**Minister In-charge of the Cabinet Division:** It is informed that, presently, no Regulatory Authority titled “**Software Economic Zones Authority**” has been placed under the administrative control of the Cabinet Division. However, the Special Technology Zones Authority (STZA) is under administrative control of the Cabinet Division.

**Minister In-charge of the Cabinet Division:**

- (a) Whereas, the Rules of Business, 1973 do not explicitly assign Pakistan Telecommunication (Re-organization) Act, 1996 to any specific Ministry or Division, the administrative control of two entities established under the said Act including Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) and Frequency Allocation Board (FAB) is with the Cabinet Division. The PTA has been constituted under the Act *ibid* and its administrative control was transferred from the Ministry of Science and Technology to the Cabinet Division vide notification no. 4-15/98-Min-I dated 15<sup>th</sup> October, 2002 (**Annex-I**) .

Accordingly, PTA was formally placed under the administrative control of the Cabinet Division in the Rules of Business, 1973 vide S.R.O. 433 (1)/2003 dated 20<sup>th</sup> May, 2003 (**Annex-II**) .

- (b) Under entry no. 2 serial no. 83 of the Rules of Business, 1973, PTA lies within the administrative purview of the Cabinet Division (**Annex-III**). Therefore, any section of the Pakistan Telecommunication (Re-organization) Act, 1996 or any rule of the rules made under the Act, which deals with the administrative matters of the PTA, lies within the purview of the Cabinet Division. Furthermore, any amendment to be made in the Pakistan Telecommunication (Re-organization) Act, 1996 or the rules to the extent of their being related to the administrative matters of the PTA will also fall within the purview of the Cabinet Division.





"10. Federal Government functions in regard to the Supreme Court, Supreme Judicial Council, High Courts, Federal Shariat Court, Federal Ombudsman and the Tax Ombudsman.";

(ii) in entry 20 after the bracket, at the end, the words, figures, brackets and comma "and section 32 of the Establishment of Office of Federal Tax Ombudsman Ordinance, 2000 (XXXV of 2000)" shall be inserted; and

(iii) in entry 32, after the word "Law" the words "and Justice" shall be inserted;

(3) in Schedule III,-

(a) serial number 65 in column 1 and entry relating thereto in column 2, shall be omitted; and

(b) serial number 87 in column 1 and entry relating thereto in column 2, shall be omitted;

(4) in Schedule-IV,-

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

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:**

Several steps taken by the Government to control air pollution in the Islamabad capital territory (ICT) during the last three years.

**1. Construction projects:** the EIA/IEE directorate, monitors large-scale construction projects in Islamabad. EPA imposed administrative penalties on several projects on NEQS violations.

**2. Smog season:** EPA, ICT and ITP started the vehicle emission checking in Islamabad as pre smog action. ICT administration banned open waste burning and agriculture waste burning.

**3. Industrial sector:** The number of brick kilns has been reduced in ICT jurisdiction, and 33 brick kilns shifted to Zigzag technology and 05 under process reduced 60% emissions. EPA directed all industries to control and reduce their emissions. Data surveillance room to monitor steel industries located in I-9 and I-10 industrial areas.

**4. Transport Sector:** Pak-EPA and the Islamabad Traffic Police carrying out enforcement drive for Vehicular Emission Control and Monitoring Campaign from June 2025, 488 vehicles checked, 89 fined, 15 impounded for serious violations under provisions of the Pakistan Environmental Protection Act (PEPA) 1997.

**Monitoring and enforcement actions:** Around 15 cases are under process in Environmental protection tribunal and other legal forums. 46 EPO's issued on environmental laws violations. High concentrations of PM<sub>2.5</sub> were observed in the winter months, i.e. October to February due to smog season. Table no. 1, 2&3 graphical concentration and Comparison of the 2021-2025 month wise average concentration of PM<sub>2.5</sub> (recorded data) along with AQI, graph are attached as Annexure.



**Syed Imran Ahmad Shah:**

- (a)** Yes, under the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP), a specific mechanism exists to identify persons with disabilities across Pakistan including Balochistan. Beneficiaries are selected through the National Socio-Economic Registry (NSER) survey using a Proxy Means Test (PMT) to assess household welfare. While the general PMT eligibility cut-off is 32, a higher cut-off score of 37 is applied for households with disabled members to facilitate their inclusion. However, presently, no specific eligibility criteria exists for inclusion of senior citizens or critically-ill persons under the programme.
- (b)** Yes, the Government has introduced several beneficiary-centric initiatives to improve ease of access. BISP has hired new Partner Financial Institutions (PFIs) and adopted a campsite-based payment model, offering beneficiaries the choice to receive payments through Point-of-Sale agents. **Additionally, the Social Protection Wallet (SPW)** has also been launched to enable secure and digital disbursement of funds, allowing beneficiaries to receive, save, and transfer payments digitally. These initiatives aim to enhance accessibility and convenience, with ongoing collaboration with the State Bank of Pakistan to further expand payment options.

BISP acknowledges the unique challenges posed by the geography and socio-economic conditions of Balochistan and has adopted several measures to ensure inclusivity and accessibility. To facilitate registration, **157 Dynamic Registration Centres (DRCs)** have been established across all Tehsils of Balochistan. In addition, **25 Mobile Registration Vans (MRVs)** have been deployed nationwide, out of which **18 have been dedicated exclusively to Balochistan**. These MRVs extend Dynamic NSER registration services to remote and hard-to-reach areas, thereby ensuring uninterrupted access for vulnerable populations.

**Syed Imran Ahmad Shah:**

(a) **I. BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME (BISP)**

Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) was launched by the Government of Pakistan in July 2008 and enacted through an Act of Parliament i.e. BISP Act, 2010. BISP works as the premier safety net institution in Pakistan. It works under the Executive patronage of the Prime Minister while the President of Pakistan is its Chief Patron.

**Programmes**

The main initiatives and programmes of BISP are as followed:

- Kafaalat Programme
- Taleemi Wazaif Programme
- Nashonuma Programme
- National Socio Economic Registry (NSER)
- Complementary Initiatives (CI)

Brief detail of each programme is attached as **Annex-I**.

