Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) the quantity and value of tea imported in the country during the period from January, 2022 to December, 2024 with year wise break-up;*
- (b) the details/measurement of land under cultivation of tea leaves in the country with area wise break up indicating also the percentage of national demand of tea leaves met by the domestic production; and*
- (c) the steps taken/being taken by the Government to promote local cultivation and production of tea leave to meet the domestic demands?*

Rana Tanveer Hussain: (a) **The quantity and value of tea imported since January, 2022 to December, 2024.**

- Established National Tea Research Station (NTRS) Shinkiari, in 1986 later upgraded to institute in 1996
- PARC-National Tea and High Value Crops Research Institute (NTHRI) Shinkiari, Mansehra has developed tea varieties, technologies related to tea plantation, orchard management, tea nursery raising and processing of Black & Green tea
- Installed processing units of Black and Green Tea
- Identified approximately 158,000 acres land suitable for tea cultivation, with 154,000 acres in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (including hilly regions of Mansehra and parts of Swat) and 4,000 acres in Azad Jammu and Kashmir.

- Produced more than 5.0 million tea nursery plants annually
- Produced 24,210 kg of black and green tea during the last five years (2020-2024)

Rana Tanveer Hussain: (a) The criteria and Recruitment Rules for the post of Plant Protection Advisor & Director General, Department of Plant Protection (DPP) vide SRO No.1332(1)/2021, dated 04th October, 2021 are as follows:-

(b) The Department of Plant Protection (DPP) is an attached department of M/o NFS&R. The post of Director General (DG), DPP has been filled in multiple times on deputation basis, current/ additional charge and under Section-10 of Civil Servants Act, 1973 by transfer/posting of cadre and ex-cadre officers due to non-availability of regular incumbents. There are only four sanctioned posts of Director (Technical) which are feeding cadre posts of Director General (DG), DPP. One post is vacant whereas other three available incumbents of the post of Director (Technical) are placed under suspension and E&D proceedings have been initiated against them under E&D Rules, 2020 due to excess import of wheat and interceptions of rice export to European Union (EU), which caused huge loss to the national exchequer and damaged the repute of country. In view of this, the present incumbent of the post of Director General has also been appointed under Section 10 of the Civil Servants Act 1973 which states that “Every Civil Servant shall be liable to serve anywhere within or outside Pakistan, in any equivalent or higher post under the Federal Government, or any Provincial Government or local authority, or corporation or body set up or established by any such Government”.

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) the quantity and value of domestic wheat production during current year indicating also its percentage share of the national demand; and*
- (b) the steps taken or being taken by the Government to meet shortfall of wheat demand in the country, if any?*

Rana Tanveer Hussain: (a) The availability of wheat during current year is 33.52 MMT including 5.08 MMT carry forward stocks against the National requirement of 33.58 MMT for Food Year 2025-26 which has a percentage share of 99.82% in the national demand.

(b) As per provincial crop reporting services (CRS) and SUPARCO there is a shortfall of 0.06 MMT however, LIMS and FAO have reported surplus of 0.11 MMT to 2.82 MMT respectively for food year -2025-26 against the National requirement of 33.58 MMT. Final estimates of KP and Balochistan are still awaited.

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the prices of agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizers are increasing in the country despite reduction in their prices at global level, if so, the reasons thereof; and*
- (b) the steps taken/being taken by the Government to curb exploitation of farmers by input suppliers and middlemen?*

Rana Tanveer Hussain:

(a) The statement that the prices of agricultural inputs like fertilizers are increasing in the country despite reduction in their prices at global level is not true. Urea and DAP are main fertilizers having cumulative 85% share in total fertilizer use. A downward trend in urea prices in domestic market has been observed since July 2024 (**Annex-I**). Price of urea was Rs. 4365 per 50 kg bag in July 2025 (PBS) compared to Rs. 4,705 per 50 kg bag during July 2024, thereby witnessing decrease of 7.2 %. In contrast, there has been 32.6 % increase in urea prices in international market during same timeframe. Ex-Karachi price of imported urea was Rs. 8,383 per 50 kg bag during July 2025. Similarly, there has been 17.1 % increase in DAP prices in domestic market for period between July 2024 and July 2025 compared to 34.7 % increase in international market during same time frame (**Annex-II**).

(b) The Government has taken following measures in coordination with provinces to avoid the exploitation of farmers by input suppliers and middlemen.

