing Biologically Based Management Practices,** during which 20 farmers were trained (Annex-I).

Additionally, the Southern Zone Agricultural Research Centre (SARC) Karachi, a key regional affiliate of PARC, has actively conducted numerous training programs specifically for farmers from Sindh. To date, 10,043 farmers have been trained under these programs, which are meticulously designed to address the unique agricultural challenges faced in the Sindh region.

The details of these trainings along with the Participants list, are also attached (Annex-II)

(b) Training programs for Farmers are an on-going activity under the Pakistan Agricultural Research Council (PARC). However, SARC Karachi regularly conduct such trainings. Proposals for future trainings are developed as a part of new projects and will continue to be coordinated in future as well.

- (b) Regarding abolishing of different posts, following is submitted:
- i. Posts in NHMP are created in accordance with the length of roads, number of offices and keeping in view workload as per requirements of the department. The creation of posts is dealt in accordance with a formula developed by the Establishment Division (MS Wing) through a comprehensive study carried out in the year 2016, revised/updated in the year 2021.
- ii. Keeping in view the operational requirements, NHMP on its own, initiated a rationalization drive and carried out a comprehensive analysis of its operations, existing manpower and future requirements etc. As a result of rationalization, with the concurrence of Establishment Division and approval of Austerity Committee of Finance Division, total 2,748- posts in different ranks have been abolished, while, 2,585-posts have been created in lieu of abolished posts, thereby reducing overall 163-posts. The detail of posts abolished and created alongwith relevant letter is attached as Annex-B

Will the Minister for Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development be pleased to state:

(a) total number of Pakistanis prisoners in UAE at present, along with crime wise break up; and

(b) The steps taken or being taken by the Government to repatriate such prisoners from UAE indicating legal and financial assistance provide during the last five years?

Chaudhry Salik Hussain: (a) Pakistani Missions in UAE have repeatedly requested the host Ministry of Foreign Affairs to provide an updated list of Pakistani prisoners with comprehensive details, including the nature of the crime und the length of the sentence. Despite our efforts, the requested information has not yet been provided by the concerned authorities. The last official communication received by the Embassy from the UAE authorities was in July 2023. According to this report, 5,292 Pakistani nationals are currently incarcerated in various jails across the UAE (list attached at Annex-A). The provided list includes the names of the prisoners, the nature of their crimes, and the detention centers where they are being held. The most common crimes committed by Pakistanis in the UAE are mentioned in Annex "B".

(b) The Missions have undertaken several efforts to assist Pakistani prisoners under their jurisdiction:

The Consular teams of the Pakistani Missions in the UAE regularly conduct visits to local prisons and deportation centers to ensure the wellbeing of Pakistani prisoners/detainees. On average, 5 to 8 visits are conducted weekly by the Community Welfare Attaches (CWAs) in the UAE. During these visits, many prisoners report medical issues and request assistance in obtaining medical check-ups. The Missions promptly contact the jail authorities to ensure these prisoners receive the necessary medical care.

The Missions are dedicated to providing comprehensive legal assistance to Pakistani nationals incarcerated in the UAE. While local regulations dictate that only Emirati lawyers are authorized to represent individuals in court, the Missions play a crucial role by offering legal advice to prisoners. Annually, the Missions provide free legal consultation and guidance to approximately 250 Pakistanis. This includes guidance on their legal rights, the judicial process, and any available avenues for appeal, ensuring that the prisoners are fully informed and their rights are respected in line with local laws.

The Consulate supports in provision of air tickets (mostly arranged through donors/philanthropists) for the prisoners ready for deportation. In this regard, the mission has provided around 125 air tickets to detained Pakistanis during last year.

Many Pakistanis request the Mission's help in arranging meetings with their relatives in jail. The Missions formally request the UAE Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) to facilitate these meetings and issue No Objection Certificates to enable families to meet with the prisoners.