### Field Offices

Initially, BISP established its Regional and Divisional Offices at all provincial headquarters. Subsequently, to extend its services to the grassroots level, Tehsil Offices were also established. At present, BISP has a total of 447 field offices operating at the Zonal, District, and Tehsil levels across the country. Currently, 48 BISP offices are operational in the Balochistan Region, including 36 District Offices and 12 Tehsil Offices. These offices are fully functional. List of offices in Balochistan along with their year of establishment is attached as [Annex-II](#).

With the launch of the Dynamic NSER system in February 2023, BISP has transformed registration into a continuous and permanent process. Data collection is no longer dependent on periodic nationwide surveys; instead, it is updated on an ongoing basis through Dynamic Registration Centers (DRCs) established across the country, including in Balochistan. List of DRCs in Balochistan along with their dates of establishment is attached at [Annex-III](#).

Under the Dynamic NSER model:

- Any unregistered household may approach the nearest DRC at any time for registration.
- Households already surveyed but declared ineligible (i.e., above the PMT threshold) may apply for reassessment after two years.

Beneficiary households are required to undergo re-certification every three years from the date of their first payment. Failure to complete re-certification within three years and six months results in suspension of payments.

Furthermore, to cater to the needs of beneficiaries residing in remote and far-flung areas with low population density and difficult terrain, Mobile Registration Vans (MRVs) have also been deployed across Pakistan including Balochistan to enhance service outreach and accessibility. At present, out of 25 MRVs, 18 are deployed in Balochistan.

### 5. Pakistan Bait ul Mal, Women Empowerment Centre (WEC)

Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has established Women Empowerment Centers (WEC) throughout the country at district level including Azad Kashmir & Northern Areas since 1995. Currently, 21 WECs in Baluchistan are functional. ICT export remittances, comprising of ICT companies and tech freelancers, have reached a historic high, surging by an incredible US\$587 million (18%+) to US\$3,810 million during FY2024-25 in comparison to US\$3,223 million reported during FY2023-24. In July 2025, ICT services export remittances amounted to US\$ 354 million, an all-time record for the month of July. Trade surplus of US\$ 3,318 million was achieved by the ICT Industry during the FY2024-25, an increase of 17.3% as compared to trade surplus of US\$2,827 million during the last year (FY2023-24). Whereas, the Services Sector had a trade deficit of US\$2,622 million during FY2024-25, underlining the critical & increasing role of the ICT industry in stabilizing Pakistan's external accounts. ICT exports are the highest within the Services Sector of Pakistan's economy and are generating the largest trade surplus for the country within the Services Sector. This performance is especially laudable keeping in view the current global economic challenges thereby demonstrating the resilience of Pakistan's ICT industry ecosystem and is a tribute to Pakistan's ICT industry professionals and the government's focus on the growth of the ICT Industry. This robust growth positions Pakistan's ICT exports as the largest Services Sector component and thus a leading contributor to the country's overall export performance. Average exports growth remittances inflow has been a stellar 21.15% over the past two years with FY2022-23 being the base year. Pakistan's ICT industry growth signifies a rapidly expanding industry thus signifying confidence in the industry and consummate investment into the sector. Foreign Direct investment in the ICT sector increased by 69%+ to reach US\$158.1 million in FY2024-25 compared to US\$93.4 million in FY2023-24 as per SBP data.

The Ministry of Information Technology & Telecommunication

and its ancillary entities are taking all possible steps to ensure long term sustainable growth of Pakistan's ICT Industry recognizing that the ICT industry has the potential to become the largest export earner for Pakistan

The remarkable growth of Pakistan's ICT Industry is a direct result of the government's strategic focus on the ICT industry. Pakistan's ICT Industry is receiving top priority from the present government, which is working diligently to improve the state of Pakistan's economy, create jobs and uplift overall quality of life. As a result, the industry is being provided with strong government support with key initiatives listed as under:

#### **1.1. Human Resource and Skill Development**

To meet global IT industry standards, Pakistani IT graduates should be fully equipped with knowledge and skills related to basic technology domains while continually upgrading their skillset and expertise pertaining to trending and emerging technologies.

##### **a. Certification of IT Professionals: *(Completed, June 2025)***

PSEB trained 8,600 professionals in AI, Cybersecurity, Cloud, and Data Analytics, achieving 95% of project scope. The program bridged the IT skills gap, boosted employability, and aligned Pakistan's workforce with global standards to enhance exports and foreign client confidence.

##### **b. Prime Minister's Initiative - Support for IT Startups, Specialized IT Training and Venture Capital (Component-III): *(On-going)***

This program delivers 1,354 certifications, 3,384 bootcamp trainees, 2,708 soft skills participants, and 1,000 apprenticeships. It strengthens the talent pipeline, ensuring 60–70% employment while 30–40% move into freelancing or entrepreneurship, driving jobs and income growth.

##### **c. National Semiconductor HR Development Program *(New Initiative)***

The global semiconductor market has surpassed \$600 billion

and is projected to exceed \$1 trillion by 2030. Approximately 70% of this growth is driven by rapid advancements in computing and data storage, automotive electronics, wireless connectivity, and power management.

Recognizing the immense potential of this industry, the Government of Pakistan has launched targeted, long-term, and well-structured initiatives to capitalize on emerging opportunities. As part of these efforts, a dedicated project—approved by the CDWP at a total cost of Rs. 4,844 million has been initiated.

The project focuses on the fabless chip design segment to train a total of 7,200 skilled professionals through two key pathways:

- 2,200 engineers through formal university programs (undergraduate & postgraduate levels)
- 5,000 professionals through tiered up-skilling training tracks

**d. Revamping IT Industry Landscape (*New Initiative*)**

The project will train 20,950 individuals in leadership, technical, and emerging skills while introducing supportive policies and global promotion campaigns. It is estimated that the total IT/ITeS industry revenues will increase by US\$ 400-450 million by the end of the project and create an estimated 14,000 jobs in three years (the project lifecycle), in addition to stronger academia-industry collaboration and global IT branding.