1. Fertilizer Review Committees meeting are regularly convened to proactively tackle any shortage of fertilizers in the country.
2. Buffer stocks of fertilizers are being maintained for stabilization of market prices of fertilizers.
3. Uninterrupted Supply of Gas was ensured to all Urea manufacturing plants for maximum production to make the market supply abundant.
4. Federal Government is mandated to ensure the quality and availability of the Seed in the country while Provincial Governments are responsible to monitor the prices of seeds.
5. Federal Government in coordination with Provincial Government is ensuring the quality of seed through field inspections, seed testing in laboratories and seed act enforcement in the market.

In addition to above, the Provincial Governments also take actions to protect the interests of the farmers.

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) *the steps taken or being taken by the Government to ensure availability of seed, fertilizers and pesticides in the country as per domestic agricultural needs during last three years; and*
- (b) *the actions taken against manufacturing/ sale of spurious/ substandard seed, fertilizers and pesticides in the country during the last three years with year wise breakup?*

Rana Tanveer Hussain:

a. Federal Government has taken following steps to ensure availability of fertilizer:

- i) Two SNGPL network-based urea-manufacturing plants (Fatima Fert and Agritech) are operational since April 2023 due to which domestic production is augmented by 75 thousand tonnes per month.
- ii) Full gas pressure is being supplied to FFC (Port Qasim) plant which has led to enhancement in domestic production by 25 thousand tonnes per month.
- iii) Imported 220 thousand tonnes of urea during Rabi 2023-24 to bridge the supply/demand gap.

Steps Taken by the Government to Ensure Availability of Seed During the Last Three Years

The Federal government through M/o NFSR regulatory authority i.e the National Seed Development & Regulatory Authority (NSDRA)—has undertaken a series of strategic and regulatory reforms over the last three years to ensure the timely availability of quality seed in alignment with domestic agricultural needs. These measures address declining yields, stagnating productivity, and evolving climate challenges in major crops.

Key steps include:

1. **Revamping of the Variety Evaluation Committee (VEC):**
A comprehensive overhaul of the VEC system for major crops (wheat, cotton, rice, and maize) has been initiated to ensure scientific credibility, transparency, and expedited approval of high-yielding, climate-resilient seed varieties.
2. **Digitization and Automation through MIS Platform:**
A Management Information System (MIS) has been launched to digitize seed company and nursery registration, variety evaluation, and seed

certification. This ensures reduced processing time, improved accuracy, and transparent governance across the seed value chain.

3. Truth in Labeling Scheme: This initiative is being taken to ensure that high quality seed reaches farmers on fast-track basis, and technology adoption is accelerated.

These reforms represent a fundamental transition towards a **digitally enabled, farmer-focused, and performance-driven seed system** that ensures availability, boosts productivity, and enhances national seed security. A summary of seed availability for the year 2024–25 is attached for reference. **(Annex-I)**

Will the Minister for Federal Education and Professional Training be pleased to state whether there is any policy framework for providing vocational training to youth enabling them for working in industries and manufacturing sector, if so, the details thereof?

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

The Ministry of Federal Education & Professional Training, through the National Vocational & Technical Training Commission (NAVTTTC), has developed a comprehensive policy framework aimed at equipping youth with market-driven skills and enhancing their employability in industries and the manufacturing sector.

The key initiatives under this framework include:

1. Industrial Led Training (ILT) Program
 - o Under this initiative, NAVTTTC partners with leading industrial associations and chambers to design and implement training programs in line with the actual requirements of the industry.
 - o Training is conducted within industrial premises and supervised by industry experts, ensuring that trainees acquire hands-on, practical skills that meet current market standards.
 - o This model creates a direct pipeline of skilled workers for industries, enhancing productivity and ensuring immediate employability.
2. Cluster-Based Industrial Training Program with Provincial TEVTAs
 - o NAVTTTC has also collaborated with Provincial Technical Education & Vocational Training Authorities (TEVTAs) to roll out cluster-based training programs across various industrial zones.
 - o These programs are tailored to the specific needs of local industries, such as textiles, leather, surgical instruments, light engineering, construction, and emerging sectors.

o By leveraging the TEVTA infrastructure and linking it with local industrial clusters, the program ensures efficient delivery of vocational training and absorption of trained youth into the labor market.

