*Will the Minister for Human Rights be pleased to state the details of child care centers/institutions in the Islamabad Capital Territory along-with the details of financial assistance provided to them during the last five years with year wise break-up?*

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:** It is to state that within the Islamabad Capital Territory, the **Child Protection Institute (CPI)**, working under the Ministry of Human Rights, is the primary government-managed institution providing care and protection to children in need as defined under the ICT Child Protection Act, 2018.

Since its establishment 2021, CPI provided shelter to 512 vulnerable children. Year wise break-up of cases and budget of CPI is as under:

**Mandate and services provided to children by CPI:**

“An Act to provide for the protection and care of children in the Islamabad Capital Territory”

The CPI provides a safe and secure residential facility for children rescued through court orders, law enforcement agencies, or the child helpline. Services include:

- Safe shelter and nutritious meals
- Medical care and psychosocial counseling
- Education and vocational training
- Rehabilitation and Re-integration
- Legal assistance and rehabilitation support
- Referral Services
- Certification of caregivers
- Data management

Besides, In Islamabad, there is currently no dedicated institute that specifically deals with children involved in narcotics or drug-related issues, which remains a major challenge. This gap in services hampers effective rehabilitation and specialized intervention for such vulnerable children. The mandate of the Child Protection Institute (CPI) is to provide protection,

temporary shelter, and rehabilitation to children in need of care and protection under the ICT Child Protection Act.

In this regard, CPI requested a list from the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) of all registered caregivers operating within Islamabad. It was observed that most of these organizations primarily cater to orphans and do not specifically address children affected by narcotics or drug abuse. This highlights the urgent need for specialized facilities and programs within the Islamabad Capital Territory to deal with such cases.

The allocated funds have been entirely utilized for fulfilling the essential needs of the children. The expenditure has been made on items including children’s clothing, shoes, food, utilities, play materials, stationery, books, drawing books, copies, and other child-related necessities.

It is further clarified that no cash assistance has been provided to the children. All support has been extended strictly **in-kind** to ensure transparency and proper utilization of funds for the welfare of the children.

*Will the Minister for Water Resources be pleased to state whether it is a fact that a project to construct Swan Dam on Swan River to mitigate the flood disaster was initiated, if so, the detail thereof indicating also its present status and the time by which the same will be completed?*

**Mr. Muhammad Mueen Wattoo:**

It has been apprised by WAPDA and Irrigation Department, Punjab that as such no project has been initiated to construct Swan Dam on Soan (Swan) River to mitigate flood disasters.

However, the Irrigation Department, Government of Punjab, is presently carrying out a "Feasibility Study for exploring the water potential of Soan River." The consultants, M/s NESPAK, have proposed the construction of two low-head weirs across the Soan River—one at Khana Bajar and the other at Dandi Gujran, both located near the Motorway (Chakri Interchange).

The primary objective of these two proposed projects is to divert the Soan River flows for irrigation supplies to the adjoining areas, thereby enhancing the agricultural potential and ensuring better utilization of available surface water resources. The feasibility study is expected to be completed by January 2026.

*Will the Minister for Law and Justice be pleased to state whether any legal forum exists at the Federal level to resolve issues of pensioners, if so, details thereof?*

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:**

The legal forums and mechanisms available at the federal level to resolve issues of pensioners are as under:

1. Federal Service Tribunal (FST): Pension being part of the terms and conditions of service of a civil servant, FST is the competent forum under Article 212 of the Constitution.
2. Wafaqi Mohtasib (Federal Ombudsman): Takes cognizance of complaints relating to maladministration in pension matters.
3. Supreme Court of Pakistan: Final appellate forum on pension matters.
4. Pension Cells: Established in each Ministry/Division/Department, as well as in the Accountant General Pakistan Revenues (AGPR), to facilitate and process pension cases.

*Will the Minister for Water Resources be pleased to state the details of schemes for construction of small ponds and small dams launched by the Government in Tharparker, Sindh during the last five years indicating also the location, amount allocated, storage capacity and present status of each of the same?*

**Mr. Muhammad Mueen Wattoo:**

During the last five years, a total of sixteen (16) small dam schemes has been launched in Tharparkar, Sindh under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP), at an estimated cost of Rs. 3,709.956 million. These projects collectively add approximately 128,600 acre-feet of water storage capacity and facilitate irrigation of 21,288 acres of land.

In addition, the Provincial Government of Sindh, under the Annual Development Programme (ADP), has completed two (2) small dam schemes, providing 2,000 acre-feet of storage capacity and irrigation of 3,860 acres of land. The Provincial Government, under ADP, has also initiated nine (9) schemes for the construction of small ponds/terrains to provide drinking water to local communities.

A summarized position of these schemes is given below. Scheme-wise details are at **Annex-A**.