**e. GDPR-Driven ISO Compliance & IT Exports Enhancement Program (*New Initiative*)**

The initiative will certify 50 IT/ITeS companies in GDPR/ISO standards for Information Security (ISO 27001 & 27701), ISO 22301 for Business Continuity Management and ISO 42001 for AI Management System. In the previous PSEB executed GDPR project, it was observed that 15% of firms grow exports after compliance, boosting EU market contracts. The program will enhance credibility, competitiveness and long-term data

protection culture.

## **1.2. Infrastructure Development**

Pakistan Software Export Board (PSEB) facilitates the IT industry by establishing state-of-the-art infrastructure for ICT industry through development of Software Technology Parks (STPs) in public and private sector buildings, IT Parks, Data centers etc. These knowledge clusters/centers shall work as engine of growth for IT sector in Pakistan.

PSEB has established 50 Software Technology Parks (STPs), 1.9 million sq.ft approximately, housing more than 350 companies employing 18,000 professionals. PSEB is managing various programs to address infrastructure needs of the ICT industry.

### **a. Establishment of 25 Software Technology Parks (Completed, June 2025)**

25 STPs were established in 20+ cities. These STPs have 20% female population, provide modern ICT infrastructure, strengthen academia-industry linkages and promote regional startups thereby ensuring nationwide IT sector growth.

### **b. Establishment of Woman Software Technology Park in Azad Jammu & Kashmir**

The Woman Software Technology Park (WSTP) at Women University, Bagh, AJK has been setup in collaboration with Special Communication Organization (SCO) and Women University of AJK Bagh. This is Pakistan's women-only tech park, spanning 5,000 sq. ft, it provides modern ICT facilities to women entrepreneurs, freelancers and startups. The Park aims to empower women, foster innovation and create local employment while reducing migration to major cities

### **c. IT Park Development Project Islamabad: (On-going)**

This state-of-the-art facility, currently under construction will house startups, SMEs, and large IT firms. It is expected to generate 7,500 jobs and \$60m in annual exports, creating a strong ecosystem for innovation, collaboration, and foreign investment.

d. **Establishment of IT Park Karachi: (On-going)**

Upon completion, the Karachi IT Park will provide space to 220+ ICT companies, create 13,400 jobs and boost exports by \$90m annually. This mega project will anchor Pakistan's ICT ecosystem and elevate its global competitiveness.

e. **Prime Minister's Initiative - Support for IT Startups, Specialized IT Training and Venture Capital (Component-II): (On-going)**

Under this program, 250 co-working spaces will be established nationwide by 2027, promoting freelancers and entrepreneurs with a target of 25,000 jobs. Already, 40 plus spaces are functional, fostering grassroots innovation and expanding digital inclusion.

**1.3. International Marketing & Business Development**

- a. **Digital Foreign Direct Investment Forum:** Pakistan secured approximately \$700 million in foreign investment pledges for its burgeoning information technology sector, as announced by Honorable Prime Minister of Pakistan, Mr. Shehbaz Sharif in April 2025 during the Digital Foreign Direct Investment (DFDI-2025) conference. DFDI event, was attended by global tech leaders and investors as well as world leaders, marking a pivotal moment in Pakistan's digital transformation journey and effectively projecting Pakistan on the world stage as a viable and feasible destination for IT outsourcing and investment. The Forum established Pakistan as the first country to implement the DCO Digital FDI Initiative showcasing a pioneering blueprint for digital development and investment readiness.
- b. **International Events:** The Ministry of IT & Telecommunication is diligently working towards improving Pakistan's perception in the international arena. The Ministry appreciates the fact that effective international marketing and branding are important components to ensure sustainable ICT export growth. Between March 2024-August 2025, PSEB, an MoITT owned entity, facilitated participation of 328 Pakistani IT companies in 27

international events and outbound delegations across North America, Europe, Middle East and Asia. These efforts generated 6,883 business leads worth over US\$ 71.4 million as reported by the participating companies and around 50 MOUs were signed by the participating companies at the aforementioned events. Plans are in place to ensure maximum projection of Pakistan's ICT Industry across the world and to provide opportunities to local IT industry to explore cooperation, collaboration & Networking opportunities with prospective customers and to attract tech centric FDI towards Pakistan.

- c. **GITEX Dubai:** Pakistan was honored as the Tech Destination of the Year at GITEX 2024, highlighting its rapid emergence as a leading hub for innovation, technology, and digital transformation on the global stage. This prestigious recognition helped enhance Pakistan's perception as an attractive destination for tech investment and outsourcing. This year, efforts are underway to have a strong presence in at GITEX 2025 to effectively project Pakistan's ICT industry at GITEX 2025 which is one of the largest events of its kind in the world.
- d. **Branding & Social Media:** Strategic campaigns such as the "TechdestiNation Pakistan" are being executed to enhance Pakistan's reputation as a premier technology destination. TechdestiNation podcast has been launched to highlight industry insights and growth. ICT Industry centric success stories are being promoted to reinforce Pakistan's tech potential.

#### 1.4. Industry Facilitation

- a. **Company/Freelancer Registration & Renewal:** The registration process for companies and freelancers has been fully automated and provides the facility for online payment of registration and renewal fees thus significantly easing the process. Registration certificates are digital, embedded with QR codes, which companies can print themselves by downloading them online. The system also allows for

instant online verification of the authenticity of the registration. The registration/renewal process can now be completed in 9 minutes and has received praise from the industry.