3: Sector Specific Training Programs Under Prime Minister's Youth Skill Development Program

o Under the ambit of PMYSDP besides trainings in conventional and IT trades, the focus has been shifted on priority sectors where the government intends to bring investments in short term and long term. To cater for the needs of these sectors and allied industries the training program is now allocated to the sectors where highest priority is given. The sectors where training program is now prioritized are presented below:

- o Manufacturing & Textile
- o Hospitality & Tourism.
- o Aesthetics
- o Aesthetics, Health Care & Services
- o Construction with Electrical/Energy
- o HMO & Driving Trades
- o Languages
- o Mines & Minerals

Through these interventions, NAVTTC ensures that vocational training is demand-driven, industry-aligned, and geographically responsive to Pakistan's major industrial clusters. This framework is designed not only to address the skills mismatch in the labor market but also to contribute to Pakistan's industrial growth, export competitiveness, and youth employment.

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan: (a) As per the traffic data provided by m/s MORE – the Concessionaire (Copy of M/s MORE letter is enclosed at Annex-A), average daily traffic is 130,000 vehicles while the amount of tax collected is not shared by M/s MORE.

(b) As per the Tolling Policy, exemption from toll tax, is as follows:

- Provincial and National. Highway & Motorway Police.
- Fire Brigades
- Ambulances
- Armed Forces of Pakistan vehicles bearing broad arrow number plates
- Vehicles having. Supreme Court/ High Court Flags/insignia. Plates

(c) Paragraph 3(b) (ii) (A) of Schedule-I (Toll Structure) to the Concession Agreement states that ten percent (10%) annual toll escalation shall be applied from the Second (2nd) operational year of the concession period.

- i. Details of the functions and responsibilities of the Institute of Strategic Studies, Islamabad?

Answer:

The Institute of Strategic Studies, Islamabad (ISSI) is an autonomous, non-profit research and policy organization operating under the administrative control of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Its core mandate is to conduct independent, evidence-based research on issues of international politics, security, economy, and diplomacy with particular focus on matters affecting Pakistan's national interests. The Institute produces policy papers, research reports, and analytical briefs for government decision-makers; organizes conferences, seminars, and expert dialogues to foster informed debate; maintains linkages with national and international think-tanks; and disseminates its findings through publications and public outreach. Through these activities ISSI provides timely, objective recommendations to support Pakistan's foreign policy formulation and to enhance understanding of regional and global strategic trends.

- (a) *whether it is a fact that the road between Motorway and Lawari Tunnel is in dilapidated condition, if so, the details and reasons thereof; and*
- (b) *whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to repair or reconstruct the said road, if so, the details thereof?*

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:

- (a) **No.** The road between Motorway/Swat Expressway (Chakdara Interchange) and Lowari Tunnel is in good trafficable condition, free from any defects and currently being maintained throughout the year through routine maintenance works.

Currently, two nos. of periodic maintenance works are in progress between Motorway (Chakdara Interchange) & Lowari Tunnel on N-45 from Km: 140-155 (Rani to Akhagram) **amounting to Rs. 598 Million** and Km 155-193 (Akhagram to Dir) **amounting to Rs. 842 Million** respectively, wherein **35% & 56% progress respectively** has been made. Completion is expected by end Nov 2025.

Upon completion of the above, the road section from Km 140 upto Km 193 of N-45 shall also be improved, free from any defects.

(b) National Highway N-45 from Chakdara to Chitral Project is planned to be executed in following three (3) sections with funding from Korean EXIM Bank:

Section-I: Chakdara-Timergara project (39 KM)

- Loan Agreement signed.
- Feasibility Study completed.
- Procurement of Consultancy Services has been completed. Consultant is carrying out field surveys and investigations. The project is in the phase of detailed Design and PC-I is under preparation.
- Procurement of Civil Works will be initiated after completion of detailed Design and PC-I.

Section-II: Akhagram-Dir project (43 KM)

- Loan Agreement signed.
- Feasibility Study completed.
- Procurement of Consultancy Services for preparation of detailed design and formulation of

PC-I is in progress in line with the guidelines of Korcan Exim Bank. RFP has been reviewed by the EXIM Bank, and their comments are being addressed by NHA.