The Missions also respond to families who report that prisoners have not been deported back to Pakistan despite completing their jail terms. In such cases, the Missions immediately contact the jail authorities to expedite the deportation process.

Additionally, the Missions assist Pakistanis who wish to arrange phone calls with their jailed relatives by coordinating with jail authorities to register phone numbers and set up the calls. For those in financial need, the Missions deposit funds into the jail accounts of deserving prisoners to support their families.

Will the Minister for Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development be pleased to state:

- (a) the details of laborers and workers belonging to Balochistan registered by Employees' Old-Age Benefits Institution (EOBI) since January 2023 till date along with their names;
- (b) whether it is a fact that a large number of mine workers and laborers are awaiting registration with EOBI, if so, the details thereof; and
- (c) details of challenges in registering mine workers with the EOBI in Balochistan mining industry?

Chaudhry Salik Hussain: (a) Employees Old-Age benefits Institution (EOBI) has registered 7,310 employees/workers in the Province of Balochistan since January, 2023.

The detail of these employees is placed at **Annexure-'A'**

Further, against these 7,310 employees, EOBI has registered 2,025 mine workers in Balochistan

The detail of these mine workers is placed at **Annexure-'B'**.

- (b) There is no application pending for registration of any mine worker.
- (c) EOBI is facing multifarious challenges in registration of mine workers in Balochistan Some of which are mentioned as under:
 - 1. Disturbing situation of law & order at mining areas which restricts frequent visits of field officers. Operation is underway by the security forces at mining areas such as marwar, Mach, Dukki, Sharigh and other areas of Balochistan where mining companies are located.
 - 2. Mining companies are usually law evasive and reluctant to register their workers with EOBI because the mine owners do not take the Ownership of mining labour as being hired by their contractors.
 - 3. Mining sector is informal in nature; spread of mining sites to far flung areas make it difficult to track mines and mine workers.
 - 4. Mining labour drop-out ratio is also comparatively high-due to informal nature.
 - 5. The mining labour are mostly on piece rate workers and not paid a regular monthly wages and hence no proper record is maintained with the company.

Despite all these challenges, EOBI field officers are actively following up with the non-compliant mine owners which is reflected from the fact that over 2000 mine workers are registered with EOBI since January, 2023.

Chaudhry Salik Hussain: (a) After 18th constitutional amendment the Directorate of Workers Education regional centers located in provincial cities were devolved and transferred to respective Provincial Governments.

The present office of DWE in Islamabad conducts training activities for the workers of Federal Capital territory. The mines workers training is provincial subject and provinces have offices of Workers Education.

(b) As mentioned above the mines workers training is provincial subject and provinces have offices of Workers Education.

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

STEAM Pakistan is an initiative of the M/o FE&PT that was configured to be rolled out in all provinces/regions in a staggered manner. The first STEAM Policy Unit (the one responsible for establishing school partnerships, among other deliverables) was set up in M/o FE&PT, Islamabad in March 2022, followed by the following sequence of Policy Unit setup in the provinces:

- STEAM Policy Unit, SE&LD, Sindh June 2022
- Policy Unit, SED, GB August 2022
- STEAM Policy Unit, SED, Punjab Jan 2023
- STEAM Policy Unit, E&SED, KP- February 2024
- STEAM policy unit, SED Balochistan to be set up in 2025

<u>Balochistan:</u> STEAM Pakistan initiative is being implemented in 8 schools from Federal Government Educational Institution (FGEI) and 1 SED school from 4 districts (Dera Bugti, Gwadar, Karachi, and Quetta).

PAMS will be formally requesting the establishment of the STEAM Policy Unit in the 2nd quarter of 2025. The organization is already providing technical support to the School Education Department (on the Foundational Learning Policy), the Chief Secretary's office (Education Oversight Committee), and the Minister's office (Minister Education Delivery Unit).

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa: In 2024, STEAM Pakistan had extended the program outreach in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa via the E&SED & FGEI in 13 districts.