- b. **Curbing Illegal Call Centers:** PSEB is coordinating with the National Cyber Crimes Investigation Agency and PTA to identify illegal and block call centers operating in the country thus cutting down on illegal activities such as scammers that prey on unsuspecting citizens locally and internationally thus impacting the reputation of the country and its tech sector. Around 1,000 such illegal call centers have been delisted through the aforementioned process.
- c. **24/7 Industry Facilitation Center:** The center is currently operational and is closely monitored with varying levels of escalation mechanisms to provide efficient, expedited and round-the-clock support to the IT industry. The scope of the center is currently being expanded to include the additional support to the industry pertaining to the following public sector entities: Federal Board of Revenue, State Bank of Pakistan, Security & Exchange Commission of Pakistan and Pakistan Telecommunication Authority.
- d. **Regional Expansion:** The establishment of PSEB branch offices in Gilgit-Baltistan (GB) and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) has been launched in the first phase to expand outreach and ensure growth of IT industry across the country.
- e. **Industry Engagement:** PSEB has conducted multiple industry meetups in Karachi, Lahore, and Islamabad to engage with all associated stakeholders. Maximum facilitation has been extended to various universities across the country to hold ICT centric events. In addition, PSEB facilitated and subsidized participation of 35 IT companies in ITCN Asia 2025 which is the largest IT centric trade fair in Pakistan.

- (b) whether the existing number of employees of the said Division and department is sufficient to cater for the needs of that Province, if so, the details thereof; and*
- (c) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to increase the number of employees of that Division and departments in Balochistan through new recruitment, if so, the details thereof indicating also the rules prescribed for preference to locals in recruitment?*

**Syed Imran Ahmad Shah:**

**(a) MINISTRY OF POVERTY ALLEVIATION AND SOCIAL SAFETY**

**Mr.Asad Karim**, Assistant (BS-16) of the Ministry, is currently working on deputation with Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal (PBM) at its Regional Office, Quetta. It is further clarified that his posting in PBM, Quetta, was made by the PBM Head Office itself not by the Ministry (Main).

**BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME (BISP)**

Detail of BISP employees posted in Balochistan is enclosed as **Annex-I** (on prescribed format).

**PAKISTAN BAIT-UL-MAL (PBM)**

The requisite detail regarding the employees presently posted in Baluchistan Province (Districts Wise), is placed at (**Annex-II**).

**PAKISTAN POVERTY ALLEVITON FUND (PPAF)**

PPAF operates in Balochistan through a single project-based office located in Quetta and does not maintain any district-level offices in the province.

**(b) BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME (BISP)**

BISP's Balochistan Region is already facing acute shortage of staff and the existing staff is not sufficient to cater to needs in Balochistan province.

**PAKISTAN BAIT-UL-MAL (PBM)**

Yes, the existing number of employees in Baluchistan Province is sufficient to cater for the needs of Baluchistan Province.

**PAKISTAN POVERTY ALLEVIATION FUND (PPAF)**

The current staff strength at the PPAF Balochistan Office is aligned with the project-based structure and the donor-agreed staffing plan. All required positions under the project have been duly filled, ensuring adequate capacity for effective implementation and management of the project activities. As the office operates entirely under project-based financing, no additional staff recruitment is required or financially provisioned by the donor at this stage. The existing human resource complement is, therefore, sufficient to meet the operational and programmatic needs of the project.

**(c) BENAZIR INCOME SUPPORT PROGRAMME (BISP)**

In order to cater to the deficiency, vacant positions can be filled through recruitment of new staff. However, due to austerity measures implemented by the Federal Government, recruitment cannot be initiated at this stage.

**PAKISTAN BAIT-UL-MAL (PBM)**

No, there is no proposal under consideration to increase the number of employees in Baluchistan Province, especially due to budgetary constraints in the head of Employee Related Expenditures (ERE) and due to the ongoing process of Rightsizing directed by the Federal Government. However, Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal Projects/Schemes are demand driven. In future, if the demand of social welfare initiative increases, staff will accordingly be increased to meet the need of the people.

- (a) *whether it is a fact that internet services are not available in some areas of Lower & Upper Chitral specifically at night, if so, the reasons thereof; and*
- (b) *whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to improve the said services and make the same available round the clock in those areas, if so, the details thereof?*

**Ms. Shaza Fatima Khawaja:**

a) Internet services are available in District Chitral (Lower and Upper). A recent survey conducted from September 2<sup>nd</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>, 2025, revealed satisfactory services in some towns, but low data speeds observed in rural and far-flung areas. Telenor dominates with 107 out of 142 sites. Key challenges include at night and otherwise:

**Power-related issues:**

- Unavailability of commercial power (CP) for long duration results in depleted power backups
- Frequent un-announced and prolonged power outages

**Network issues:**

- Frequent OFC cuts of PTCL resulting in degradation

**O&M challenges:**

- Security and access constraints
- Faulty gensets
- Solar dependency and limited sunlight hours due to harsh weather
- Refueling difficulties due to terrain and weather conditions

b) PTA's meeting with district administration revealed coverage issues in areas outside Chitral city and concerns over PTCL's fiber cuts. PTA will work with NHA and PTCL to prevent outages and encourage other CMOs to expand services. PTA further directed licensees to:-

- Enhance capacity where possible.
- Ensure timely refueling.
- Deploy Gensets at solar-only sites.
- Upgrade existing few sites to higher technology.

Furthermore, PTA is also in process of NGMS Auction by enhancing spectrum which will further improve capacity, quality and coverage. In addition, 12x locations during survey were identified as underserved which have been shared with USF for inclusion in future rollout plans.

During the last 2 years, a total of 30x new sites were installed in Chitral as tabulated below.

*Will the Minister for Climate Change and Environmental Coordination be pleased to state the details of the actions taken under the Pakistan Cooling Action Plan, Forest Fire Mitigation program, National Adaptation Plan and Eco-system Based Adaptation during the last 3 years indicating also the achievement with program wise breakup?*

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:**

### **Pakistan Cooling Plan**

The Ministry of Climate Change & Environmental Coordination has undertaken concrete measures to integrate sustainable cooling across national policies. The essential elements of cooling requirements and directions for sustainable cooling have been incorporated into multiple national policies and frameworks, thereby ensuring that cooling is effectively mainstreamed into Pakistan's broader climate and development agenda as follows:

#### **1. National Climate Change Policy:**

- Pakistan's National Climate Change Policy provides policy directions on adopting energy-efficient appliances and technologies.
- Encourages enforcement of building energy codes and promotion of passive and green building design to reduce cooling demand.