Section-III: Kalkatak-Chitral project (48 Km)

- Loan Agreement signed.
- Feasibility Study completed.
- Detailed Design has been completed.
- The CDWP in its meeting held on 26th June 2024 approved this project at a cost of Rs 10,950.519 million to be funded through the Korean EXIM Bank. Revised PC-I for the mentioned amount has been received from the consultant and is being reviewed by NHA.
- Procurement of Civil Works was initiated by NHA, but process was annulled due to High Bid Price quoted by the bidder.
- Project is in phase of re-bidding. Bid Documents have been shared with K-EXIM for their review and concurrence. IFB will be uploaded after approval of Bidding Documents from K-EXIM Bank.



As such, there is no proposal under consideration to construct Mastuj-Broghil road Upper Chitral.

- (a) *the number of toll plazas established on Motorways and National Highways in the country with province wise break up indicating also the details of contractors to whom the same have been leased out; and*
- (b) *the procedure adopted for leasing out the said toll plazas?*

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:

(a) NHA manages road networks i.e. **motorways, national highways strategic roads and tunnels.**

- The motorway network operates on a closed-loop system, where entry and exit are controlled through interchanges, and tolls are charged on a per-kilometer basis. The detail of number of Toll Plazas established on Motorways across the country with province wise breakup and contractors' names, is at **Annex-A.**
 - The **national highway network** follows an **open-loop system**, where toll plazas are established at different locations, and tolls are charged on a **per-plaza crossing basis**. The detail of number of Toll Plazas established on National Highways in the country with province wise breakup, contractors' names and updated contract/procurement status, is at **Annex-B.**
- (b) O&M Contracts of toll plazas are awarded in line with the provisions of Public Procurement Regulatory Authority (PPRA) Rules through competitive bidding process. Procurement of toll plazas is based on reserve prices which is determined by the National Transport Research Centre (NTRC), as third party validation.

Prospective eligible bidders (registered with PEC in Operator category) are encouraged to participate on equal opportunity basis. This mechanism ensures award of O&M Contracts in a transparent manner based on merit, competitiveness, and fair play to generate potential revenue.

In the recent past, to encourage broader participation, maximum revenue generation and to ensure competition, NHA has adopted the auction mode for award of its O&M Contracts of toll plazas for financial year 2025-26.

***Question No.10 Senator Abdul Shakoor Khan:**
(Notice Received on 1/09/2025 at 4:07 PM) QID: 43398

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) *whether it is a fact that the services of a number of persons belonging to Balochistan who have been working as Locust Assistants (BS-11) in Plant Protection Department on contract basis @ Rs.30,000/- p.m. since 2021, have been terminated in 2025 without any formal notice /reasons, if so, the reasons thereof; and*
- (b) *whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to provide alternate employment to the said persons, if so, the details thereof?*

Rana Tanveer Hussain:

(a) It is apprised that initially 50 Locust Assistants were appointed on contract basis for the period of two years during the year 2021 vide P.M summary No. 9-13/1997-Admn-II (DPP) dated 06-05-2020. Among these 50 contract Locust Assistants 15 belonged to Balochistan. The contract period of Locust Assistant (BS-11) was extended from time to time till June, 2025. The Locust Assistants who performed duties on contract basis left job due to some of the different reasons and finally 21 Locust Assistants served in DPP in 2024-2025 out of which 06 belonged to Balochistan. DPP has been under major transformation and NAFSA Ordinance has been promulgated to replace the archaic structure of DPP. In line with measures to reform the DPP, major restructuring of staff is also under process. Pursuant to the Cabinet Decision, regarding rightsizing of the department, significant number of regular employees of DPP have been proposed to be placed in surplus pool. out of 225 vacant posts, 165 posts of DPP are under process for abolishment. In this context, it is stated that the DPP is under transition phase and Government is in process of replacing DPP with NAFSA and accordingly HR structure of DPP is under transformation.

As the contract of the 21 Locust Assistants was not prematurely discontinued, therefore no notice was served. However, their extended contract period matured on 30-06-2025 and it was not extended due to decision of government on rightsizing as DPP is undergoing transition phase and NAFSA has no provision for Locust control.

(b) As per cabinet decision on rightsizing the department proposed significant number of regular employees of DPP have been proposed to be placed in surplus pool. The government may consider adjusting the regular surplus employees, however, there is no provision under rules to adjust/re-employ contract employees against any other post.