*Will the Minister for Law and Justice be pleased to state the details of fund allocated and utilized under Access to Justice program for provinces and ICT during the last 3 years with province wise breakup?*

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:**

No funds have been allocated and utilized under Access to Justice Program (AJP) for provinces and ICT during the last 3 years as AJP was launched in 2001 by the Government of Pakistan with an ADB loan and closed on 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2018. AJP was launched to strengthen judicial, legislative, police, and administrative reforms. It comprised a Technical Assistance Loan and a Programme Loan, split into a Federal share and a Provincial share. Under the Federal Programme, interventions like construction of buildings of courts/tribunals, capacity building, legal education, fiscal and police reforms were carried out. Under the Provincial Programme, 634 schemes across provinces were completed. The execution period of the project was extended and finally, ECNEC in April 2018, decided to close the project, and the project stood closed on 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2018.

In accordance with mandate under Rules of Business, 1973, Ministry of Law and Justice is executing Projects under Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) to fulfil the development needs of Ministry of Law and Justice and allied organizations in line with National and International Obligations. The PSDP of Ministry of Law and Justice is aligned with Pakistan's commitments under UN 2030 agenda especially under Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The projects in the PSDP are envisaged to achieve SDGs specifically Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions to speedup judicial dispensation and provide access to justice for all. Projects also support E-Pakistan initiatives by promoting Digital transformation and E-Governance. In PSDP 2025-26, an amount of Rs 1,912.481 million has been allocated for 10 Projects relating to Infrastructure, ICT, and Governance Sector. Moreover, an amount of Rs 2,979 million has been utilized during last 3 years (from FY 2022-23 to 2024-25) under the Federal PSDP of Ministry of Law and Justice.

*Will the Minister for Human Rights be pleased to state the number of old age homes in Islamabad, in case there is no such establishment, the reasons thereof?*

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:**

The Ministry of Human Rights is committed to addressing the challenges faced by Pakistan's ageing population and to advancing the welfare of senior citizens, including through the establishment of dedicated facilities in Islamabad.

In this regard, a PC-I titled "Construction of Senior Citizen Home (Dar-ul-Shafqat) in Islamabad" was approved by the Departmental Development Working Party (DDWP) in its meeting held on 28<sup>th</sup> March 2024, at a total cost of Rs. 465.622 million. The facility was initially designed to accommodate 30 residents, with the capacity to expand to 50 in the future. The project aims to provide free accommodation, food, clothing, healthcare, and recreational opportunities, thereby ensuring a safe and dignified shelter for homeless and vulnerable senior citizens. The initiative is also intended to promote social interaction, reduce isolation, and ensure compassionate care, in line with the Senior Citizens Act, 2021, which mandates the establishment of such facilities.

However, no funds were allocated for the project under PSDP 2024-25 and 2025-26 by Ministry of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives due to paucity of funds.

Furthermore, several organizations have established facilities for senior citizens in Islamabad. Pakistan Bait-ul-Mal has set up a shelter home in Islamabad. Moreover, Binte Fatima Foundation provides shelter for elderly women in Islamabad, and Pakistan Sweet Home also extends shelter and care services to the senior citizens in Islamabad.

*Will the Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office be pleased to state:*

- (a) *the main reasons for extraordinary floods of 2025 in the country;*
- (b) *the details of loss caused to lives and property by the said floods with province-wise breakup; and*
- (c) *the details of compensation paid/to be paid to the families/persons affected by those floods?*

**Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:**

(a) The extraordinary floods of 2025 in Pakistan were mainly caused by: -

**a. Natural / Climate Factors**

- (1) Heavier and more intense monsoon rainfall.
- (2) Accelerated glacial melt and heatwaves in northern mountains.
- (3) Extreme upstream rains & cross-border water flows.
- (4) Unusual climatic variability linked to climate change.

**b. Human, Governance & Land Management Factors**

- (1) Deforestation, soil degradation, loss of natural absorption.
- (2) Poor urban planning and encroachment on natural waterways / floodplains.
- (3) Weak infrastructure and drainage systems.
- (4) Insufficient early warning systems, disaster readiness, and governance lapses by Local Governments.
- (5) Population growth / migration pressures.

**c. Interaction & Multiplying Effects**

- (1) Many of the natural factors (heavy rains, heat, glacier melt) act together, so the effect is more than sum of parts.
- (2) Human mismanagement (encroachment, poor planning, insufficient mitigation) turns what might have been heavy rain into disasters with high human and economic cost.
- (3) The speed of onset (cloudbursts, flash floods) often leaves little time for response.

- (b) Detail of losses received from Provincial Authorities, compiled by NDMA is attached at **Annex A** . As per the NDMA Act, 2010, the primary responsibility for first and second-tier response and relief rests with DDMA and PDMA. However, as the third-tier responder, NDMA has coordinated federal-level response and relief efforts. Details are placed at **Annex-B** .
- (c) The Honourable Prime Minister has announced Rs. 2 million as Ex-Gratia Assistance for each NoKs of deceased during Monsoon 2025. **Rs. 1,013.7 Million** has been disbursed to the NOKs of the deceased / injured persons. Remaining compensation will be entertained upon receipts of the cases from respective PDMA.

### Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:

As per Section 9 (a) of the National Disaster Management (NDM) Act 2010; NDMA is mandated to 'Act as implementing, coordinating and monitoring body for National Plan and National Policy with reference to Disaster Management'. The fundamental responsibility to manage the disasters with all allied activities rests with respective Provincial and Districts Departments, while NDMA acts as National backup support at Federal level. Pakistan's Disaster Management System is structured in a *three-tier devolved system* with the primary onus at District and Provincial level. However, NDMA does support in disaster related activities when these are beyond the capacities of Provincial / District Governments during emergency on the directions of Federal Government.

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:**

It is submitted that within the Islamabad Capital Territory, the **Child Protection Institute (CPI)**, working under the Ministry of Human Rights, is the primary government-managed institution providing care and protection to children in need as defined under the ICT Child Protection Act, 2018. Since its establishment 2021, CPI provided shelter to 290 vulnerable children involving in labor. Currently there are 18 children residing in CPI. Besides, 09 children are involving in child labor.

**Services provided to children by CPI:**

The CPI provides a safe and secure residential facility for children rescued through court orders, law enforcement agencies, or the child helpline. Services include:

- Safe shelter and nutritious meals
- Medical care and psychosocial counseling
- Education and vocational training
- Rehabilitation and Re-integration
- Legal assistance and rehabilitation support
- Referral Services
- Data management

In Islamabad, cases of child labour, particularly in the form of domestic labour, are quite prevalent. However, due to legal limitations, the Child Protection Institute (CPI) can only address those cases which are formally reported. It is pertinent to mention that the subject of child labour falls under the jurisdiction of the ICT Administration. Furthermore, the resolution of such cases often requires considerable time, as families are counseled extensively during the process, which is inherently time-consuming but essential for achieving sustainable outcomes.

- The initial PSDP allocation for FY 2025-26 was Rs. 3,209.36 million, which has now been enhanced by the PD&SI Division by Rs. 5,000 million. The total allocation for FY 2025-26 is now Rs. 8,209.36 million.
- As per 2<sup>nd</sup> revised PC-I, the total amount of funds required for completing the balance work of K-IV project (excluding CFY allocation), is Rs. 65,478.51 million as per following share:

- (a) • Modified Revised PC-I was approved by ECNEC on 31.01.2022 and its Admin Approval was issued by MoWR on 01.04.2022.
- WAPDA commenced the project in May 2022.
  - Works under the Project have been awarded to 08 No. National & International firms/JVs and current progress is 63.45%. Status of key achievements is as under:
    - More than 146 km out of 208 km of MS Pipe required for the Project has been fabricated using HR Coils imported from China.
    - In addition, key components such as mechanical screens, 10 No. Motors (5.5 MW each), Overhead Crane, Flow Control Valves and Check valves etc have been imported from various European countries.
    - Furthermore, 12 No. Pumps (32.5 MGD each) have been manufactured in Germany and will be delivered at site by January 2026 along with remaining 02 No. Motors.
  - Expected date of the Project's completion is December 2026 which is contingent upon availability of funds.
- (b) • Major impediment of K-IV project is the large funding requirement. Despite the limitations of Development Budget, the GoP has been prioritizing funding for the project. Similarly, allocation for FY 2025-26 has been enhanced from Rs. 3,209 million to Rs. 8,209 million and matter is under consideration for further enhancement.
- Other major impediment has been the availability of land which, as per ECNEC's approval, is responsibility of Govt. of Sindh. Relevant provincial departments have extended their support in this regard and almost all land issues have been resolved.
- (c) The part (c) of the Question pertains to Government of Sindh was forwarded to Secretary, Planning & Development Department, Government of Sindh and the Managing Director, Karachi Water and sewerage Board vide this Ministry letter dated 27-10-2025 and subsequently reminder dated 03-11-2025 (copies are Annexed). ### **Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:**

Prime Minister's Inspection Commission (PMIC) functions under the orders and direction of the Prime Minister and is directly responsible to him. PMIC conducts field visits / inspections of Ministries / Divisions / Departments / Projects as per requirement / need basis.

PMIC has conducted the following field visits / inspections, during the last three years:-

#### **I. On-going PSDP Inspection / Supervision Tasks (02)**

##### **KPK**

Currently, one ongoing task has been assigned to PMIC by the Hon'ble Prime Minister i.e. "Inspection of all Schemes in District Chitral being Undertaken / Implemented by NHA" i.e. Chitral Shandoor Road.

##### **ICT**

One **Supervision Task** was assigned by the Hon'ble Prime Minister namely "Replacement and up-gradation of HVAC Plant Room Equipment and Allied Works at PIMS, Islamabad". Due to PMIC's efforts, this project is ready for inauguration by the Hon'ble Prime Minister. However, an additional work on instant project is also under monitoring / supervision of PMIC.

#### **II. PSDP Projects Under Monitoring of PMIC (18)**

Eleven (11) PSDP projects have been monitored / visited by PMIC during last three years. Further, seven (7) additional slow moving PSDP Projects were authorized by the Hon'ble Prime Minister to PMIC to expedite their completion in order to give benefit to the public.

Province-wise break-up of these projects and their progress is attached as ***Annex-I*** :