#### **2. Green Building Code of Pakistan (2023):**

- The Green Building Code of Pakistan introduces mandatory provisions on site sustainability, passive solar design, natural ventilation, green roofs, indoor air quality, and energy-efficient building envelopes, directly reducing cooling loads
- It Encourages renewable energy integration, water-efficient technologies, and use of sustainable materials, ensuring climate-smart building practices.

#### **3. National Adaptation Plan:**

- Heat stress is included in the NAP as one of the key climate-sensitive health risks, and mandates mainstreaming climate adaptation into public health planning (e.g., strengthening monitoring of heat-related illness, early warning systems, climate-resilient healthcare infrastructure).
- Further, the NAP emphasizes adaptation in urban areas

through ecosystem-based measures (like urban greening, tree planting, shading), management of urban heat island effects, integration of resilience into infrastructure and built environment planning to reduce temperature exposure and improve microclimates.

**3. Nationally Determined Contributions 3.0 (NDCs 3.0) (2025):**

- Pakistan's revised NDCs 3.0 identifies energy-efficient cooling as a key mitigation priority to reduce GHG emissions.
- Commits to HFC phase-down in line with the Kigali Amendment.
- Emphasizes building energy efficiency, appliance standards, and demand management to reduce cooling-related emissions

**4. National Cooling Action Plan-Cooling Appliances - Phase 1:**

- The MoCC&EC has developed the Pakistan Cooling Action Plan (PCAP), designed to define the country's cooling ambitions and serve as a national strategy to prioritize and coordinate activities in the cooling sector.
- The cooling sectors and appliances covered in the PCAP include domestic and commercial refrigeration, domestic air conditioning, and on- and off-grid fans. It sets out to implement the following measures:
  - i. Introducing MEPS and labeling for cooling products (air conditioners, refrigerators, fans).
  - i. Bulk replacement of inefficient fans in government buildings and low-income households with 5-star/DC fans.
  - ii. Policies to transition to low-GWP refrigerants in the air conditioning sector.
  - iii. Expanding access to cooling for off-grid populations by deploying efficient DC fans

- If fully implemented, the plan is projected to:
  - i. Avoid 22 MtCO<sub>2</sub>e indirect emissions and save 46 TWh of electricity.
  - ii. Reduce direct emissions by 5 MtCO<sub>2</sub>e via refrigerant transition.
  - iii. Ensure electricity cost savings of PKR 1,386 billion.
  - iv. Provide improved cooling access to 3 million people in off-grid/weak-grid communities

#### **5. Other National Policies - National Energy Efficiency and Conservation Policy:**

The National Energy Efficiency and Conservation Policy mandates:

- Minimum Energy Performance Standards (MEPS) and mandatory labeling for air conditioners and refrigerators.
- Promotes energy audits and the adoption of efficient cooling systems in industry and buildings.
- Training, certification of technicians, and introduction of low-GWP alternatives are ongoing.

#### **Forest Fire Mitigation Program:**

Given Pakistan's increasing vulnerability to forest fires exacerbated by climate change this coordination role has gained renewed importance in recent years. In response to the climate-induced forest fires of 2022, and in accordance with the directives of the Prime Minister, a High-Level Stakeholder Coordination Mechanism was established to enhance national preparedness and response.

As part of these efforts, Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for forest fire prevention and response were developed by MoCC&EC in consultation with all relevant stakeholders, including provincial and territorial governments. These SOPs have been formally adopted nationwide, including by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA).

To ensure regular monitoring and timely action, a fortnightly reporting format was also designed and circulated to all concerned entities. All stakeholders have been directed to make appropriate arrangements for forest fire preparedness ahead of

	<p>the fire season and to submit information using the prescribed fortnightly reporting Performa following any incident occurring within their respective jurisdictions.</p> <p>The data on-forest fire incidents reported over the last three years through the established mechanism is attached here for reference <b>(is enclosed)</b></p> <p><b>National Adaptation Plan</b></p> <p>Pakistan formulated its first National Adaptation Plan in 2023. The National Adaptation Plan was prepared in the aftermath of 2022 mega floods. Ministry is also supervising the implementation of Global Climate Funds (Green Climate Fund, Global Environmental facility and Adaptation Fund) funded adaptation projects, with policy interventions for groundwater recharge, flood plains management, climate smart agricultural practices and early warning systems for glacial hazards. Similarly, Upscaling Green Pakistan Programme is geared towards upscale afforestation/reforestation in provinces and improving land degradation. The efforts to enhance forest cover fall under the ambit of eco-based adaptation measures.</p>

*Will the Minister for Climate Change and Environmental Coordination be pleased to state the details of the Glacial Lake Outburst Flood II Project indicating its implementation and achievements during the last 3 years?*

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:**

The GLOF-II project is a climate resilience initiative jointly implemented by the Government of Pakistan and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), with funding from the Green Climate Fund. The project focuses on enhancing climate resilience in vulnerable mountain regions by establishing community-based early warning systems and constructing small-scale protective infrastructure such as check dams and gabion walls. Another important component is training of local communities—especially women—in disaster preparedness and climate-resilient livelihoods, and strengthening institutional capacity for climate risk management at both federal and provincial levels.

Within the GLOF II initiative, Early Warning Systems (EWS) play a central role in safeguarding vulnerable mountain communities from climate-induced glacial lake outburst floods. The project establishes community-based EWSs that combine risk monitoring, real-time hazard forecasting, and timely communication of alerts to at-risk populations. By enabling rapid response and evacuation during potential GLOF events, these systems help reduce loss of life, protect livelihoods, and strengthen local preparedness. The presentation on GLOF-II project is annexed for perusal please.

## GLOF II

- GLOF II project was approved from Green Climate Fund(GCF) in October 2016 with a funding of 37.5 million USD.
- The implementation of the project began in 2017 and the first disbursement of 10, 504, 366 million USD was made in March 2018.
- The GLOF II project coverage was extended to **24 valleys , including 16 valleys of GB(16) and KP(8)**

## Project Deliverables

- The GLOF II project consisted of the following deliverables:
- Flood Protection Structures
- Irrigation Channels
- Safe Havens
- CBDRMCs
- Ha Slope Stabilization
- 1,145 Community Sensitization Sessions & Mock-drills
- Early Warning Systems

## Completion of Project Outcomes

- UNDP has indicated that work on engineering structures and community centers has been completed.
- Work on Early Warning Systems is still under process
- PM Office has marked audit of GLOF-II project and report about the completion of outcomes of the project will be furnished once audit is completed.