***Question No.11 Senator Abdul Shakoor Khan:**

Will the Minister for Federal Education and Professional Training be pleased to state:

- (a) *whether it is a fact that private universities in Islamabad do not allow summer vacations to their teaching staff, if so, reasons thereof; and*
- (b) *whether it is also a fact that in such universities teaching faculty is also assigned non-academic duties, if so, the steps taken or being taken by the Government to address such exploitation?*

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

- (a)** The Higher Education Commission (HEC) of Pakistan, through its "Policy Guidelines for Implementation of Uniform Semester System in Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) of Pakistan" (aligned with the National Qualifications Framework 2015), establishes a structured academic calendar comprising two primary semesters (Fall and Spring, each 16-18 weeks) and an optional Summer Semester (8-9 weeks). The Summer Semester is intended for remedial purposes, such as addressing course deficiencies or grade improvements, with enrolment limited to a maximum of 8 credit hours. Its offering is discretionary, contingent on institutional resources, including faculty availability, and is not mandatory. The policy guidelines are attached as **Annex-A**.

Based on responses received from private universities in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT), it is largely not a fact that they uniformly do not allow summer vacations to teaching staff. If the teaching staff is engaged on summer semesters, on a case-by-case basis, they are paid extra remuneration for it. The responses from universities are attached as **Annex-B**

- (b) It is largely not a fact that teaching faculty are systematically assigned non-academic duties. Faculty responsibilities are primarily focused on teaching, research, and related academic/institutional roles, in line with HEC guidelines and professional council regulations. However, they may only be assigned administrative responsibilities that directly support these functions, such as membership in statutory bodies including the Academic Council, ORIC, QEC & students-related mentoring, sports/recreational trips etc.

***Question No.12 Senator Abdul Shakoor Khan:**

(Notice Received on 2/09/2025 at 12:35 PM) QID: 43572

Will the Minister for Federal Education and Professional Training be pleased to state:

- (a) *the details of land owned by the Quaid-e-Azam University, Islamabad indicating also the area of such land currently encroached upon along with the steps taken or being taken by the Government to retrieve the same; and*
- (b) *whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to setup new departments, research programs/other projects on the utilized land of the university enable it to meet its financial requirements through the same, if so, the details thereof?*

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

- (a) Total land owned by Quaid-e-Azam University, Islamabad, measures 1,709 acres, 4 kanals, and 12 marlas. Of this, 298 acres are currently under unauthorized occupation, and an additional 152 acres have been identified as deficient based on the on-ground survey conducted by the Survey of Pakistan, resulting in a total shortfall of 450 acres.

The university has requested the CDA and local administration from time to time for retrieval of the university's land under occupation of illegal settlers/encroachers, however, the land is yet to be retrieved.

- (b) Quaid-e-Azam University is undergoing expansion in accordance with its Master Plan, with existing departments being enhanced and new academic units being established. Currently, the university hosts 29 departments, 5 centers, and 2 institutes. Plans are in place to increase student enrollment by introducing new disciplines, including Faculty of Medical Sciences, Software Engineering, Computer Engineering, Mass Communication, Artificial Intelligence, Cyber Security, Data Science, Internet of Things, Sport Sciences, Media Sciences, Analytical and Environmental Chemistry, Chemical Technology, Material Sciences, and Physical Chemistry.

At present the following PSDP projects are under execution:

- i. Provision of Academic & Research Facilities and Girls Hostel at QAU, Islamabad.
- ii. Establishment of China Pakistan Joint Research Center (CPJRC) on Earth Sciences at QAU, Islamabad.
- iii. Dr. A. Q. Khan Institute of Materials and Emerging Sciences.
- iv. Establishment of National Institute of Intelligence and Security Studies at QAU, Islamabad.

***Question No.13 Senator Zeeshan Khanzada:**

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state:

- (a) *whether it is a fact that Pakistan Medical and Dental council issues House Job certificates to Doctors, if so, the criteria laid down for the same;*
- (b) *the details of applicants who applied for issuance of the said certificate since 2024 indicating also the details of those who have been issued the same with date wise break up; and*
- (c) *whether it is a fact that a number of the said applicants have not been issued their certificates so far despite fulfilling the criteria, if so, the reasons thereof?*

Syed Mustafa Kamal:

(a) The medical and dental graduates are initially issued a provisional license. Upon successful completion of their house job / internship, they are granted a full license to practice. The relevant criteria are provided under the Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PM&DC) Regulations, 2023, which are publicly available on the official PM&DC website. For ease of reference, a copy is attached as **Annex-I**

(b) As per the PM&DC online licensing portal, since 2024 a total of 31,202 applications have been received. Out of these, 30,772 applications have been processed, and full licenses have been issued accordingly.