## Causes of Delay in the installation of EWSS

- Lack of historical knowledge about installation of early warning systems in a difficult terrain of GB and KP. The construction of platforms for fixing weather stations was delayed on account of steep height and glacier topography.
- The procurement of weather stations was done under UNDP procurement rules and after the procurement, a team of engineers was put in place to assemble early warning systems. However, the process of assembling was again slowed down as the team for assembling the machinery had not been hired in time.
- Then, the development of protocols or parameters to issue alerts and trigger early warning systems, was delayed. As a result, GBDMA could not get access to data on real-time basis to conduct disaster relief effort.

## Causes of Delay in the installation of EWSS

- While conceptualizing project operations, the possibilities of vandalism of installed equipment and its safety and security were not properly figured out. Apart from the aspect of vandalism
- Then, planning was not done to secure weather equipment against glacial and flash flooding. Recently, flash floods have washed away water discharge gauges at some glaciers.
- The monitoring of glacial lakes, which sometimes outburst within hours, and often at night/dawn, necessitates deeper community outreach and community mobilization, that is only possibly by involving administration at local level. However, the element of community mobilization through district administration has remained a missing link.

## Overall Challenges in the Implementation of Project

- Live data transmission to server started recently. The executing agencies( PMD/UNDP) are importing Satellite based equipment for data transmission
- Exceptional rise in temperatures in 2025 in GB has led to flash flooding and the incidents of Glacial lake Outburst floods
- The range of flash flooding and GLOFs Floods/GLOFs has been widespread as 24 valleys in GB and KP were impacted. However, all these sites were not covered by warning posts set up under GLOF-II

*Will the Minister for Climate Change and Environmental Coordination be pleased to state the details of the Margalla Hills Forest indicating its classification under the relevant rules?*

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:**

Margallah Hills National Park is classified as a National Park under Section 12 of the Islamabad Nature Conservation and Wildlife Management Act, 2024. It was initially declared a National Park through a federal government notification in 1980, in accordance with Section 21 of the Islamabad Wildlife (Protection, Preservation, Conservation, and Management) Ordinance, 1979. As a protected area, it plays a crucial role in conserving diverse species of flora and fauna. **(Annex-I)**

There are three major forest types exist in Margallah Hill National Park including,

- i. **Tropical Deciduous Forest**
- ii. **Sub-Tropical Broad Leaf Evergreen Forest dominated by scrub vegetation**
- iii. **Subtropical Chir Pine Forest**

The area is characterized by rocky and hilly terrain and pattern of habitat is modified in terms of environmental and topographic features create an ideal setting for the high diversity of vegetation. There are 38 mammals, 350 birds, 32 reptiles and 9 amphibian's species present in the Margallah Hills National Park.

The Margallah Hills vegetation is largely the result of the monsoon season with the maximum rainfall in the month of August. Vegetation of Margallah Hills composed by a total of 187 plant species recorded belonging to 57 families. Out of which, 62 plants were trees, 23 shrubs and 102 herbs. Major tree species of the area includes, *Pinus roxburgii*, *Cassia fistula*, *Grewia optiva*, *Acacia catechu*, *A. nilotica*, *A. modesta*, *Bauhinia variegata*, *Butea monosperma*, *Olea ferruginea*, *Quercus spp.*

- (a) Section 3(3) of the FBR Act, 2007 (**Annex-I**) reads as under:

**“3. Establishment of the Federal Board of Revenue.-**

**(3) The Federal Government may appoint the Chairman on such terms and conditions as it may determine”.**

- (b) **Mr. Rashid Mahmood (PAS/BS-22)**, presently posted as Chairman, FBR has following educational qualification:

- (i) M.A (Economics)
- (ii) MPA/ID from Harvard Kennedy School, Harvard University, USA.

In terms of Section 3(3) of the Act *ibid*, 2007, **Mr. Rashid Mahmood** an officer of Pakistan Administrative Service, while he was in BS-21 was posted / appointed as Chairman, Federal Board of Revenue, under Section 10 of the Civil Servants Act, 1973, vide this Division’s notification dated 07-08-2024 (**Annex-II**) with the approval of Federal Cabinet. Whereafter, upon his promotion to BS-22, he was allowed to remain posted as Chairman, FBR vide this Division’s notification dated 24-03-2024 (**Annex-III**).

**AN  
ACT**

*to provide for the establishment of Federal Board of Revenue and for matters connected therewith or ancillary thereto*

**WHEREAS** it is desirable to enhance the capacity of the tax system to collect due taxes through application of modern techniques, providing assistance to tax payers and creating a motivated, satisfied, dedicated and competent professional work force that is required to perform at an enhanced efficiency levels;

**WHEREAS** the Federal Board of Revenue must pursue its objective and vision to be a modern, progressive, effective, autonomous and credible organization by providing quality services and promoting compliance with tax related laws, while being mindful of upholding values such as integrity, professionalism, teamwork, courtesy, fairness, transparency and responsiveness;

**WHEREAS** it is expedient to regulate the matters relating to the fiscal and economic policies; administration, management; imposition, levy and collection of taxes and duties;

**AND WHEREAS** it is necessary to re-organize the Board of Revenue to enhance the scope of activities and operations and to have appropriate autonomy and reconstituting Central Board of Revenue as the Federal Board of Revenue;

It is hereby enacted as follow:-

**1. Short title, extent and commencement.**- (1) This Act may be called the Federal Board of Revenue Act, 2007.

(2) It extends to the whole of Pakistan.

(3) This section shall come into force at once and the remaining provisions shall come into force on such date as the Federal Government may, by notification in the official Gazette, appoint and different dates may be appointed for different provisions.

**2. Definitions.-** In this Act, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context,-

- (a) "Board" means the Central Board of Revenue established under the Central Board of Revenue Act, 1924 (IV of 1924), and on the commencement of Federal Board of Revenue Act, 2007, the Federal Board of Revenue established under section 3 thereof;
- (b) "Cabinet Committee for Federal Revenue" means the Cabinet Committee for Federal Revenue constituted under section 6;
- (c) "Central Board of Revenue" means the Central Board of Revenue established under the Central Board of Revenue Act, 1924 (IV of 1924);
- (d) "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Board appointed by the Federal Government and shall include acting Chairman for the time being;
- (e) "Committee" means a committee constituted under this Act;
- (f) "employees" means the persons in the employment and service of the Board and its offices, organizations and its departments;
- (g) "fiscal laws" means a general reference to the laws relating to tax matters, including but not limited to, the Customs Act, 1969 (IV of 1969), Sales Tax Act 1990, Income Tax Ordinance 2001 (XLIX of 2001), Federal Excise Act 2005, and any other law imposing any tax, levy or duty having nexus with taxation, or as the Federal Government, may, by notification in the official Gazette, determine;
- (h) "human resource policy" means the policy related to employees for the purpose of enhancing efficiency in the functioning of the Board, which has been approved by the competent authority from time to time;
- (i) "member" means any person appointed as a member of the Board;
- (j) "person" includes the natural person, entity, any company or association or body of persons, whether incorporated or not;

- (k) "prescribed" means prescribed by rules;
- (l) "rules" means the rules made under this Act; and
- (m) "regulations" means the regulations made under this Act;

**3. Establishment of the Federal Board of Revenue.- (1)** There is hereby established a Board to be called the Federal Board of Revenue, which shall consist of not less than seven members to be appointed by the Federal Government.

(2) The Board shall exercise all the powers and functions as were exercisable by the Central Board of Revenue under the Central Board of Revenue Act, 1924 (IV of 1924), and all other powers and functions conferred on it under section 4.

(3) The Federal Government may appoint the Chairman on such terms and conditions as it may determine.

(4) The Chairman may designate any member who shall act as an Acting Chairman in his absence.

(5) The Chairman shall appoint the Secretary of the Board who shall act under his direction and shall deal with all matters connected with the meetings of the Board.

(6) In case the appointment of the Chairman is delayed for any reason, the Federal Government may appoint or designate most senior member as Acting Chairman.

(7) The Board shall meet at least once in two months but a special meeting of the Board may be convened by the Chairman at any time or on the request of any member.

(8) The Board may constitute one or more committees to consist of members that are appointed by the Board and they shall perform such functions as are entrusted to them by the Board.

(9) The Federal Government may delegate any of its powers under this Act to the Chairman on such terms and conditions as the Federal Government may determine.



*Will the Minister for poverty Alleviation and Social Safety be pleased to state:*

- (a) *whether it is a fact that a few firms have submitted fake survey reports to BISP for a number of districts in Southern Punjab since 2015, if so, the details of such firms indicating their names, amount paid to them and action taken for recovery of such amount; and*
- (b) *whether any criminal cases were registered against those firms, if not, the reasons thereof?*

**Syed Imran Ahmad Shah:**

- (a) BISP utilizes the **National Socio-Economic Registry (NSER)** to assess household-level socio-economic status (SES) through the internationally recognized **Proxy Means Test (PMT)**. A PMT score ranging from 0 to 100 is assigned to each household, and financial assistance is provided only to those falling within the approved PMT cut-off (currently 32).

The NSER was first established through a **nationwide door-to-door survey in 2010–11**. To update this data in line with international best practices, an **NSER Update Survey (2018–22)** was carried out, again using a door-to-door methodology. Both surveys were conducted by private **Partner Organization (PO) firms**, engaged in accordance with **PPRA rules**.

For the 2018–22 update, the country was divided into **eight clusters**. **Cluster-3 (Multan, DG Khan, and Sahiwal Divisions of South Punjab)** was contracted to M/s **Sustainable Development Policy Institute (SDPI)** under an agreement signed on **26.03.2019**. The firm was required to conduct universal coverage of all households through door-to-door visits.

The contract value was based on **4,411,426 households** (as per PBS Census 2017), at a rate of **Rs. 236.25 per household**, amounting to **PKR 1,042,179,849**. Payments were milestone-based and linked to deliverables, with penalties applicable for various contractual violations, including **coverage errors and survey quality issues**.

Although, SDPI completed the required enumeration target, BISP imposed penalties for **coverage/content errors and other violations**. Against the invoiced amount of **PKR 1,042,179,849** for eight contractual milestones, BISP processed **PKR 792,056,686** against six milestones, after adjusting **PKR 22,217,468** as penalties.

Additionally, BISP withheld payment of **two milestones amounting to PKR 250,123,164** on account of penalties. SDPI has challenged these penalties and initiated **arbitration under the Arbitration Act, 1940**. Proceedings commenced in **November 2024**, and further action will be taken in light of the final award of the learned arbitrator.

It may be noted that the earlier door-to-door survey mechanism was **static in nature**, meaning data could not be updated until the next nationwide survey. To overcome this limitation, BISP launched the **Dynamic NSER system in February 2023**, making registration a **continuous and permanent process**. Under this model, unregistered households can approach **Dynamic Registration Centres (DRCs)** or **Mobile Registration Vans (MRVs)** at any time. Beneficiaries are also subject to **mandatory re-certification every three years**, ensuring that programme benefits remain targeted to the most deserving households.

- (b) The contractual violations committed by M/s SDPI do not constitute a criminal offence; rather, they fall within the scope of **contractual obligations and penalties**. The **deliverable-based payment mechanism** inherently enabled BISP to verify the work through both internal and external validation processes before releasing payments.

Accordingly, BISP imposed substantial penalties and withheld payments to safeguard public funds. As the matter is now **sub judice** and under arbitration proceedings, BISP is vigorously pursuing the case before the competent judicial forum in accordance with law.