(c) Currently, 165 applications are pending due to deficiencies such as incomplete or inconsistent documentation, which must be duly rectified by the applicants. Additionally, 265 applications are under process due to verifications pending at the end of institutions.

(6) Any person, whose name has been entered in online database of registered medical practitioners or registered dental practitioners shall be entitled to receive from The Registrar a certificate of registration according to the category applied on the prescribed online forms. A copy of the Certificate shall be displayed prominently at the place of practice.

(7) Holder of Pakistan Origin Card (POC) shall enjoy all privileges of Pakistani citizens for the purpose of registration.

(8) Data of registered practitioners shall be provided on request in soft copy on payment as specified in these regulations.

PART-III

HOUSE JOB/INTERNSHIP

(9) As per sub section (1) of section 36 and sub section (1) of 37 of the Act, one year house job in clinical subjects in a hospital approved by the Council (as mentioned in Schedule 4 of PM&DC Act 2022) is required, for entitlement of full registration after the grant of provisional registration. No house job or internship shall be allowed

unless the applicant possess valid PM&DC provisional registration certificate.

(9A) The applicant is required to apply immediately for provisional registration before the date of commencement of house job.

(10) After provisional registration, house job, internship, clinical work, or resident training of one year duration abroad from hospital approved by the regulatory body of that country is also acceptable for full registration.

(11) The clinical work / house job performed before award of degree as part of studies in case of foreign graduates of Pakistani nationality who 'qualify the National Registration Examination" shall not be entitled for full registration. One year house job/internship after provisional registration as supra shall be required.

(12) Every student on completion of his/her degree of MBBS or BDS, as the case may be shall be required to undergo one year house job or internship, by whatever name called for, before permanent registration with the Council.

(i) A recognized medical or dental college shall be responsible to create house job vacancies for their graduates annually in its teaching hospital equivalent to its approved annual intake.

(ii) Experience of house job or internship done prior to provisional registration shall not be counted and accepted as experience of house job towards entitlement of full registration. In Government teaching hospitals without medical/dental colleges, house jobs can be created on a bed strength as specified in Institutions

Accreditation/Inspection Performa of PM&DC (Available on PM&DC website).

(iii) House job or internship training shall be carried out only in a hospital recognized by the Council under the Act (mentioned in Schedule 4).

(iv) Before awarding house job or internship, the hospital shall ensure that the candidate possesses a valid provisional registration or proof of submission of application with the Council.

(13) **House job structure for MBBS.-** A house job or internship shall consist of residential, full time and structured modules specified in column (2) of the Table below for the duration as specified in column (3) thereof, namely:-

(14) **Explanation:** Each main module (medicine and allied of six month's or surgery and allied of six month's) shall have to be completed in a PM&DC approved hospital. The experience of house job or internship less than three months in any module shall not be accepted as experience.

(15) Basic life support certification (BLS) course shall be mandatory during house job for full registration with the Council.

(16) **House job structure for BDS.**- (1) House job or internship for BDS shall consist of residential, full time and structured modules specified in column (2) of the Table below for the duration as specified in column (3) thereof, namely:-

(17) **House job or internship for foreign medical or dental graduates (Pakistan National) :-** The foreign medical and dental graduates having

obtained undergraduate medical or dental qualification issued by a foreign university or an undergraduate medical or dental qualification issued by a foreign university duly recognized by the Council, shall be granted a provisional registration to undertake his/her house job within fourteen days of verification of their qualification by the granting institution:

“Provided that the person to whom a provisional registration is granted shall complete the mandatory requirement of passing NRE at any time prior to issuance of full registration of foreign Pakistani graduates”.

(18) Stipend or salary for house job or internship.- All public and private institutions shall be responsible to provide a paid house job to their graduates and there shall be no house job/ internship in parent institute without honorarium. An institute may however provide house job / internship to graduates of other institutions depending upon its capacity but shall not be responsible for paying the graduates of other internee in institutes. The amount of stipend or salary, by whatever name called, paid to house officer private sector hospitals shall not be less than the highest amount paid in any public sector hospital of that province. The institution shall not allow house job beyond the slots allocated by the Council in the relevant institution.

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state whether it is a fact that construction work of Sukkur-Hyderabad motorway has started, if not, the reasons thereof indicating also the current

status of the said project and expected time by which the same will be completed?

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:

- ❖ The construction of Sukkur-Hyderabad Motorway has not yet been started.
- ❖ NHA signed the PPP Agreement for M-6 project in December, 2022. But, due to failure of Concessionaire to achieve financial close within stipulated time, NHA terminated the agreement in December, 2023.
- ❖ **CURRENT STATUS:**
 - As per the commercial feasibility review by international consultant A.T. Kearney, the project is divided into five (5) sections.
 - Islamic Development Bank (IsDB) is taking up two sections of the M-6 project i.e Section-4 (Naushehroferoz-Ranipur) and Section-5 (Ranipur-Sukkur). They anticipate to obtain their Board approval by September, 2025. However, they have accorded NHA the approval for Advance Procurement.
 - Fruitful discussions are underway through EAD with OPEC Fund and SFD (Saudi Fund for Development) for taking up jointly Section 3 (Naushehroferoz-Ranipur). They anticipate to obtain their Board approval in December, 2025.
 - Section-1 (Hyderabad - Tando Adam) and Section-2 (Tando Adam - Nawabshah) shall be initiated on PPP mode, as per the ECNEC decision.
 - Case for hiring of IFI as Transaction Advisor has been approved by P3A Board as per their regulations on 11-09-2025.
 - Revised PC-I of M-6 project has been approved by ECNEC on 7th August, 2025.
- ❖ Construction activities on Section-IV & V of Motorway (M-6) are expected to commence in April, 2026.

Syed Mustafa Kamal:

On the recommendations of the rightsizing committee, a draft bill has been prepared to National Tibb Council and the National Council for Homeopathy into National Traditional, Complementary and Alternative Medicine through an Act.

Draft bill was sent to M/o Law & Justice for vetting. M/o Law & Justice has returned bill for reconsideration after seeking approval of the CCI. Accordingly, a summary was forwarded along with draft bill for consideration of the CCI. The CCI returned the draft bill that the bill does not required approval of the CCI

Now, the draft bill is under consideration in this Ministry and Ministry of L&J for vetting. L&J has again called a meeting with a representative of this Ministry not below the rank of BS-20. The meeting will be held shortly and vetting process will be completed.

Currently, both the councils in terms of structure functioning and coordination are working under Unani, Ayurvedic and Homoeopathic Practitioners Act, 1965, to promote and popularize the Unani, Ayurvedic and Homeopathic system of medicine, to regulate education and research in, and to provide for the registration of practitioners of that system of medicine.

- (a) *whether it is a fact that Federal Ombudsman has passed the judgment on 02-10-2024 for payment of commutation and residuum pension dues of retired employees of Federal Urdu University, Karachi Campus, if so, the details thereof; and*
- (b) *whether it is also a fact that despite the availability of an amount of Rs.670 million in the pension fund of the University the said Order of the Federal Ombudsman has not been implemented so far, if so, the reasons thereof?*

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

- (a) Yes, the Federal Ombudsman (Wafaqi Mohtasib, Karachi office) in Case No. WMS/KHI/6801/24 and Case No. WMS/KHI/7975/24 filed by Prof. Dr. Ajmal Khan and Prof. Masood Ahmed, has asked the Federal Urdu University of Arts, Sciences & Technology (FUUAST) to consider the matter of outstanding liabilities of its retired employees at appropriate level i.e. Syndicate or Senate of FUUAST till the Government finds it convenient to consider allocation of special funds to meet the demand of the Karachi campus of FUUAST.
- (b) The Federal Urdu University of Arts, Science and Technology (FUUAST) has clarified that the actual balance of the General Provident Fund (GPF) stands at approximately Rs. 487 million, rather than Rs. 670 million. In line with the Syndicate's decision of 24-10-2024, the university has utilized Rs. 100 million from investment profits to clear pension dues. However, due to a severe budget shortfall,

FUUAST remains unable to settle the outstanding liabilities of retired employees. To address the matter comprehensively, the university is actively pursuing support from the Ministry of Federal Education and the HEC for a bailout package and urgent supplementary grants, including the pending Rs. 2.5 billion.

Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui:

- Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad, has paid salaries to the visiting faculty up to the Fall 2023 semester. However, no payments have been made to the visiting faculty for the Spring 2024 semester onwards due to insufficient funds, as the University has been experiencing a severe financial crisis over the past five years. The details of visiting faculty members of QAU who have not been paid remuneration since Spring 2024 along with department wise breakup is attached as **Annex-A**.**

- (b)** The Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) of the Federal Cabinet has ratified a bailout package of Rs. 2 billion for Quaid-i-Azam University; however, the release of funds from the Finance Division is still awaited.