- (a) *the salient reasons for climate change in Pakistan;*
- (b) *the details of effects of climate change in Pakistan indicating also the names of areas in Pakistan badly affected by the said change; and*
- (c) *the steps taken/being taken by the Government to cope with the situation arising out of that change?*

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:**

- a) Pakistan is disproportionately affected by the adverse impacts of Climate change. The climatic hazards are multifaceted, ranging from recurring heatwaves, prolonged droughts, excessive and erratic rainfall, rising sea levels, glacial melting, riverine and non-riverine flooding, cyclonic storms, shifting monsoon patterns, and an increased incidence of vector-borne diseases. These hazards are intensifying in both frequency and magnitude due to global warming, with Pakistan consistently ranked among the most climate-vulnerable countries in the Global Climate Risk Index. As these climate threats multiply, the

exposure of both physical ecosystems and human settlements has become immense. Natural and human capital—including forests, biodiversity, agricultural lands, wildlife, water resources, infrastructure, human health, and key economic sectors such as agriculture, industry, and services—are all under serious threat.

- b) **Key Climate Challenges:** Pakistan faces a wide spectrum of intensifying climate hazards that threaten its ecosystems, economy, and human well-being: **Cryosphere Destruction & Glacial Melt:** Glaciers are vital for river flows, agriculture, and hydropower, but are threatened by rising temperatures, black carbon deposition, and erratic precipitation. Accelerated melting heightens the risk of Glacial lake outburst flood (GLOF) events, flash floods, and seasonal water scarcity, undermining long-term water security. **Heatwaves:** More frequent and prolonged heatwaves are causing heat stress on crops, livestock, and human health, especially in urban centers where the heat island phenomenon intensifies temperatures. **Floods:** Increasingly intense riverine and urban floods are
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damaging infrastructure, destroying homes, displacing communities, and disrupting economic activities. **Smog and Air Pollution:** Recurrent smog episodes from vehicular emissions, industrial pollution, and crop residue burning are worsening air quality, harming public health, and reducing agricultural productivity by blocking sunlight. **Deforestation & Land Degradation:** Widespread deforestation and unsustainable land use are reducing natural carbon sinks and increasing disaster vulnerability. Severe soil erosion from erratic rainfall, overgrazing, and unsustainable farming is degrading arable land, lowering yields, and accelerating desertification. **Monsoon Variability, Droughts, and Coastal Risks:** Shifts in monsoon patterns and prolonged droughts are undermining food security, groundwater recharge, and rural livelihoods. Sea level rise and coastal erosion threaten the Indus Delta, submerging fertile lands and displacing coastal populations. **Emerging Hazards: Locust Attacks:** Changing rainfall patterns and warmer winters have created favorable breeding conditions for desert locust swarms, which have devastated crops in Sindh, Punjab, and Balochistan, inflicting massive losses on farmers and threatening rural livelihoods. Izhar Ud Din Section Officer-CC 30 October , 2025, 09:00:01 AM **Cloudbursts:** Intensified monsoon dynamics are triggering sudden cloudbursts in Gilgit-Baltistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, releasing extreme rainfall within hours that causes flash floods, landslides, and infrastructure collapse while overwhelming local disaster response systems. **Food Insecurity:** Rising temperatures, erratic rainfall, droughts, floods, and soil degradation are disrupting planting cycles, reducing crop and livestock productivity, driving up food prices, and deepening food insecurity among vulnerable populations. Collectively, these overlapping hazards—heatwaves, floods, smog, deforestation, soil erosion, cryosphere destruction, and water scarcity —amplify disaster risk and push vulnerable populations deeper into poverty. This makes building climate resilience not just an environmental necessity but also a socio-economic and human development imperative.

- c) **Role of the Ministry of Climate Change and Environmental Coordination** The Ministry of Climate Change & Environmental Coordination (MoCC&EC) is mandated to formulate, coordinate, and oversee national policies and actions related to climate change, particularly climate adaptation and resilience. It has undertaken

several strategic initiatives to guide and mainstream climate considerations into national and provincial development planning. These include: Pakistan Climate Change Policy 2021 – updated to align national priorities with emerging climate challenges. National Adaptation Plan 2023 – a comprehensive plan to guide climate-resilient development pathways. Nationally Determined Contributions – supporting mitigation and adaptation actions in line with global commitments. Framework for Implementation of Climate Change Policy (2014 2030) – a roadmap for sectoral climate actions across the country. National Communication on Climate Change – reporting progress and commitments under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. Mainstreaming gender considerations in all climate action programmes. MoCC&EC is also working to strengthen institutional coordination, enhance climate finance access, build provincial capacity, and promote research, awareness, and early warning systems to deal with evolving climate risks. Izhar Ud Din Pakistan Policy Guidelines for Trading in Carbon Markets: The Policy was promulgated in December 2024 after due approval from the Federal Cabinet. The Policy provides a strategic roadmap for leveraging carbon market financing as a key mechanism for achieving our climate and economic objectives. It has set the stage for the establishment of carbon markets and provided a roadmap for their operational functioning. Section Officer-CC 30 October , 2025, 09:00:01 AM National Climate Finance Strategy (NCFS): The strategy is being developed keeping in view the climate needs and finance that Pakistan can leverage through bankable projects, duly funded by the international financial entities as ADB, WB, GCF, GEF, UNIDO, etc. National Climate Finance Dashboard: A real-time data of climate finance dashboard is being developed with assistance from the ADB. The dashboard will assist in formulating precised and rightful climate policy initiatives and interventions in all over the country. Major National Climate Initiatives To respond to these challenges, several ongoing and planned initiatives offer scalable models: SAFER Project (by MoCC&EC and International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development, funded by Adaptation Fund): focuses on integrated watershed management, nature-based recharge systems, wetlands rehabilitation, climate-resilient WASH systems, cryosphere risk management,

and early warning systems across Gilgit-Baltistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and Sindh—aligning with the National Adaptation Plan and Living Indus Initiative. GLOF-I and GLOF-II: installing early warning systems, strengthening community-based disaster preparedness, and developing small-scale protective infrastructure such as gabion walls and flood channels in Gilgit-Baltistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.