It has been recommended by the QAU's Finance & Planning Committee and thereafter approved by the Syndicate that the remuneration to visiting faculty will be paid from the bailout package as and when released by the Finance Division.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state:

- (a) *the criteria and procedure laid down for appointment of the President and Secretary of Pakistan Nursing and Midwifery Council; and*
- (b) *the educational qualifications and experience of the incumbent President and Secretary of the said council indicating also the procedure adopted for their appointments?*

Syed Mustafa Kamal:

(a) According to Pakistan Nursing and Midwifery Ordinance, 2025, following is the criteria for appointment of President and Secretary PN&MC.

According to Section 4 of OM&MC Ordinance 2025,

the president shall be elected amongst the members of the council established under Section 4 of the Ordinance, and he shall hold office for a period of three years or as long as he continues to be the member of the council. The election of the president shall be held once the council members are notified.

According to Section 14 of the ordinance,
(1) The Council shall appoint a Secretary, on such terms and conditions as prescribed under the rules for a period of three years and shall be eligible for reappointment based on key performance indicators and evaluation.

(2) The secretary shall be appointed through open competitive process. The qualification shall be Masters' degree in Nursing or public policy administration or equivalent duly recognized by HEC with 10 years of the experience in policy administration or education or quality assurances.

(3) The appointment of the secretary shall be on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed by the rules.

(4) The division concerned till the appointment of a regular incumbent, may assign current or additional charge to any officer not below the rank of BPS-19 or equivalent.

(b) After the promulgation of Pakistan Nursing and Midwifery Council Ordinance, 2025 on 25 September 2025, the president shall be elected amongst the members of the council established under Section 4 of the Ordinance, and he shall hold office for a period of three years or as long as he continues to be the member of the council. The election of the president shall be held once the council members are notified.

As the PNMC Ordinance was promulgated on 26 September, the secretary shall be appointed by the council under Section 14 of the Ordinance. The president, Secretary and the previous council members under PNMC ACT 1973 read with Amended Act 2023 cease to exist. Hence, fresh appointment of President, Vice President and Secretary shall take place as per law

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the rate of toll tax on National Highways has been increased, if so, the reasons thereof indicating also the criteria adopted for the same;*
- (b) the estimated additional revenue expected to be collected through the said increase indicating also the proposed utilization of the same; and*
- (c) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to exempt small passenger vehicles and daily commuters from increase in toll tax in future, if so, the details thereof?*

Mr. Abdul Aleem Khan:

- (a) National Highway Authority (NHA), established under the NHA Act 1991, is mandated to manage, operate and maintain the federalized road network, financing these activities primarily through its own resources.

As per the Tolling Policy, NHA is authorized to revise toll rates every three years or as required, using the prescribed formula linked to inflation indices. Accordingly, with the approval of the NHA Executive Board, the toll rates revised in year 2024-25, were implemented in four quarterly phases, effective July 2024, Oct 2024, Jan 2025 and April 2025 to minimize the burden on commuters. Notifications regarding the increase were published widely and made available on the NHA website.

This revision is both lawful and essential to align toll rates with prevailing economic conditions and to ensure sustainable financing for maintenance, rehabilitation, and safe operation of the national road network, as toll collection, contributes major share of revenue, is the major source for funding road maintenance and rehabilitation.

- (b) comparison of revenue FY 2024-25 from FY 2023-24 is **annexed A.**
- (c) As per the in-vogue Policy, exemption from toll is admissible to only following vehicles on National Highways & Motorways' network of NHA:

On National Highways.

- a) Armed Forces of Pakistan (bearing broad arrow Number plates)
- b) Ambulances
- c) Fire Brigades
- d) Provincial Police
- e) Vehicles having High Court Flags/Insignia Plates.
- f) National Highways and Motorways Police.

On Motorways (M-1, M-3, M-4, M-5, M-14 & E-35)

- a) National Highways and Motorways Police.

On Motorways M-2, M-9 & M-11 under PPP Model

- a) Provincial and National Highway Motorway Police
- b) Fire Brigade Vehicles
- c) Ambulances
- d) Armed forces of Pakistan vehicles bearing broad arrow number plates
- e) Vehicles having Supreme Court, High Court flags insignia plates

Further, there is no such proposal currently under consideration.
